Ruiz's alleged intentions to introduce addictive narcotics to our neighborhoods greatly jeopardize the health and well-being of those residents. During Operation Summer Heat, the FBI will continue to apprehend and interrupt any criminal who seeks to supply lethal substances to our communities."

Director Patel to Testify Before Senate Judiciary

[Politico](#) (09/09, Fuchs) and [Just the News](#) (09/09, Severi) reported that Director Patel is scheduled to testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee on Tuesday, Sept. 16, at 9 a.m. in the Hart Senate Office Building as part of the panel's oversight of the bureau. According to the article, Director Patel will also appear before the House Judiciary Committee the following day, Sept. 17, as the Trump administration faces bipartisan scrutiny over its handling of the Jeffrey Epstein case. The article noted that the Senate committee's notice did not specify the exact reason for the hearing, but that House Republicans recently released files related to Epstein, including a birthday book the White House has denied contained a message from President Trump.

Police Presence Increased at NYC Infrastructure as NYPD Monitors Potential Threats, Officials Say

[WCBS \(CBS-2\)](#) (09/09, Houlis) reported that the New York City Police Department and the FBI are warning about increased threats to critical infrastructure in New York City. Authorities said these concerns arise annually around the United Nations General Assembly, Jewish high holidays, and the 9/11 anniversary, prompting a surge in police resources at key sites like bridges and tunnels. According to the article, NYPD Commissioner Jessica Tisch emphasized that all threats are taken seriously and investigations are ongoing with federal partners through the Joint Terrorism Task Force. The article noted that MTA Police are also coordinating with the NYPD and other law enforcement agencies to ensure heightened security while monitoring the situation closely.

Analysis: The Legacy of the 9/11 Attacks

Analysis from the [Council on Foreign Relations](#) (09/09, Hoffman, Pandith) reported that nearly twenty-five years after the 9/11 attacks, the United States faces a far more complex and dangerous terrorism landscape, with five times as many Salafi-Jihadi groups designated by the State Department as there were in 2001. Despite early military victories against al-Qaeda, the Taliban, and ISIS, experts note that the U.S. failed to invest in long-term, non-military strategies to counter radicalization and the ideological appeal of extremist groups. According to the article, the government has even cut back on programs to prevent domestic extremism, with the Justice Department dismantling its domestic extremist unit, the FBI reducing staffing and resources for domestic terrorism investigations, and the DHS scaling back prevention programs. Experts argue that the U.S. lacks "cultural intelligence" to understand how extremists recruit Gen Z and Gen Alpha online, stressing the need for soft power initiatives, modern counter-radicalization strategies, and stronger regulation of online platforms. The article noted that emerging threats, including the use of AI, drones, and sophisticated online propaganda, require the U.S. to learn from Europe's tougher regulatory approach while preparing for increasingly technology-driven terrorism risks.

New York State Police, FBI, and ICAC Joint Operation Results in Three Arrests for Attempted Rape

[The Evening Sun](#) (09/09, Staff Writer) reported that the New York State Police, FBI, and ICAC Task Force jointly arrested three men for attempted rape. According to the article, the detained individuals are Ronald E. Wenzinger, John J. Tremark, and Juan A. Bolanoszul, all charged with Attempted Rape in the Second Degree. The article noted that the arrests resulted from investigations targeting individuals using social media to entice minors to engage in sexual acts.

DOJ Announces Northern Border Crackdown on Human Trafficking in New York and Vermont

[Maine Wire](#) (09/09, Othot) reported that the US Department of Justice announced a crackdown on human trafficking at the northern border, expanding the Joint Task Force Alpha program to New York and Vermont. According to the article, the JTFA program brings together federal prosecutors, law enforcement agents, and international partners to identify, arrest, and prosecute cross-border human traffickers. The article noted that the program has led to over 410 arrests and 355 convictions since its start in June 2021, and will now include partnerships with the FBI, DEA, and ATF to combat human trafficking.

Time's Kid of the Year Is Protecting Seniors From Cybercrime

[TIME](#) (09/09, Kluger) reported that Tejasvi Manoj, a 17-year-old high school student, has been named TIME's Kid of the Year for 2025 for creating a website called Shield Seniors to help protect seniors from online scams. According to the article, Tejasvi was inspired to create the website after her grandfather was nearly scammed out of \$2,000, and she discovered that seniors are often targeted by cybercriminals, with potential losses

exceeding \$5 billion in 2024. The article noted that in 2024, the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center received nearly 860,000 reports of scams, with potential losses exceeding \$16 billion. Additionally, the site's "Report" section allows users to flag suspected fraudsters and provides links to 14 private and government organizations that handle complaints, including the FBI, Better Business Bureau, Social Security Administration, AARP, SEC, and the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. The appropriate agency to contact depends on the type of fraud committed.
