1 [REDACTED]: The recorder has started.
2 [REDACTED]: This is Special Agent [REDACTED]
3 [REDACTED] with the Department of Justice, Office
4 of the Inspector General. Today is Wednesday,
5 September 22, 2021. The time is 10:29 a.m. We
6 are here at the New York Field Office, in
7 Office of Inspector General. Present is Mr.
8 Mark Epstein. Attorney Stacey Richman. DOJ
9 Senior Special Agent [REDACTED]. And
10 myself. We are conducting an interview with
11 Mr. Mark Epstein in regards to Jeffrey
12 Epstein's investigation, of his death. I'm
13 going to introduce myself for the recording,
14 and I'm going to state my last name, also spell
15 it out. My name is Special Agent [REDACTED]
16 [REDACTED]. [REDACTED].
17 [REDACTED]: Senior Special Agent
18 [REDACTED] with the U.S Department of
19 Justice, Office of the Inspector General. [REDACTED]
20 [REDACTED].
21 [REDACTED]: Okay.
22 MR. EPSTEIN: Mark Epstein. E-P-S-T-E-I-
23 N.
24 [REDACTED]: Attorney Richmond, can you
25 introduce yourself?

2 MS. RICHMAN: Stacey Richman. S-T-A-C-E-
3 Y. R-I-C-H-M-A-N.

4 MR. EPSTEIN: And when you stated, my name
5 Mark is M-A-R-K. Not with a C. A K.

6 [REDACTED]: Thank you for taking the time
7 to talk to us today.

8 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

9 [REDACTED]: Just for the record, you are
10 Mark Epstein, Mr. Jeffrey Epstein's brother.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

12 [REDACTED]: And I understand that
13 basically, you reached out through attorney
14 Richman, you reached out to us, and you stated
15 that there was a few things you wanted to share
16 with the OIG.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

18 [REDACTED]: Go ahead. You can go ahead.

19 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

20 [REDACTED]: Let me just ask some,
21 like, just, or ask to maybe see his license,
22 just so we can verify --

23 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

24 [REDACTED]: -- if you don't want to
25 ask him for his date of birth. (Indiscernible

1 *00:01:46)

2 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Can we verify?

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Sure.

4 [REDACTED]: Or you can just ask your
5 birthday, date of birth.

6 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

7 [REDACTED]: It's one or the other.

8 MR. EPSTEIN: Oh, it's only my driver's
9 license.

10 [REDACTED]: Mr. Mark Epstein has shown me
11 a photo, driver's license, and it has his
12 picture on it, and it states his name on it.
13 Just for the record, here is my credentials.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

15 [REDACTED]: I'm a Special Agent [REDACTED]
16 [REDACTED] with the DOJ/OIG.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

18 [REDACTED]: And these are my
19 credentials. Senior Special Agent --

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

21 [REDACTED]: -- [REDACTED].
22 You can go now.

23 [REDACTED]: Go ahead.

24 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay. As I mentioned
25 before, before you came, I told them that, when

1 I first heard of Jeffrey's death, I just
2 assumed that it was a suicide, because it was
3 reported as such, and that time, I had no
4 reason to doubt it. And I just respected his
5 decision to take himself out. But then, as
6 things progressed, and when more information
7 came out, it looks like, if you just looked at
8 the information, there's no way in the world
9 you would say it was a suicide. The first
10 thing being the autopsy. The autopsy was
11 conducted the next day. It was conducted by
12 the city pathologist. And I was right, I was
13 able to get a pathologist to witness this, and
14 had Dr. [REDACTED] (Phonetic Sp.
15 *00:03:00). I don't know if you know Dr.
16 [REDACTED], but you can't get a --

17 MS. RICHMAN: He's the former Chief
18 Medical Examiner of the city of New York.

19 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

20 MS. RICHMAN: So, he went back to his
21 office because he was hired by Mark to review,
22 and be present, at the autopsy.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Normally, if I hire a
24 forensic pathologist to review the autopsy, he
25 has the right to just stand here and watch.

1 And then, we can get the body, afterwards, to
2 do a second autopsy, if needed. But because of
3 who [REDACTED] is, they did whatever he requested
4 them to do with the autopsy. So, there was no
5 need for a second autopsy. [REDACTED], also, has
6 been on the Special Commission, investigating
7 prison deaths, since the Attica riots in 1970.
8 So, he's been doing this for a long time.

9 There's no better authority in prison
10 deaths than [REDACTED]. And the city
11 pathologist came out with Dr. [REDACTED], and her
12 determination was, she could not call this a
13 suicide. There was too many questionable
14 things, you know, like the broken bones in his
15 neck. And [REDACTED] confirmed that, he also, not
16 to call this a suicide. It looks much more
17 like a homicide. Plus, there were the wounds
18 on his body. I'm, like, I have pictures I
19 could show you. And then, when we got the
20 death certificate to move, to claim the body,
21 the cause of death was pending. You know,
22 pending for an investigation. And then, a few
23 days later, the Chief Medical Examiner of New
24 York declares it a suicide.

25 MS. RICHMAN: Just to clarify. We found

1 out, through the media, they were going to make
2 that change. So, we called the Medical
3 Examiner's Office, asking how come you haven't
4 notified the family, and what is the central
5 reason for changing this? We interviewed them
6 for about, hmm, an hour. And we discovered
7 that they really didn't have much of a basis.
8 But everybody was just closing the
9 investigation. And when I persisted, is when I
10 learned that the camera on the floor, where Mr.
11 Epstein's cell was, had been corrupted. And no
12 one had actually viewed that camera.

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Now, one of the questions
14 about the camera on the tier, I don't know,
15 there's some pictures of, you know, we're
16 walking through the tier, and (Indiscernible
17 *00:05:08) all the cameras, right? That camera
18 wasn't working. So, one of the questions I
19 have is, when did that camera stop working?
20 When was the last time that camera actually
21 took a picture, you know, and have they
22 determined why that camera wasn't working?
23 Were the wires cut?

24 Was it unplugged, or, you know, why was
25 that camera not working? There is an answer to

1 that. You know, and I am going to get it. I
2 had, I could start showing some pictures, but
3 to keep going on, you know, because they did,
4 they swabbed - under autopsy report - they
5 swabbed his fingers for DNA evidence, in case
6 somebody was there. Was that ever checked? I
7 never saw the results of that DNA testing. You
8 know, nothing has been (Indiscernible
9 *00:05:50) for that.

10 And one of the things that lit up my mind
11 on top of this, one of the big things is that,
12 Attorney General Barr made a statement, saying
13 that he viewed the camera that was outside of
14 the tier, that showed the door, and the guards,
15 as that's directly right between, that the
16 guards were just, you know, jerking off, or
17 (Indiscernible *00:06:09) web, or whatever they
18 were doing. Make sure that video tape, and he
19 said that, he said that nobody went - that he
20 personally saw it, which I thought was strange.
21 You know, that nobody went in or out of the
22 tier.

23 So, that convinced them it was a suicide.
24 You guys are professional investigators. I am
25 not. But for me, the lights went off, I said,

1 either this is the stupidest guy on the planet,
2 or, if Jeffrey was killed, the killer was
3 already on the tier. So, it's just things that
4 might be come into the tier to kill him, I
5 mean, there's too many witnesses, how do you
6 get somebody in or out? But if he was killed,
7 the killer was already on the tier.

8 So, for him to make the statement that no
9 one went in or out, that convinced him it was a
10 suicide. I mean, that's like a, I think we
11 agree, it was like an amateur mistake in the
12 investigations, because there were a number of
13 people inside. Right? Well, let me pull up
14 something to show you.

15 MS. RICHMAN: Okay.

16 [REDACTED]: On that note, do you have
17 any information that anyone was actually in his
18 cell?

19 MR. EPSTEIN: There was nobody in his
20 cell.

21 MS. RICHMAN: Well, was -.

22 MR. EPSTEIN: There was supposed to be
23 somebody in his cell. Because he was
24 supposedly on suicide watch, doing whatever,
25 and he was released, and there was supposed to

1 be somebody in his cell, and there wasn't, and
2 he was taken out. He was alone that night, in
3 his cell. And so, other, like, just
4 evidentiary things, they report that he was
5 found unresponsive in his cell. And then was
6 taken to the hospital. He wasn't found
7 unresponsive. He was found dead. Okay?
8 Jeffrey was dead for a minimum of two hours
9 before they found him. And I will show you how
10 we know that.

11 MS. RICHMAN: Also, talk about the
12 description of the (Indiscernible *00:07:45).

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah, yeah, yeah. Yeah. A
14 whole bunch of things. I got -. I have a list
15 of the number of the photos. I left it at
16 home, unfortunately, but I will pull them up,
17 and have a look.

18 [REDACTED]: Now, are you going to
19 show us why you know that he was dead for at
20 least two hours?

21 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Yeah.

22 [REDACTED]: Okay.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: I'm going to get to that
24 picture. As soon as I can.

25 [REDACTED]: Just for the recording, I'm

1 just going to state that Mr. Epstein has his
2 own laptop, and he is providing us -. He is
3 just going to explain the pictures to us.

4 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

5 [REDACTED]: In your custody.

6 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Also, in the autopsy
7 --

8 MS. RICHMAN: And the picture is from the
9 autopsy.

10 [REDACTED]: From the autopsy.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Yeah. They also
12 found, you know, three broken bones in his
13 neck. Which is extremely rare to have one
14 broken bone, when you do what's called a soft
15 hanging. You have, like, Robin Williams hung
16 himself with a bathrobe thing. With the belt
17 thing. Those are soft hangings. You usually
18 don't break bones, and he had three breaks.
19 Which is one of the reasons they thought it was
20 more like a homicide. If you -.

21 [REDACTED]: So, what we're looking at
22 is, do you know which bones we're talking
23 about?

24 MR. EPSTEIN: It's the higher bone.
25 Something like the (Indiscernible *00:08:47),

1 is what it's called.

2 [REDACTED]: And did they ever --

3 MR. EPSTEIN: And it really isn't -.

4 [REDACTED]: discuss anything about
5 chest compressions? Would that potentially
6 have happened during CPR?

7 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

8 MS. RICHMAN: No.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: No. This is the neck.

10 MS. RICHMAN: Chest compressions are
11 lower.

12 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Chest compressions.
13 It can break ribs. Not the higher.

14 MS. RICHMAN: So.

15 MR. EPSTEIN: It felt pretty useful. See,
16 this is the camera that wasn't working.

17 [REDACTED]: Right.

18 MR. EPSTEIN: That would show him
19 (Indiscernible *00:09:09).

20 [REDACTED]: And they provide you with
21 all of this?

22 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

23 [REDACTED]: Okay.

24 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:09:24)
25 releases.

1 [REDACTED]: Really?

2 MS. RICHMAN: Mm-hmm.

3 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible

4 *00:09:28)?

5 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:09:28).

6 [REDACTED]: Oh, for the statement of
7 information in?

8 MS. RICHMAN: That was just released
9 (Indiscernible *00:09:33). And announced by
10 the (Indiscernible *00:09:39).

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Do you guys (Indiscernible
12 *00:09:40) with murder investigations? Is that
13 part of the normally? I mean, do you have,
14 like, any forensic experience on that?

15 [REDACTED]: So, our investigation
16 pertains to the death of --

17 MR. EPSTEIN: All right.

18 [REDACTED]: -- Jeffrey.
19 (Indiscernible *00:09:59).

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay. One thing I'll show
21 you now, before we get to, is that the only way
22 they was trying to say that, well, he put a
23 noose on his neck, and sort of jumped off the
24 top bunk. That would give him that breaks, or
25 it would be harsh. You know, like, if you saw

1 the Shawshank Redemption, when Brooks kicked
2 himself off the chair, you know, and fall down.
3 That's (Indiscernible *00:10:23), because it
4 has to be harsh like that. The top bunk in
5 Jeffrey's cell was filled with his medications
6 (Indiscernible *00:10:29). Nobody was on that
7 bunk. Nobody jumped off that bunk. I'm just
8 looking for the neck pictures. Also, let me go
9 back one second. Shit, I apologize for not
10 having that list.

11 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:10:54).

12 MR. EPSTEIN: Uh-huh. Also, what, another
13 question I have is, who was in charge in the
14 prison? Who -? First of all, they moved the
15 body, which you're not supposed to do. And
16 supposedly, they (Indiscernible *00:11:11), you
17 know, when they find a dead body in prison,
18 they're not supposed to move it. They're
19 supposed to get the Medical Examiner's Office,
20 so they can (Indiscernible *00:11:17) surprise.
21 I mean, they had it look like -. He was moved.
22 Now, if you saw the photographs, when they
23 took him out of the hospital, he was on a
24 gurney, and he was intubated. They were trying
25 to squeeze the tube with no air in it. It

1 said, he's dead for two hours. Why were they
2 trying to make it look like he was alive?
3 Like, these are -. The EMTs - and I would like
4 to talk to them - it's [REDACTED], and I
5 think it's [REDACTED] (Indiscernible *00:11:44), them
6 two EMTs. If I recall, they're the EMTs that
7 were actually in the cell.

8 [REDACTED]: Okay.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Now, just, let me go back
10 one second. Here is another picture of the top
11 bunk. You see, nobody was there. So, I would
12 like to talk to those two guys.

13 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: This is the noose. Right?
15 Look at that. When the guards found him, the
16 guy was (Indiscernible *00:12:10), he's saying
17 that he cut him down. And I think the guard
18 said Michael Thomas. The guard that found him.
19 He said he cut him down. Yeah. You see the
20 edge of his noose thing? That's a himmed edge.
21 That wasn't cut. Okay? If this was tied to
22 something, this would be wrinkled. It would be
23 marked from there, you know, like, here, you
24 see, like, creases in this part? There would
25 be something here, showing that this was tied

1 to something. Okay? Here is another question
2 I have. He was dead when they took him. When
3 they found him. And he was wearing - and I
4 checked through someone who was there, who said
5 that, I guess, what was he wearing in the cell?
6 And he was wearing his orange boxer shorts and
7 t-shirt. The prison clothing.

8 [REDACTED]: Okay.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: They take his dead body out.
10 And it was either, they cut the stuff off of
11 him, because I have pictures of the boxer
12 shorts cut. Who dressed the dead body with the
13 hospital gown? Okay. Dead bodies, you cover
14 with a sheet. He wasn't going to run down the
15 hall in the hospital, with his balls flapping
16 in the wind. He didn't have to hide. So, who
17 -? Who -? Now, I know that when they took him
18 to the hospital, there were four people in the
19 room, and somebody had a hand-held video. And,
20 like, and they were working down at the
21 hospital. Where is that tape?

22 [REDACTED]: Okay.

23 [REDACTED]: How do you know that?

24 MR. EPSTEIN: I was told that.

25 [REDACTED]: Okay. Also, there is a

1 question of, why was he moved? Because you
2 know, you know what (Indiscernible *00:13:57)
3 is?

4 [REDACTED]: Yes.

5 [REDACTED]: Yes.

6 MR. EPSTEIN: You know, you die, you fall
7 on your back, your gut turns purple, because
8 you (Indiscernible *00:14:02).

9 [REDACTED]: Okay.

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Now, he was moved. So, I
11 want to find out from Michael Thomas, what
12 position was Jeffrey in when he found him? And
13 I'll know the answer to that. Because he was
14 sitting, like, right by (Indiscernible
15 *00:14:14), you know, your ass in the back,
16 your legs are going to go, you know, if you're
17 leaning forward, doing it that way, but you
18 (Indiscernible *00:14:19) your legs are going
19 to go. You know, so, what position was he in?
20 After they found him --

21 [REDACTED]: So, you said Michael
22 Thomas made statements. Which statements are
23 (Indiscernible *00:14:28)?

24 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, he said he cut him
25 down.

1 [REDACTED]: Where did you get that
2 statement from?

3 MR. EPSTEIN: It was in the paper.

4 MS. RICHMAN: It was (Indiscernible
5 *00:14:31).

6 MR. EPSTEIN: That was that (Indiscernible
7 *00:14:32).

8 [REDACTED]: Like, recently, or was
9 that --

10 MR. EPSTEIN: No. NO.

11 [REDACTED]: -- at the time?

12 MR. EPSTEIN: At the time.

13 MS. RICHMAN: At the time.

14 [REDACTED]: Yeah, yeah.

15 MR. EPSTEIN: At the time.

16 [REDACTED]: They hadn't received the
17 statements from him then, did they?

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. He was (Indiscernible
19 *00:14:40) at the time, but, you know, he said,
20 I mean, that's what he said, he would cut him
21 down and said, you fucked up. Or you messed
22 up. You know, when the supervisor
23 (Indiscernible *00:14:46), he said he messed
24 up, he didn't do the checks. Or something to
25 that effect.

1 [REDACTED]: Okay.

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

3 [REDACTED]: But not, like, an
4 official report --

5 MR. EPSTEIN: I dont --

6 [REDACTED]: -- stating that?

7 MR. EPSTEIN: -- I don't. They don't show
8 me them.

9 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:14:57)
10 evidence from that prosecution.

11 [REDACTED]: Right, right.

12 MS. RICHMAN: That would be (Indiscernible
13 *00:15:00).

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

15 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:15:03).

16 MR. EPSTEIN: That's his neck. All right?
17 If I strangle you, now that, number one, does
18 not look like a sheet. It looks more like an
19 electric cord, because he had a CPAP machine in
20 this room, with an electric cord.

21 [REDACTED]: Okay.

22 MR. EPSTEIN: That does not look like a
23 sheet. Plus, if he had a sheet around his
24 neck, it would be discolored from the
25 secretions from his skin. Okay? Now, if I

1 strangle you, metaphorically, with an electric
2 (Indiscernible *00:15:26), okay? You won't get
3 a groove in your neck, because your internal
4 self pressure will flatten your skin back out.
5 Like, you might get a little abrasion mark, or
6 rub mark, but you won't get a groove stuck in
7 your neck. That takes at least two hours.
8 That's how we know he was dead for at least two
9 hours, because of that. Okay? That's
10 uncontroverted.

11 MS. RICHMAN: It's not consistent with
12 what you thought was demonstrated as the noose.

13 [REDACTED]: Right.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

15 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:15:52)
16 evidence with (Indiscernible *00:15:53)

17 MR. EPSTEIN: He could have been for six
18 hours. But a minimum of two. That's Dr.

19 [REDACTED], you know, opinion, which I take is
20 more of (Indiscernible *00:16:04), as opposed
21 to it. That's not a sheet. That looks more
22 like an electric cord. Also, you see these
23 marks above the groove line?

24 MS. RICHMAN: Uh-huh.

25 [REDACTED]: Okay.

1 MR. EPSTEIN: If you hang yourself, and
2 you put something around your neck, and you
3 hang yourself, okay, it's going to slip up.
4 It's going to go high on your neck. If
5 anything, the skin below that mark is going to
6 be abraded. Or roughed up. Because the nooses
7 don't (Indiscernible *00:16:27). You're not
8 going to get marks above your noose. That's -.
9 It won't go down. Your neck won't mark above
10 the noose. The noose line or whatever, the
11 ligature, whatever was used.

12 You know, where these marks above the
13 line. That means also, if you hang yourself,
14 that line goes up. It goes to your ears. You
15 strangle with a garrote, that's the more
16 straight back. I mean, the line goes all the
17 way back and that's what to expect. Okay? So,
18 here's the closer look. The better look.
19 That's not the noose, it's not a sheet doing
20 that. That's being abraded from that. Also,
21 his eyes. And I'm going to have pictures of
22 it. When you strangle, you know, the little
23 blood vessels in your eyes burst. The --

24 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:17:33).

25 MR. EPSTEIN: -- the tipia (Phonetic Sp.

1 *00:17:33), whatever, and it's exhibited here.
2 Also, he has a cut on his arm here. You know,
3 so, you can see the groove is in there. That
4 groove is not coming out. What number is that?
5 That may be the list. Hold on. Let's reboot.
6 [REDACTED]: When did you last - quick
7 question, you mentioned that you heard from
8 somebody that they had a (Indiscernible
9 *00:18:09) in your time at the hospital. Who
10 did you hear that from?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Do you have a specific name?

12 MR. EPSTEIN: No. Okay. This is the
13 (Indiscernible *00:18:50). Where is the little
14 (Indiscernible *00:18:56)? (Indiscernible
15 *00:19:05), because there's a cut on his lip
16 here. Look at that. There's a bruise on the
17 back of his neck here. Oh, there's another
18 question I had before I forget, is in the
19 paperwork, the last guards to see him was Tova
20 Noel and (Indiscernible *00:19:43). You see
21 here, it's like just a little (Indiscernible
22 *00:20:11). Another thing you should be
23 investigating, assuming he was killed, is
24 (Indiscernible *00:21:37). Because I was also
25 told this was through somebody who

1 (Indiscernible *00:21:47), through the
2 attorney, because somebody was under water, he
3 said that somebody was (Indiscernible
4 *00:21:47). So, you know, there is an old
5 saying that anyone can commit murder, but it
6 takes an artist to commit suicide. If this was
7 done, somebody who was put on that
8 (Indiscernible *00:22:07) to do this. Somebody
9 was (Indiscernible *00:22:12). He was killed,
10 you know, back to his cell, anyone else
11 (Indiscernible *00:22:15) after the fact, a lot
12 of times have been transferred off. Because if
13 someone was (Indiscernible *00:22:22) to do
14 this. I don't know if he's lost (Indiscernible
15 *00:22:23), find out who was on that cord, you
16 know, that was two weeks practically.

17 [REDACTED]: Who told you that someone
18 was (Indiscernible *00:22:29)?

19 MR. EPSTEIN: A journalist.
20 (Indiscernible *00:22:29). He lied.

21 [REDACTED]: Ah. Now, that is
22 something we would very much like to follow up
23 on (Indiscernible *00:22:41)? Was there any -?
24 Can you talk to someone about how that would
25 (Indiscernible *00:22:44), or not?

1 MR. EPSTEIN: I will ask, if I can get you
2 the (Indiscernible *00:22:48).

3 [REDACTED]: Okay.

4 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:22:52) it
5 was there at night. (Indiscernible *00:23:11).

6 MR. EPSTEIN: I've also heard that
7 there's, like, 20 plus guards that were, like,
8 there that, furlough, that haven't worked
9 since. (Indiscernible *00:23:24).

10 [REDACTED]: That's the same noose on the
11 floor?

12 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

13 MS. RICHMAN: Absolutely.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

15 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:23:35).
16 Back to the tier.

17 [REDACTED]: Okay.

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. That's -. Yeah.
19 Yeah. That's not cut. It's kind of
20 (Indiscernible *00:23:45). And it's not, you
21 know, I mean, it's pretty standard sizes, I
22 believe. And this would be discolored from the
23 secretions of his neck, (Indiscernible
24 *00:23:54). Things I will also tell you is
25 that, in 2016 election, my brother didn't tell

1 me why he (Indiscernible *00:24:08). What he
2 told me is he said what he knew about
3 (Indiscernible *00:24:10), Trump (Indiscernible
4 *00:24:13), because they would have to cancel
5 the election.

6 My brother is also (Indiscernible
7 *00:24:19). He's worked with Steve Bannon,
8 who's worked with (Indiscernible *00:24:19).
9 Steve Bannon has 16 hours of video tape.
10 (Indiscernible *00:24:27). I know this because
11 my brother said he worked with him. And on
12 that day, he said he stopped hanging out with
13 Trump, when he realized (Indiscernible
14 *00:24:37). In the papers, they're reading he
15 stopped hanging out with Trump, and, like, he
16 fell apart (Indiscernible *00:24:39). It was
17 bullshit. Everybody was, like, (Indiscernible
18 *00:24:44). He stopped hanging out with Trump
19 when he realized Trump was a dick. That's
20 exactly what he said. And I think
21 (Indiscernible *00:24:57). All right. And I
22 don't have any proof, but if this was a murder,
23 then the government would probably
24 (Indiscernible *00:25:05). And I know, also,
25 that hurting somebody else in a federal prison,

1 that the DEA agent transported to a maximum
2 security. He's a real bad ass and carried on,
3 and felt even worse. You know, he was brought
4 out to be (Indiscernible *00:25:21). They
5 handcuffed him before they uncuff him, and he
6 was a DEA agent who was getting the credibility
7 as a criminal, as a bad guy. A troublemaker.
8 (Indiscernible *00:25:30). So, it's justice
9 from, you can put people in prison that have
10 (Indiscernible *00:25:34).

11 [REDACTED]: Okay.

12 MR. EPSTEIN: That's (Indiscernible
13 *00:25:35). I was told that by somebody. So,
14 yeah. So, also, the thing I wanted to show you
15 here, the reason I - honestly, to be honest
16 with you - I think Trump is behind it. If
17 someone was closer on the inside told me Trump
18 (Indiscernible *00:25:53), after his death, you
19 know, someone who knows more about this shit
20 than I do.

21 [REDACTED]: Well, when you say that
22 Trump was a crook, or that your brother said
23 that he (Indiscernible *00:26:00), can you give
24 more information other than just that?

25 MR. EPSTEIN: No. He didn't tell me that,

1 but if you were a legal business man, you would
2 know that Trump is a crook. Everybody knows
3 trump is a crook. That's why no legitimate
4 real estate people would deal with him.

5 [REDACTED]: And when you say,
6 "Crook," though, can you just kind of -

7 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. He --

8 [REDACTED]: -- explain that.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: -- he robs people. He
10 probably close to the wealth he has comes from
11 the money he didn't pay people. He screwed
12 over, over and over. And he gets - pays them,
13 like, a percentage of what he owes them, they
14 sign non-disclosure agreements. That's how he
15 slides. And everybody knew that. Yeah.

16 [REDACTED]: All right.

17 (VIDEO PLAYS)

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Now, this video was from
19 before my brother's death. (Indiscernible
20 *00:26:49). But wait, I'm going to get to the
21 beginning of the part.

22 MS. RICHMAN: Some of the information
23 about that is also (Indiscernible *00:27:03),
24 when you were talking about (Indiscernible
25 *00:27:08).

1 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, let me see if I can
2 (Indiscernible *00:27:12). Oh, he asked them
3 (Indiscernible *00:27:17). All right. So,
4 this is before he died.

5 [REDACTED]: So, we're looking at --

6 MR. EPSTEIN: I've met Trump.

7 [REDACTED]: -- President Trump there,
8 as well as a news reporter.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: O'Reilly. Bill O'Reilly.

10 [REDACTED]: Bill O'Reilly.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: (Indiscernible *00:27:54).

12 [REDACTED]: Do you know when that was
13 done?

14 MR. EPSTEIN: It was prior to the death.
15 That was.

16 [REDACTED]: Prior to the death.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: But, you know, I mean,
18 personally, I think Trump was jealous that
19 people (Indiscernible *00:28:06), and wanted to
20 take that power. That's (Indiscernible
21 *00:28:09) to Trump. (Indiscernible
22 *00:28:14). You know?

23 MS. RICHMAN: I noticed that's not your
24 strongest argument.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: No. It's not my strongest

1 argument. It's, that's an opinion. Okay? But
2 this is my strongest argument.

3 [REDACTED]: So, when is the last time
4 you spoke with Jeffrey?

5 MR. EPSTEIN: The Thursday night before he
6 was arrested.

7 [REDACTED]: DO you remember around
8 when that date would have been?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. July 8th and 9th or
10 something.

11 [REDACTED]: Okay.

12 MR. EPSTEIN: On a Thursday night.

13 [REDACTED]: So, 2019?

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Yeah. It was right
15 before his death. So, he called me if he was
16 in Paris. He called me, just the usual, you
17 know, (Indiscernible *00:28:41). You know?
18 And then, the next day, he, you know, flew
19 back. And he was arrested that Friday.

20 (Indiscernible *00:28:50). Saturday morning,
21 his attorneys called me and told me he was
22 arrested.

23 [REDACTED]: And how often would you
24 talk with Jeffrey up until then?

25 MR. EPSTEIN: We would talk every couple

1 of weeks, or something like that. A week. A
2 month. That, you know, we emailed something.
3 Whatever. You know? Just keep trying, and I
4 keep telling him what's happening with the
5 family stuff, and we (Indiscernible *00:29:08)
6 stories. When - he used to hang out with Billy
7 Idol, though. So, he would tell me funny
8 things that we had on set. I guess Billy Idol
9 is a funny guy.

10 [REDACTED]: So --

11 MR. EPSTEIN: You know, we just use
12 (Indiscernible *00:29:17) other. Just keep
13 check.

14 [REDACTED]: -- I don't know where we
15 heard this information from, but I was told, I
16 was informed that you were estranged for, like,
17 a number of years. Is that not correct?

18 MR. EPSTEIN: No. No.

19 MS. RICHMAN: You hadn't seen him.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: I haven't seen him.

21 [REDACTED]: Okay.

22 MR. EPSTEIN: My mother died in 2004. Or
23 - yeah -. 2004. Since that time, maybe I saw
24 him a handful of times. And the last time was
25 seven years prior to his death.

1 [REDACTED]: Okay. SO, you hadn't
2 seen him for seven years --

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

4 [REDACTED]: -- but you spoke over the
5 telephone a number of few weeks?

6 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah, yeah. And emailed.
7 Yeah. Yeah.

8 [REDACTED]: Okay. And email?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. It's, like, for
10 instance, I mean, I have the email exchange,
11 and when he sent me the video clip, that back
12 (Indiscernible *00:29:52), you know? And I
13 asked him, you know, what was this for. You
14 know, and he said the (Indiscernible *00:30:00)
15 testimony. I said, you were subpoenaed?

16 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: He said, no. (Indiscernible
18 *00:30:03). He was just, he was doing stuff.
19 And, you know, he just, he said he, I thought
20 (Indiscernible *00:30:09), he thought I would
21 find it funny. I remember, it was, like, he
22 was had a beer in the video, and I've never
23 seen my brother with a beer before. So, I
24 wrote back. I said, the funniest part is, you
25 were with a beer. And he wrote back and he

1 said, that you could tell who I was? My
2 disguise didn't work? You know, it was just,
3 it was just banter between two brothers.

4 (Indiscernible *00:30:26).

5 [REDACTED]: So -.

6 MR. EPSTEIN: So, that was the last time I
7 spoke to him, was that Thursday night before he
8 was (Indiscernible *00:30:32).

9 [REDACTED]: Okay. Do you know
10 anything about his state of mind leading up to
11 --

12 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. I know who he spoke
13 to the day before he died.

14 [REDACTED]: And who did he speak
15 with?

16 MR. EPSTEIN: He spoke to someone who was
17 close to him. I mean, and they had
18 (Indiscernible *00:30:45). Not a clue
19 (Indiscernible *00:30:45) that this happened.
20 And most of his, one of the attorneys gave a
21 (Indiscernible *00:30:50) was publicly saying
22 that he spoke to Jeffrey, Jeffrey was very
23 upbeat. He also thought he had good taste,
24 using (Indiscernible *00:30:56) non-prosecution
25 agreement he had, from Florida, from years

1 back. So, and also, when Jeffrey was first
2 arrested, his attorneys called me and asked me
3 if I would, back and help him with his bail.

4 They said it's (Indiscernible *00:31:12)
5 other people, (Indiscernible *00:31:13)
6 participate in the bail. Because they should.
7 (Indiscernible *00:31:15). And then, Jeffrey
8 was not going to flee. He wasn't flee.
9 (Indiscernible *00:31:19). Not that he would
10 do that anyhow. Because he (Indiscernible
11 *00:31:23). And that's what put me on the map.
12 Most people didn't even know Jeff had a
13 brother.

14 [REDACTED]: Okay.

15 MR. EPSTEIN: We had a social life
16 together. And so, that's where my head, dating
17 back, you know, refer to it as a (Indiscernible
18 *00:31:36) proctologist. Every journalist on
19 the planet would (Indiscernible *00:31:38) to
20 try to find some dirt on me, to try to make me
21 tell this kind of stuff. (Indiscernible
22 *00:31:45). But yeah, he had two separate
23 lives. And so, bail was denied. And then, he
24 had a bail hearing coming up two days after he
25 died.

1 And this time - and he was pretty up,
2 like, you know, his jets, the house, those 100
3 million dollars' worth of stuff for the bail.
4 The highest bail in the United Sates ever was
5 100 million dollars. So, (Indiscernible
6 *00:32:09). But that's the highest bail they
7 ruled on. When they were going through the
8 appeal on the bail, his attorneys called me up
9 and they asked me if I would guarantee his
10 entire bail. And it has since doubled. And I
11 agreed to it.

12 ██████████: Okay.

13 MR. EPSTEIN: And so, there might have
14 been a chance he got bail in two days.

15 MS. RICHMAN: Right.

16 MR. EPSTEIN: And then, he would have been
17 under house arrest. He would have paid for
18 guards. They would have an ankle monitor.
19 Camera. Whatever it would take to do this all.
20 So, if you - and I think, you know, if he was
21 going to go take himself out, wait two fucking
22 days. You know, if you got bail, then you at
23 least, you're home for a year before the trial
24 comes up, if nothing else. (Indiscernible
25 *00:32:46). Doesn't make sense.

1 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

2 MR. EPSTEIN: If Jeffrey went. I don't
3 think Jeffrey would do that.

4 [REDACTED]: SO, you did actually
5 agree to the bail --

6 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

7 [REDACTED]: -- to (Indiscernible
8 *00:32:54) close to the bail?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

10 [REDACTED]: And that was two days
11 after he was found?

12 MR. EPSTEIN: No, no, no.

13 MS. RICHMAN: That's the day --

14 MR. EPSTEIN: The hearing was supposed to
15 -. I agree --

16 [REDACTED]: That's right.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: -- I agreed before he was
18 dead, but the hearing was supposed to take
19 place -. Like, he died, I think it was August
20 9th. Or something. The hearing was scheduled
21 for, like, 11th or something. There was, like,
22 a two-day gap.

23 [REDACTED]: And then, do you remember
24 how much the bail was?

25 MR. EPSTEIN: Close to 100 million.

1 [REDACTED]: It was close to 100?

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

3 [REDACTED]: Okay.

4 [REDACTED]: Still, just to clarify, you
5 mentioned 100 million dollar bail, and you
6 guaranteed it on top of it. So, that was
7 technically 200 million?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: Right. And his friend David
9 Mitchell put up some. I don't know how much
10 David put up. But he was also in the initial
11 pool at first, (Indiscernible *00:33:31) house.
12 IN Florida. David had also put up some
13 (Indiscernible *00:33:35). David Michell is
14 the one who -. The friend. And I heard he was
15 reaching, you know, (Indiscernible *00:33:40).

16 [REDACTED]: Now, as far as the person
17 that he - were you saying that he spoke with
18 someone on the telephone, prior to August 9th
19 or 10th?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: The night --

21 [REDACTED]: Or something.

22 MR. EPSTEIN: -- the evening before he
23 died, because it was (Indiscernible *00:33:54),
24 yeah.

25 [REDACTED]: And was that a female?

1 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes, it was.

2 [REDACTED]: And do you want to say
3 the name of it, and ask if that's correct.

4 [REDACTED]: Is the name [REDACTED]?

5 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

6 [REDACTED]: Is that who he spoke to?

7 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

8 [REDACTED]: And you spoke to -. Who is
9 [REDACTED] to Mr. Epstein?

10 MR. EPSTEIN: A friend.

11 [REDACTED]: A childhood friend, a long-
12 time friend?

13 MR. EPSTEIN: A number of years.

14 [REDACTED]: Were they in a relationship,
15 or -?

16 MR. EPSTEIN: His exact nature of it, I
17 don't know, because I didn't know of her. But
18 I know she's been -. I just found out she was
19 in the picture a number of years. I believe
20 eight years.

21 [REDACTED]: In a romantic relationship?

22 MR. EPSTEIN: I believe so. Yeah.

23 MS. RICHMAN: But you didn't know
24 confirmation? You had, like -.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: I can't ask Jeff.

1 MS. RICHMAN: Right. Obviously.

2 [REDACTED]: Have you spoken with her?

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

4 [REDACTED]: And did she say that they
5 were in a romantic relationship?

6 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. (Indiscernible
7 *00:34:44).

8 [REDACTED]: She did?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: I believe it to be so, and I
10 found pictures.

11 [REDACTED]: And have you seen -?
12 Have you spoken with her since August 9, 2019?

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes. Yes.

14 [REDACTED]: Did she tell you what the
15 conversation, took place during (Indiscernible
16 *00:34:55)?

17 MR. EPSTEIN: He said he was -. It
18 sounded upbeat, and is that she didn't think he
19 committed suicide. It was -. It didn't sound
20 like he was going to do that.

21 [REDACTED]: But did she say anything
22 that they talked about, though?

23 MR. EPSTEIN: No. I didn't want to get
24 too personal. And, you know, at the time it wa
25 , like, you know, my brother is dead, I

1 (Indiscernible *00:35:08) conversation that I
2 need to know. You know?

3 [REDACTED]: When did you speak with
4 her?

5 MR. EPSTEIN: A number of times since
6 then.

7 [REDACTED]: Okay. But when you
8 specifically talked about the conversation that
9 she had with Jeffrey, (Indiscernible
10 *00:35:18)?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: That was -. I don't
12 remember the exact date. But I think it was
13 just a few weeks of the death.

14 [REDACTED]: Okay. But she didn't
15 tell you anything specifically why he contacted
16 her, or what they spoke about?

17 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

18 [REDACTED]: No. Just that he sounded
19 upbeat?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. He was. Yeah.
21 That's, like, she made (Indiscernible
22 *00:35:41).

23 [REDACTED]: Okay.

24 [REDACTED]: Was she surprised that he
25 called her?

1 MR. EPSTEIN: I don't -. I don't know if
2 -. I don't know. To be honest with you. I
3 didn't ask her that much. She didn't say, oh,
4 shit, yeah, I didn't get any kind of reaction
5 from her. (Indiscernible *00:35:41)

6 [REDACTED]: All right.

7 [REDACTED]: Do you know if Jeffrey
8 changed his will leading up to August 9th?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: I was told he changed his
10 will. He did. Now, traditionally, my brother
11 and I were not in each other's wills. Because
12 I don't need his money, he don't need my money.
13 So, he changed the will, from my understanding.
14 Now, I'm not the executive of his estate. It
15 has nothing to do with his estate. The
16 executives don't even talk to me.

17 (Indiscernible *00:36:23) or anything. But
18 from what I understand, all of his assets were
19 put into a trust. Or they were supposed to be
20 put into a trust, after Jeffrey died. And they
21 paid out all the money to the victims, and his
22 (Indiscernible *00:36:35). And the trust
23 dictates what happens to his money. I'm not
24 the trustee and I'm not privy to his trust.

25 [REDACTED]: Who did you hear it from,

1 that he put it in the will? He changed his
2 will.

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, it was public
4 knowledge. Yeah. And his attorneys also told
5 me that he changed his will. But this is in
6 the papers. This was (Indiscernible
7 *00:36:55). And he was trying to use that as,
8 well, he was contemplating suicide. I think
9 maybe he was contemplating being killed in
10 prison and wanted to make sure that his will
11 was up to date. I don't think it was fear -.
12 I don't think it was fear of suicide. I think,
13 you know, I don't think he was planning
14 suicide. I think anything, he was
15 (Indiscernible *00:37:14) about being in
16 prison. (Indiscernible *00:37:16) stories.

17 [REDACTED]: And do you know anything
18 about him, like, being placed on suicide watch,
19 and taken off? Do you know anything -?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. He was placed on
21 suicide watch, and he was taken off. Exactly
22 the reasons? I don't know. They never told
23 me.

24 [REDACTED]: Do you know if anyone
25 from the outside, such as his attorneys, or

1 anybody like that, called anyone to ask him to
2 be taken off of suicide watch?

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Only what was in the papers.
4 So --

5 [REDACTED]: Okay.

6 MR. EPSTEIN: -- so, I don't have any
7 first-hand knowledge of it.

8 [REDACTED]: And you've never gotten
9 to speak to his attorneys? They never
10 disclosed the information?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Not very much. No. Hmm-mm.

12 [REDACTED]: Okay. So, just the
13 papers. Other than having that conversation
14 with (Indiscernible *00:37:53), have you spoken
15 with anyone on the outside?

16 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

17 [REDACTED]: Right?

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Oh, so, David Shone
19 (Phonetic Sp. *00:37:56), the attorney, who was
20 going to go ask me, because he also said that
21 (Indiscernible *00:38:01) suicide. Yeah. I
22 was surprised because he felt -. He said Jeff
23 felt positive about the defense they were going
24 to go with, you know, in the prosecution.

25 [REDACTED]: And David Shone met them on

1 Friday?

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Excuse me?

3 [REDACTED]: You mentioned a David Shone
4 met with them on Friday.

5 MR. EPSTEIN: No, no, no, no, no. David
6 Shone, had met with him in jail, I think,
7 before he died. Not that day. I think it was
8 before.

9 [REDACTED]: You mentioned something about
10 a non-prosecution from Florida. Can you
11 explain that?

12 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. In 2006, I think it
13 was, when he first got in trouble in Florida,
14 you know, when he got back whatever, he got his
15 sweetheart deal. Which I was told, he got a
16 sweetheart deal because the girls that were
17 planning to be victims were actually -
18 determined to be very unreliable witnesses.
19 Because they found their Facebook pages with
20 drugs and sex. And one of the girls was a
21 prostitute and a mother, you know, all kinds of
22 -.

23 These are not clean-cut little Catholic
24 school girls. You know, so, he got - made the
25 deal back in 2006, and part of the deal was he

1 had to sign the prosecution agreement for him
2 and the other unnamed individuals. I don't
3 know. It's -. And that's what he was living
4 on ever since. You know, just, there was this
5 note, from what I understand, I haven't seen
6 any evidence that he was with underage women.
7 At that point in time. Like, get out of jail,
8 and then, you know, 13 months never see that.
9 (Indiscernible *00:39:23).

10 He got a house. You know, he got a -.
11 (Indiscernible *00:39:29). He got a good deal.
12 After that, I mean, we used to - there's a
13 joke. You know, and I told him, you know, I'm
14 his brother and said, some passports scare him,
15 (Indiscernible *00:39:39). So, a girl comes
16 in, wants to show him that she's in the estate
17 team. Yeah, you have -. You know, we're
18 joking around. So, and as far as I know, there
19 have been no claims of him being with underage
20 women. And all the stuff that he, well, I
21 don't think it's the case, but yes.

22 [REDACTED]: You mentioned the non-
23 prosecution agreement, as the fact that he
24 believed he was getting out of prison.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: No, no. He got out of

1 prison. He served his time he was sentenced
2 to. But at that time - and this is public - he
3 had a non-prosecution agreement with the
4 federal government. You know, the same one,
5 that was the southern district, or whatever,
6 what Florida park, or I don't know, the, like,
7 the lingo. I don't get in trouble, so I'm not
8 up on the (Indiscernible *00:40:21). You know,
9 and, you know, as far as I know, this one is
10 federal government.

11 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
12 *00:40:24)

13 MR. EPSTEIN: And if you make a deal in a
14 non-prosecution agreement, with the federal
15 government, well, that's the federal
16 government. It's not like the New York people,
17 federal here have the right to (Indiscernible
18 *00:40:33) Greenland.

19 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Greenland.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: So, was it, why was it your
21 SD? You know, another theory about that --

22 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: -- okay, is that in the
24 screen, before he was arrested, one of the
25 victims went to the FBI, and said that she was

1 in his house, it was down on First Street, and
2 he had this expensive camera system, and boom,
3 boom, boom, go to the bathroom, all this kind
4 of stuff. Now, the one thing about Jeffrey is
5 that Jeffrey was a bullshitter. He would say
6 things just to be provocative.

7 Now, he had a very extensive video room,
8 when we first walk into the house on the right.
9 Because I was there years ago. With lots of
10 monitors. But they were all on the outside of
11 the building, for security. And inside the
12 front door, and inside the backdoor. There
13 wasn't cameras throughout the house. And I've
14 spoken with people who knew the house, people
15 who worked at the house. And they, like I
16 said, that extensive video system, that house
17 didn't exist.

18 But the FBI got this information that it
19 did. And then, a few months later, he gets
20 arrested, and they break into his house with a
21 search warrant, and I would like to see that
22 search warrant. This is what -. Because in
23 the search warrant, you have to state what
24 you're looking for. Right? You can't use it
25 as a fishing net to -. So, what is it they

1 were looking for? Because they broke into his
2 house, and they cut the safe open. But you
3 heard that he had about \$70,000 in cash, and
4 diamonds.

5 Well, he's a very wealthy man. He does
6 not have cash and diamonds. You know, and he
7 had some expired, old passport for some
8 (Indiscernible *00:41:55). (Indiscernible
9 *00:41:57) long story for that. But what were
10 they looking for? Who was (Indiscernible
11 *00:42:00) to get into this house to look for -
12 ? Who were they looking for? Are they looking
13 for the tapes of somebody on the street? They
14 had some tapes. They're not exist. Which
15 didn't exist.

16 And then, he was arrested, and you know,
17 it's cool. And like I said, he set you up as a
18 crook. I said, he had enough word on both gang
19 weights to have the election cancelled in 2016.
20 This doesn't alleviate -. If you forget
21 everything else, everything I showed you here,
22 and everything you know now, would you just
23 say, yes, it was a suicide? I wouldn't. And
24 not because - like I said - not because I'm his
25 brother. It just doesn't add up as a suicide.

1 Like I said, and trust me, if he committed
2 suicide, my life would have been a lot easier
3 this time.

4 I've had death threats, I've been in touch
5 with the FBI and NYPD for those two years. And
6 I have hired armed guards for. When I met with
7 Steve Bannon, after I saw the tape that my
8 brother sent me after his death, I contacted
9 Steve Bannon, and I'm (Indiscernible *00:43:02)
10 what this is about. You know? And I know that
11 Bannon, I actually had a (Indiscernible
12 *00:43:07). I didn't, because I didn't know
13 who was (Indiscernible *00:43:11). I knew him
14 walking to a hotel, and be taking out the
15 garbage (Indiscernible *00:43:13), like the
16 show, you know?

17 And armed guards. And Bannon's told me
18 about the 16 hours of tape, and he told me that
19 the -. He said that the tape should protect
20 him, and that by attorney/client privilege, as
21 witnessed preparation. But Bannon is not an
22 attorney.

23 [REDACTED]: And which tapes are we
24 talking about right now?

25 MR. EPSTEIN: The 16 hours of video tape

1 interviews that (Indiscernible *00:43:33) with
2 my brother.

3 [REDACTED]: Off of what we've talked
4 about, at least thus far, who do you think we
5 should speak with, that would have the
6 firsthand knowledge, that would be willing to
7 speak with us?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, I think you should
9 talk to the guards. The EMT guards. [REDACTED]
10 [REDACTED], and I think it's [REDACTED]
11 (Phonetic Sp. *00:43:52). Or something
12 [REDACTED]. Those are the two EMT guards.

13 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Find out from them who was
15 directing the operations in the prison. Why
16 did they move the body out when they weren't
17 supposed to move the body out? Who was
18 directing them? Who was there?

19 [REDACTED]: Okay.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: And then, in the hospital,
21 when he was there, I mean, I don't know, do the
22 fire department guys wear body cameras?

23 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

24 MR. EPSTEIN: EMTs? I don't know. You
25 know, but in a - like I said - there was a

1 handful camera in the hospital, when they took
2 him, there were four people there. Two EMTs
3 and two other people, and someone would have a
4 video camera of that. And why did they dress
5 him in a hospital gown?

6 [REDACTED]: Okay.

7 MR. EPSTEIN: You know, why are they
8 trying to make him look -? Like, Bannon told
9 me there is a prison culture here. Nobody dies
10 in prison. You know, they find a dead body,
11 they ship them to the hospital, and it's
12 declared dead in the hospital. That's
13 traditional in the prison system. Because they
14 don't want to deal with the dead body in
15 prison. And that seems to be (Indiscernible
16 *00:44:52), as well. But what are they trying
17 to, you know, to take him out, trying to
18 intubate him. These guys are trained. Yeah,
19 now they know he's not coming back.

20 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

21 MR. EPSTEIN: So, why this charade? And
22 why are we in here, there was a camera guy
23 there. Right? Who took the photographs. You
24 got people questioning, how did he know to be
25 there?

1 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Why was he there by the
3 prison early that morning, to take photographs
4 and (Indiscernible *00:45:16), no doubt.

5 [REDACTED]: Which camera guy are you
6 talking about?

7 MS. RICHMAN: The guy that had
8 (Indiscernible *00:45:19) poster.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. I knew his name.
10 [REDACTED] (Phonetic Sp. *00:45:25). I believe
11 it was [REDACTED] [REDACTED].

12 [REDACTED]: He was at the hospital,
13 or he was at the prison?

14 MR. EPSTEIN: At the prison.

15 MS. RICHMAN: At MCC.

16 [REDACTED]: Okay.

17 [REDACTED]: When Mr. Epstein was being
18 rolled out?

19 MS. RICHMAN: Yup.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. He's on the gurney,
21 and he's covered in a sheet. They have a neck
22 brace on him, and they -. He's intubated.
23 They have a thing down his throat, and that
24 squeezing one of those, the A balloons, to try
25 to get air into his lungs. Yeah. Which you

1 use on, like, drowning victims, and
2 (Indiscernible *00:45:51).

3 So, I was, like, why, you know, why this
4 charade? And also, from the time they got
5 there, they took him down, there's no pulse.
6 Obviously. He's not breathing. You know, the
7 body can only last a few minutes under that
8 condition. So, what -? They got up there. He
9 was found dead, you know, they do whatever they
10 do in there, they cut him open, they try to
11 defibrillate him. Right? Because that's the
12 thing on the other picture, the defibrillator
13 angle. And there's electric cord in the room
14 because he slept with a CPAP machine.

15 Which, I didn't know he used one. But
16 turns out he did. And he was in the room with
17 his electric cord. You know, and, oh, in the
18 photographs, let me see if I can find this
19 photo here.

20 ██████████: Why are you looking that up?
21 I know, you might have answered this. Did you
22 have any communications with him when he was in
23 prison?

24 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

25 ██████████: Did he email you, or call you

1 --

2 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

3 [REDACTED]: -- anything like that?

4 MR. EPSTEIN: Nope.

5 [REDACTED]: What about any other family
6 members?

7 [REDACTED]: As [REDACTED] said, did he
8 contact anybody -?

9 [REDACTED]: Did he contact any of the
10 family members?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: No. And there's no one in
12 the family.

13 [REDACTED]: So, you don't know
14 anybody, aside from his attorneys,
15 (Indiscernible *00:46:52) who spoke to
16 (Indiscernible *00:46:53) on his night, or
17 spoke to (Indiscernible *00:46:54)?

18 MR. EPSTEIN: No. No.

19 [REDACTED]: He spoke with you?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: I sent him a letter in
21 prison. I have no idea if he ever got it.
22 (Indiscernible *00:47:00).

23 [REDACTED]: In terms of siblings, you
24 were the only sibling?

25 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

1 [REDACTED]: The parents?

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Deceased.

3 [REDACTED]: Deceased.

4 [REDACTED]: Okay.

5 MR. EPSTEIN: My father died in '91. 30
6 years ago. And my mother died in 2004.

7 [REDACTED]: 2004?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: 2004.

9 [REDACTED]: Okay.

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah, they were older. It
11 was right around when Jeff first got in trouble
12 in 2006. He called me, and asked me if I'm at
13 his house, which is, you know, like, after my
14 mother died, I moved back, (Indiscernible
15 *00:47:33), because most of our communications,
16 it seems Jeff was rather (Indiscernible
17 *00:47:36), health issues, and being close to
18 the family. Like, he called me to his house,
19 because he wanted to tell me himself that he
20 was getting in trouble. You know, for
21 (Indiscernible *00:47:47). And the first thing
22 I said to him, I said, well, (Indiscernible
23 *00:47:50) mom's dead. It's looking like
24 they're about to kill her. (Indiscernible
25 *00:47:53) some issues. So.

1 [REDACTED]: How long did you take
2 care -? So, you said that you had ghosted a
3 large part of (Indiscernible *00:48:04) life.
4 (Indiscernible *00:48:06). And how much do you
5 (Indiscernible *00:48:11)?

6 MR. EPSTEIN: You can hold - whatever his
7 bail was.

8 [REDACTED]: And (Indiscernible
9 *00:48:13)?

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, his bail, his bail
11 itself was 100, plus 100 million. Somewhere in
12 that. I don't know the exact number. No. But
13 whatever it was, I paid them.

14 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Okay.

15 MR. EPSTEIN: I have his (Indiscernible
16 *00:48:22).

17 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
18 *00:48:23).

19 MR. EPSTEIN: Mm-hmm.

20 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible *00:48:26)
21 the house in Florida?

22 MR. EPSTEIN: The house in Florida is a
23 small part.

24 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:48:30).

25 MR. EPSTEIN: Technically the first bail

1 he called me and asked me if I would
2 participate in his bail, because he's
3 explaining that it's a better show if other
4 people are willing to (Indiscernible
5 *00:48:39).

6 [REDACTED]: Okay.

7 MR. EPSTEIN: So, I said, sure, put in my
8 house in Florida.

9 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
10 *00:48:45)?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: That's worth \$200,000.
12 That's not (Indiscernible *00:48:48). And
13 then, come the appeal. You know,
14 (Indiscernible *00:48:54) days, but prior to
15 his death. They called me and they explained
16 that, you know, they're going to this appeal,
17 and he was pretty much, you know, at the house,
18 which you can find (Indiscernible *00:49:01)
19 house. I think he was in jail for
20 (Indiscernible *00:49:05), you know, a couple,
21 close to 100 nights. They asked me if I would
22 guarantee his (Indiscernible *00:49:10). I
23 said yes. So, I don't remember the exact
24 number, but he wasn't worried about it.
25 Because like I said --

1 [REDACTED]: No, no, no. I'm just --

2 MR. EPSTEIN: -- I'm just going to show
3 up.

4 [REDACTED]: -- for (Indiscernible
5 *00:49:19), especially when we had heard that
6 you guys are estranged, but if I can say my
7 guess would be that you actually weren't, and
8 you actually agreed to post the bail, and
9 (Indiscernible *00:49:28) how much money was
10 it?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Up to, it was somewhere in
12 the range of 100 million.

13 [REDACTED]: Okay. You got that type
14 of money?

15 MR. EPSTEIN: (Indiscernible *00:49:40).
16 You'll see. Mm-hmm.

17 [REDACTED]: But you mentioned
18 another. There was one other person, I thought
19 you said, that was also involved?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. David Mitchell.
21 That's (Indiscernible *00:49:50).

22 [REDACTED]: Just the two of you?

23 MR. EPSTEIN: As far as I know, yeah.
24 That's the only people I've ever known. Yeah.

25 MS. RICHMAN: I don't know if that bail

1 application was final. It might be
2 (Indiscernible *00:49:58).

3 [REDACTED]: Okay.

4 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay. Give me
5 (Indiscernible *00:50:10) for this.

6 [REDACTED]: And it was Jeffrey's lawyers
7 that reached out to you about that?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, the one lawyer [REDACTED]
10 [REDACTED], he works in prison (Indiscernible
11 *00:50:30). He (Indiscernible *00:50:31).

12 [REDACTED]: Okay.

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Actually, yeah, a long time
14 ago. Like, 30 years ago. He worked in a law
15 firm, and Jeffrey and I both used that law
16 firm. I used it for law stuff. (Indiscernible
17 *00:50:41). Always there. But I haven't seen
18 him in a very long time. Until this
19 (Indiscernible *00:50:48). So, he might be
20 personal. Yeah. Okay. In these pictures,
21 he's by the cell. You see this electric cord
22 here is, like, in the room access. He would
23 have to have the door, the door swung open, and
24 the electric cord was there. That was I think
25 his defibrillator or something. And I've seen

1 that machine. But you could see there is an
2 electric cord. In that picture of the electric
3 cord. (Indiscernible *00:52:22). What is
4 that? Yeah, and in the picture I'm looking
5 for, it shows that electric cord, really. It's
6 plugged into the extension on the other side of
7 the door. So, it was obviously moved.

8 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
9 *00:53:13).

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Let me go back. Let
11 me get rid of this and go back. It says
12 (Indiscernible *00:53:23).

13 [REDACTED]: Okay. Are these for
14 scenes for us, (Indiscernible *00:53:27)?

15 MR. EPSTEIN: No. This is my only copy of
16 these.

17 [REDACTED]: Okay.

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay. Here. Oh. Oh,
19 fucking hell. All right. You see here, the
20 electric cord is on the outside of the room.
21 And the other picture, the door was opened, and
22 this knot and stuff was on the inside of the
23 door. So, somebody moved that for some reason.
24 Because he didn't (Indiscernible *00:53:54).
25 And it's just, like, a discrepancy

1 (Indiscernible *00:53:59).

2 [REDACTED]: I see.

3 MR. EPSTEIN: And supposedly, there was a
4 lot of activity after he was gone. At least
5 that you can see in the picture.

6 [REDACTED]: So, it's always good for
7 us to have (Indiscernible *00:54:10), along
8 with the photographs, and perhaps the
9 (Indiscernible *00:54:12).

10 MR. EPSTEIN: I can make copies and send
11 it to you.

12 [REDACTED]: Oh my, that would be
13 great.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: No problem.

15 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
16 *00:54:18).

17 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

18 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *00:54:19).

19 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah, give me your cards,
20 and I'll send you --

21 [REDACTED]: Okay.

22 MR. EPSTEIN: -- so you guys can --.

23 [REDACTED]: Okay. Well, if there is
24 anything (Indiscernible *00:54:26), if there's
25 something else that we're missing,

1 (Indiscernible *00:54:32).

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

3 [REDACTED]: Just let us know.

4 [REDACTED]: When you first started

5 (Indiscernible *00:54:39), were you aware that

6 Mr. Epstein went through his life, he

7 (Indiscernible *00:54:43) with his life, you

8 didn't seem surprised. Were you surprised?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: I wasn't surprised. I'm
10 pretty level-headed. You know? So, I don't -.
11 So, these don't surprise me. I've seen a lot
12 of shit in my life. You know? I haven't been
13 in the military, but military people have told
14 me I should have been in the military. Because
15 I'm always the one with the cool head, you
16 know, when all shit breaks loose. So, I wasn't
17 surprised. It was a little bit shocking that
18 he was dead. But like I said, I assumed, okay,
19 you heard on CNN that he committed suicide.
20 So, you originally you don't have reason to
21 question.

22 You just assume that that's the case. I
23 mean, that and the reason that he committed
24 suicide. And I - again - knowing, you know,
25 that he was potentially facing the long term

1 prison sentence, he didn't have kids to worry
2 about. He didn't have to worry about me. Our
3 parents are dead. There's no other relative
4 that he was close to. In that way. So, I
5 assumed, okay. That's what he did. You know?
6 But as I finished my breakfast, you know, it's
7 -. But, you know, I didn't, and like I said, I
8 assumed if that was his choice, then I respect
9 that.

10 Because, look, if I was in his shoes, I
11 have kids, you know, like I said, if I didn't
12 have kids, and I was potentially facing what I
13 did, you know, we're not religious people, you
14 know, we were both raised atheists. So, you
15 know, we don't have that kind of fears or
16 anything. Yeah, I might choose to take myself
17 out. But I would certainly wait for the bail
18 hearing to pass. That's what (Indiscernible
19 *00:56:18). And Jeffrey wasn't a stupid man.
20 So, you know, I'm sure he would wait for that,
21 as well. Because it doesn't make sense to kill
22 himself two days before a bail hearing, where
23 your bail is going to be the highest bail ever
24 in the United States, with a guarantee.
25 ██████████: I know you mentioned you

1 didn't communicate with him after his arrest,
2 his last arrest in July, but before that, did
3 he ever mention about possibly committing
4 suicide? Was he ever depressed?

5 MR. EPSTEIN: No. Never. Never. Never.
6 No.

7 [REDACTED]: Did he ever show any
8 tendencies towards wanting to take his life?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Never. Never. No. That
10 wasn't him. He had no reason to. He had,
11 like, the -. He had a life that you and me, go
12 anywhere we want. He had more money than God.
13 He did what he wanted. You know, if he wanted
14 to do it with me, if he had yes people
15 surrounding him, who catered his eye way.

16 [REDACTED]: Right.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: Flying around on his private
18 jets. He has the (Indiscernible *00:57:08) all
19 over the place. Lots of women. You know? He
20 doesn't -. Side story. My mother was
21 (Indiscernible *00:57:14), you know, obviously,
22 you're going to settle down. And I said to
23 her, I said, he hasn't settled down because if
24 he found a quality woman to settle down with,
25 instead of these bimbos that he's hanging out

1 with, she would eventually say, you know, why
2 don't we do this instead of that. That was
3 what he wanted. I said, and that's why she
4 gets shown the door. Because he didn't want to
5 do anything that he didn't want to do. That
6 was -. And he was able to have his life that
7 way. There was no reason for him to kill
8 himself or think about killing himself.

9 [REDACTED]: Now --

10 MR. EPSTEIN: He was healthy. He wasn't
11 facing any medical issues, or whatever. You
12 know, (Indiscernible *00:57:44). Mm-hmm.

13 [REDACTED]: -- being his brother, and
14 knowing him the way you do, do you think that
15 the bail, if he was actually going to be
16 released, would he have any fear of being out
17 in public, because people then now perceiving
18 him a certain way?

19 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, he had that whole
20 thing from 2006. He's been shunned by, you
21 know, society since that first thing in 2006.
22 You know, like, when he's in business, he used
23 to, you know, handle the (Indiscernible
24 *00:58:12). That's where he made a lot of his
25 money. You know what I'm saying, with the

1 (Indiscernible *00:58:15).

2 So, Wexlon (Phonetic Sp. *00:58:18)
3 distanced himself from that. Because, you
4 know, people would be seeing the old Jeffrey
5 Epstein, because of his initial thing in 2006.
6 In that period of time. So, yeah. So, he
7 already went through that shunning, you know,
8 and, you know, it is what it was. He was
9 trying to rehabilitate his reputation, at the
10 time.

11 That's why Bannon was helping him.
12 Because Bannon was going to come out with
13 another story. And there's another, there's
14 people from Australia - and you'll see soon in
15 the papers - that they're coming out with a
16 whole story about this case, with Ghislaine
17 Maxwell, and the brother, and these victims,
18 who they're claiming, we're not really victims.
19 You know? You know, that these are just, as my
20 mother used to say, good time Charlies.

21 Girls looking for a good time. You know,
22 if it was so victim-ish, you know, then how
23 come all these girls brought their friends to
24 participate in these parties? There was an
25 interview on TV, last year. It was set in

1 Britain. Some British woman who (Indiscernible
2 *00:59:11) and my brother, who had been to some
3 of the dinner parties, at my brother's house.
4 And so, you know, and she started saying, there
5 were two journalists, (Indiscernible
6 *00:59:21). She started saying how these girls
7 were not victims. You know, they were enjoying
8 the high life.

9 Flying around in private jets. Being in
10 these amazing homes. I mean, his house
11 (Indiscernible *00:59:29) pays him, you know?
12 And then, and when she started turning the tide
13 on these poor victims, the journalist shut it
14 down. Because at the time, nobody wants to
15 hear anything positive about Jeff. Nobody
16 wants to hear anything negative about his
17 victims. You know? You know, Jeff was just
18 enjoying the time. You know?

19 [REDACTED]: Do you know if he was
20 aware that you'll put it up, and agree to be
21 the guarantee, guarantor?

22 MR. EPSTEIN: Uh.

23 [REDACTED]: For the bail.

24 MR. EPSTEIN: I think his attorneys told
25 him that. Yeah.

1 [REDACTED]: Same thing with David
2 Mitchell. You think the attorneys screwed
3 (Indiscernible *01:00:03)?

4 MR. EPSTEIN: I would imagine so. Yeah.

5 [REDACTED]: Okay.

6 MS. RICHMAN: You can check the MCC
7 records that he was meeting with his attorneys
8 all day, and (Indiscernible *01:00:13) the
9 entire day. Every day.

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

11 MS. RICHMAN: Because all of the rest of
12 us had to wait, because you couldn't see
13 anybody else from the SHU.

14 [REDACTED]: Hmm.

15 MR. EPSTEIN: (Indiscernible *01:00:25).
16 Also, when a - a couple - the weeks before he
17 died, he had that incident with [REDACTED].
18 His cellmate at the time.

19 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: There's conflicting stories,
21 about it, you know, David Shone said that - and
22 publicly - that [REDACTED] attacked him, one
23 afternoon, and was trying to say that was,
24 like, the suicide attempt. So, who knows where
25 it took place. Or if [REDACTED] attacked him.

1 And then, [REDACTED] was still on the tier.

2 (Indiscernible *01:00:55).

3 [REDACTED]: Now, do you know if
4 Jeffrey spoke at all with anyone -. If his
5 attorneys know anything about Epstein being
6 attacked by [REDACTED]?

7 MR. EPSTEIN: David Shone is the one that
8 would talk to me about that.

9 [REDACTED]: So, that's -.

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Like I said, his attorneys
11 don't give me very much information on that. I
12 was involved in the case. And that
13 (Indiscernible *01:01:16) in place, and you
14 don't see the name anywhere. Yes.

15 [REDACTED]: But that Jeffrey
16 specifically told him that, is what you're
17 saying, or he --

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Yes.

19 [REDACTED]: -- just heard of that?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: No, no. He -. David Shone
21 met with Jeffrey in jail. And that's why David
22 Shone said that Jeffrey was upbeat about the
23 defense.

24 [REDACTED]: Okay.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: You know, relying on another

1 prosecution. Oh, that's what got Bill Cosby
2 out, right? Another prosecution, a non-
3 disclosure agreement, yeah. Which I believe is
4 the defense that Ghislaine Maxwell is
5 (Indiscernible *01:01:41), you know, but I'm
6 not an attorney, and they charge a
7 (Indiscernible *01:01:44).

8 [REDACTED]: Right.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Mm-hmm.

10 MS. RICHMAN: Okay.

11 [REDACTED]: Anything else that we
12 know about, or follow up with?

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Like I said, like, I would
14 like to talk to the, you know, who were the
15 unnamed guards, number one and number two. You
16 know, a list of people in the tier. Michael
17 Thomas found him in the morning. So, he was in
18 there, assuming that Barr was right and nobody
19 went in and out. Like I said, if he was going
20 to be killed, nobody would go in and out to
21 kill him, right? All right. How you going to
22 do that? (Indiscernible *01:02:13) but if you
23 plan something, you know, to kill him. You
24 know, that's how you commit suicide. That's a
25 lot of things, a suicide.

1 [REDACTED]: Prior to getting
2 murdered?

3 MR. EPSTEIN: No. He wasn't. He was
4 murdered.

5 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
6 *01:02:28).

7 MR. EPSTEIN: But the dude who murdered
8 make it look like a suicide. That's the
9 (Indiscernible *01:02:31).

10 [REDACTED]: Oh. I got it. I
11 understand what you're saying. All right. So,
12 yeah, from you, or anything that we've
13 discussed, (Indiscernible *01:02:39), if you
14 want us to attach that video --

15 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

16 [REDACTED]: -- as well as the
17 photographs, and the recording --

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

19 [REDACTED]: -- you can just send it
20 to us through your attorney.

21 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

22 [REDACTED]: And I'm grateful
23 (Indiscernible *01:02:47) that we can have
24 other stuff to follow up on.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

1 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible

2 *01:02:50).

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. So, the guards. Who
4 the guards were -. Like I said, I wouldn't
5 mind talking to Michael Thomas, and finding out
6 what position was Jeffrey in when he first saw
7 him. When he first found him. That's very
8 crucial. What position Jeffrey was in when
9 Michael found him.

10 [REDACTED]: Mm-hmm.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: The video tape in the
12 hospital. You know, with the (Indiscernible
13 *01:03:15), the FD and line guys, that we both
14 talk, I tried to go down to the station --

15 [REDACTED]: Uh-huh.

16 MR. EPSTEIN: -- or the SHU, yeah,
17 (Indiscernible *01:03:25) around, talk to them.
18 And I'm (Indiscernible *01:03:24).

19 [REDACTED]: Who won't talk to you?

20 MR. EPSTEIN: I was trying to get the fire
21 department guys --

22 [REDACTED]: Oh, okay.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: -- to try to get them to
24 talk to me, but they won't talk. I'm the next
25 of kin, I'm entitled to all this information.

1 [REDACTED]: Sure.

2 MR. EPSTEIN: And they ain't got shit.

3 You know, other than this paperwork.

4 [REDACTED]: Yeah.

5 MR. EPSTEIN: Also, what happened with the
6 test, and the DNA, and (Indiscernible
7 *01:03:40). Was that test ever done? What
8 were the results of that test? I mean, if it
9 was a real artist, then you may not find
10 anything. Was the test done? And what led the
11 Chief Medical Examiner declare it was a
12 suicide? Just a few days after it was pending.
13 Pending forever investigation.

14 MS. RICHMAN: There was never an
15 investigation.

16 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. What investigation
17 took place? There was no indication that any
18 investigation took place. Which, like, other
19 than Barr saying, well, he sort of
20 (Indiscernible *01:04:06) nobody went in and
21 out. That convinced him it was a suicide.

22 MS. RICHMAN: That came later.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: What?

24 MS. RICHMAN: That came later.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. It came later. That

1 came later.

2 [REDACTED]: Are you aware of when
3 they actually thought they deemed it a suicide?

4 MS. RICHMAN: It was the Friday. The
5 following Friday.

6 [REDACTED]: So, that Friday. So, he
7 was found on Saturday, the following? That
8 Friday?

9 MR. EPSTEIN: It was, like, five days.

10 MS. RICHMAN: Yeah.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: It was something, like, five
12 days.

13 [REDACTED]: Was that when he --

14 MS. RICHMAN: But we had heard from the
15 media that they were changing it. That's why
16 we called into the Medical Examiner's Office,
17 like, what the hell is going on? What are you
18 talking about? Where are you getting this
19 from? It made no sense. Because there hadn't
20 been a full investigation.

21 MR. EPSTEIN: The city pathologist and Dr.
22 [REDACTED], they did the autopsy.

23 MS. RICHMAN: They were present. Yes.

24 MR. EPSTEIN: They were present. They did
25 the autopsy. They said, this looks more like

1 a murder than a suicide. And then, the Chief
2 Medical Examiner declares it's a suicide from
3 before. What is she basing that on?

4 [REDACTED]: When they do the autopsy, is
5 it recorded?

6 MS. RICHMAN: Yes.

7 MR. EPSTEIN: It's what?

8 [REDACTED]: Is it video recorder?

9 MS. RICHMAN: It's audio recorded.

10 [REDACTED]: Audio recorded. And there --

11 MR. EPSTEIN: And the photographs.

12 [REDACTED]: -- Dr. [REDACTED] (Indiscernible
13 *01:05:06) recording?

14 MS. RICHMAN: We don't have the recording.

15 [REDACTED]: But if he was there? He
16 would (Indiscernible *01:05:12) the recording?

17 MS. RICHMAN: He was there.

18 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Because he spoke it.

19 MS. RICHMAN: Of course.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: He said they did whatever he
21 asked them to do, certain things. He's --

22 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *01:05:18)

23 MR. EPSTEIN: -- so, he wouldn't have to
24 do a second autopsy. It would be closer. If
25 he's standing there, they - (Indiscernible

1 *01:05:23) asked him whatever he wanted. You
2 know? Yeah.

3 MS. RICHMAN: They -. Sorry.
4 (Indiscernible *01:05:34). Yeah. They changed
5 it. We don't understand why.

6 [REDACTED]: And [REDACTED]. Did [REDACTED] agree
7 to the - it be changed?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: No.

9 MS. RICHMAN: No. But they didn't ask
10 him.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: No. No. He wasn't
12 consulted.

13 MS. RICHMAN: He was surprised.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Well, you can talk to
15 [REDACTED], if he's around. Go talk to him.

16 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible *01:05:56)
17 for contact information you have? Is there any
18 contact information you would like to provide?

19 MR. EPSTEIN: For [REDACTED]?

20 [REDACTED]: For any of the people
21 that you -.

22 [REDACTED]: We have David Shone. David
23 Mitchell. Was Shone -.

24 [REDACTED]: Or you can provide it
25 through your attorney.

1 MS. RICHMAN: (Indiscernible *01:06:09).
2 Why don't you just send it all to me? And I'll
3 just forward it to them.

4 [REDACTED]: Anyone you think that --

5 [REDACTED]: Anyone that we should be
6 - you think we should speak to, and the contact
7 information that you have. I'm not talking
8 about, like, the guards or things like that. I
9 mean --

10 MS. RICHMAN: Well, we don't have that.

11 [REDACTED]: -- right. And I mean, we
12 have all of that stuff. But as far as outside
13 of the government.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Oh, well, well, I'll give
15 you David Shone's number. I have it right
16 here. It's [REDACTED].

17 [REDACTED]: What's the name?

18 MR. EPSTEIN: [REDACTED] number, his mobile
19 is [REDACTED]. Great guy, by the way,
20 talking to. He really is super (Indiscernible
21 *01:06:53).

22 [REDACTED]: What about Mitchell? David
23 Mitchell.

24 MR. EPSTEIN: [REDACTED]. Because I
25 knew David Mitchell from long ago. And I

1 haven't seen or spoken to David Mitchell
2 probably in a couple of decades. Until this
3 came about. That's when we reconnected. When
4 I found out that he also put money, you know,
5 the bail up for Jeffrey, we reconnected.

6 [REDACTED]: Anything else?

7 MR. EPSTEIN: Back in the 90s, and early
8 2000s, Jeffrey and I did stuff all the time.
9 We were much closer to him. But then,
10 (Indiscernible *01:07:36), you know, just got
11 (Indiscernible *01:07:39).

12 [REDACTED]: Is there any
13 communications via email that would have been -
14 that you had with Jeffrey that would help us at
15 all?

16 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, I might have the back
17 and forth between him and I, with the, about
18 the video tape.

19 MS. RICHMAN: Uh-huh.

20 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. That was forwarded to
21 me from Bannon. Yeah. There's nothing else,
22 really. Like I said, most of the
23 communications with us was, you know, telling
24 me funny things, or I just keep him
25 (Indiscernible *01:08:08) with every cousins,

1 and things like that. So.

2 [REDACTED]: Maybe you've talked
3 amongst your attorney, if there is any
4 communications that you guys have, that might
5 be helpful for us?

6 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Of course. Yeah.
7 Yeah. Mm-hmm. Okay.

8 [REDACTED]: Do you know of anyone else
9 that communicated with Jeffrey, while he was in
10 prison, other than his attorneys?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, just [REDACTED].

12 MS. RICHMAN: I don't think - I mean, he
13 doesn't know his social circles.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

15 MS. RICHMAN: So, he doesn't know his
16 friends, or who he was in business with, or
17 anything along that line. And he's been shut
18 down. I've tried to reach out to people in the
19 estate, he wanted to have wrongful death suit
20 for his brother, but the estate has that right,
21 he doesn't have that right, and they shouldn't
22 reach out to him.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. And I'm not happy
24 that the estate wouldn't give me that right to
25 file a wrongful death suit, because even if I

1 did it that way, the money -. Whatever money
2 is going to bring me. Look, it's a slam dunk
3 case for wrongful death. Mm-hmm.

4 [REDACTED]: Who was entitled to that
5 money? Was that the estate?

6 MR. EPSTEIN: It belonged to his estate.

7 [REDACTED]: And who was -?

8 MR. EPSTEIN: The trustee. The
9 executives.

10 [REDACTED]: Who are they?

11 MR. EPSTEIN: [REDACTED], and [REDACTED]
12 [REDACTED] (Phonetic Sp. *01:09:07).

13 [REDACTED]: Wait. What were the names?

14 MR. EPSTEIN: [REDACTED].

15 [REDACTED]: Can you spell the last name
16 for me?

17 MR. EPSTEIN: [REDACTED].

18 [REDACTED]: And who was the other person?

19 MR. EPSTEIN: It was [REDACTED].

20 Right? It's [REDACTED]?

21 MS. RICHMAN: I'm not sure that -. I
22 think there is another executive, as well.

23 MR. EPSTEIN: There was --

24 [REDACTED]: Okay.

25 MR. EPSTEIN: -- there was a third one as

1 an alternate.

2 MS. RICHMAN: Right. But I think -.

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Who was declined, that he --

4 MS. RICHMAN: That's (Indiscernible
5 *01:09:27).

6 MR. EPSTEIN: -- doesn't want to be part
7 of it. He didn't even know who (Indiscernible
8 *01:09:30).

9 [REDACTED]: And who are these people?

10 MS. RICHMAN: The estate executives.

11 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, [REDACTED] is a long-term --

12 MS. RICHMAN: An attorney?

13 MR. EPSTEIN: -- was my brother's private
14 attorney. He worked for Jeff for a long time.
15 And she's worked with him, (Indiscernible
16 *01:09:41). [REDACTED], I think, was -. I
17 don't think he's an attorney. I think he's,
18 like, an account or something. He also paid
19 (Indiscernible *01:09:46).

20 [REDACTED]: And these people are
21 entitled to all -?

22 MR. EPSTEIN: They're in control of the
23 estate.

24 MS. RICHMAN: It's whatever the trustees,
25 we don't know.

1 [REDACTED]: Okay.

2 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah.

3 MS. RICHMAN: I mean --

4 MR. EPSTEIN: I mean, I believe that the
5 trustees --

6 MS. RICHMAN: -- I just have no idea.

7 MR. EPSTEIN: -- also, when he, you know,
8 money, on this day, gets transferred off the
9 trust, and then the trust got - you know, it
10 says what's to be done with it. And those
11 guys, I believe, are under the trustees, as
12 well.

13 [REDACTED]: Okay.

14 MR. EPSTEIN: Yeah. Now, I don't know.
15 Like I said, the wrongful death case, the
16 wrongful death suit, is that a slam dunk. And
17 I just want to point out, if it was successful,
18 there could have been more money in the pocket
19 for the victims, or for whatever, you know, if
20 they're getting his money. But the executives
21 chose not to do it. And how did -. I question
22 that. And I question because there's a deal
23 coming in, because both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are
24 being looked at and investigated.
25 So, they're rolling up all their sleeves.

1 And from what I heard, they've also, they're
2 hired criminal defense attorneys, for this
3 case.

4 MS. RICHMAN: Yeah.

5 MR. EPSTEIN: So, there's some deal coming
6 in, it would going for wrongful death. If
7 something (Indiscernible *01:10:56).

8 [REDACTED]: Okay. Well, if there is
9 anything else --

10 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

11 [REDACTED]: -- you could always
12 contact us either by phone or whatever.

13 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay.

14 [REDACTED]: And we will talk some
15 more about that. Otherwise, we'll look forward
16 to that other email.

17 MR. EPSTEIN: You have cards? Can I have
18 your cards?

19 [REDACTED]: I don't think I actually
20 have a card.

21 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, if not, I can --

22 [REDACTED]: Yeah. Give it to me --

23 MR. EPSTEIN: I can send to you.

24 MS. RICHMAN: Well --

25 [REDACTED]: -- well, we send it to your

1 attorney.

2 MS. RICHMAN: -- yeah, go through me.

3 MR. EPSTEIN: Okay. Okay.

4 [REDACTED]: (Indiscernible
5 *01:11:23).

6 MS. RICHMAN: Okay.

7 [REDACTED]: Well, thank you for taking
8 the time to talk to us.

9 MR. EPSTEIN: Well, pleasure might be the
10 wrong word.

11 [REDACTED]: It's 11:40 a.m. on September
12 22, 2021. And we are ending the interview.
13 This is Special Agent [REDACTED].
