1 A. Okay.

2 Q. This is probably going to be an all-day
3 thing. This is not an endurance test. So, at any
4 time you need to take a break, want to get a
5 cigarette smoke, use the restroom, get some water?

6 A. Okay?

7 Q. It's not a problem. Just let me know.

8 A. Okay.

9 Q. And we'll stop the tape. The tape
10 switches over about every two hours, so we kind of
11 have little built-in breaks any way.

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. -- because it's being transcribed. So,
24 appreciate that. If you have any questions at any
25 time, feel free to ask me.

1 you know, some of the mechanics I don't fully
2 understand.

3 A. Okay.

4 Q. But it's not confidential.

5 A. Yeah, I understand that.

6 Q. Also usually when you see a doctor, there
7 is the assumption that the doctor is going to treat
8 you. I'm not going to be providing treatment
9 recommendations.

10 A. Yeah.

11 Q. Or follow-up, whatever, yeah?

12 A. Yeah.

13 Q. But I just want you to be aware of that
14 before we start.

15 A. Okay. Understand.

16 Q. Do you have any questions, concerns,
17 comments?

18 A. No.

19 Q. No. Okay. How this works is we're going
20 to kind of start, get some background information,
21 kind of go through a lot of areas during the course
22 of the day. And I will talk to you specifically
23 about the allegations of the episode of Mr. Epstein.
24 And we'll have some testing at the end.

25 A. Okay.

1 Q. All right. Usually around noon or 1 we
2 break for lunch and then come back.
3 A. Okay.
4 Q. With all that said, could you tell me your
5 name, please?
6 A. Jane Doe No. 5.
7 Q. Okay. When you were born?
8 A. October 27th, 1986.
9 Q. Okay. Where were you born?
10 A. West Palm Beach.
11 Q. Okay. Any problems, complications,
12 problems with your birth that you're aware of?
13 A. No.
14 Q. So, not born early, born late?
15 A. I was born late, actually, yes.
16 Q. Do you know how late?
17 A. I was supposed to be born October 15th on my
18 father's birthday.
19 Q. Okay. So it looks like roughly two weeks?
20 A. Yes.
21 Q. Okay. Did they have to induce your mom
22 into labor or did it --
23 A. No, she went into labor.
24 Q. She went. Okay. Did you need to spend
25 any additional time in the hospital afterwards,

1 PICU, NICU?
2 A. No.
3 Q. Or were you even born in a hospital?
4 A. I was born in a hospital.
5 Q. Okay.
6 A. That I'm aware of no, I didn't hear of any
7 complications after.
8 Q. Did you meet your normal developmental
9 milestones such as walking and talking on time?
10 A. Yes.
11 Q. Any significant childhood illness?
12 A. As in medically?
13 Q. Medically needed to be rehospitalized,
14 surgeries?
15 A. The only thing I'm aware of is I had colic
16 when I was little.
17 Q. Okay. And everybody, or most everybody
18 gets the chicken pox. Things like that.
19 A. Yes.
20 Q. That's not what I'm --
21 A. Yeah. I've had that.
22 Q. Okay. Were you ever in foster care or
23 taken away from you're biological parents?
24 A. No.
25 Q. Or DCF ever involved in your upbringing?

1 A. No.
2 Q. Tell me about your family a little bit.
3 A. Basically my mother and father got married,
4 you know. I was born. And they got divorced. I was
5 around the age of three. It's not accurate, but around
6 the age of three.
7 Q. And it's okay to ballpark in general.
8 A. Yeah, I will be. You will notice I'm so
9 horrible with memory like time frames.
10 Q. Okay.
11 A. I'm throwing them out.
12 Q. If I need something a little more
13 specific --
14 A. I will try to put, yeah --
15 Q. Put it together.
16 A. Okay.
17 Q. And if you are kind of ballparking, just
18 let me know it's around this or --
19 A. I will. Trust me. I'm horrible.
20 Q. Okay. So divorced around age three?
21 A. Yes. She met my stepfather, which is [REDACTED].
22 [REDACTED]. They dated for a while. That's basically -- he's
23 been with her for a long time. They are still together
24 today. I moved to Fort Lauderdale with them. You know,
25 they got married at some point. I don't honestly

1 remember the age. I was probably around ten --
2 Q. Okay.
3 A. -- when they got married. They had, you know,
4 a daughter, [REDACTED]. We moved to South Carolina after
5 Fort Lauderdale. And I didn't really like it in South
6 Carolina.
7 Q. Roughly how old were you when you were in
8 South Carolina?
9 A. Twelve.
10 Q. Okay. Middle school age?
11 A. Yes, it was middle school. It was around -- I
12 think it was, actually it was eighth grade, I remember,
13 because I went to three different middle schools in
14 eighth grade.
15 Q. Okay.
16 A. I went from Fort Lauderdale to South Carolina
17 and then back to Wellington --
18 Q. Okay.
19 A. -- because I moved with my father because like
20 me and my stepfather were having problems and also at
21 school there was a lot of girls that wanted to, I guess
22 you put it, kill me.
23 Q. Okay.
24 A. You know, harm me in some way.
25 Q. I'm going to want to hear more about that

1 later.
 2 A. Yeah, rough draft. So I moved in with my
 3 father at the end of my eighth grade year. So this is
 4 my third middle school I'm attending now. And it was
 5 hard for me because I was close with my mother. And I
 6 moved with him, but he was gone a lot because he worked
 7 seven days a week. Now he's working six, but he was
 8 working seven days a week and he wouldn't get home until
 9 around, you know, 6 to 8:00 at night.
 10 Q. Okay.
 11 A. So, and he was a single parent. And it was me
 12 and my brother with him. He has custody over my
 13 brother.
 14 Q. Okay.
 15 A. And basically I lived with him from there on
 16 out.
 17 Q. Are you still with him now?
 18 A. No, I'm married. So, actually right now I am
 19 staying at his house because my husband is in the
 20 military. So, he is going to be back in three weeks.
 21 Q. Okay. What branch of the service?
 22 A. Navy.
 23 Q. Okay. And is he over in a combat zone or
 24 is he just on --
 25 A. Yeah.

1 Q. -- regular ship deployment or...
 2 A. Yeah. He is on a regular ship deployment. I
 3 mean, he's been to, you know, to Bahrain and Dubai,
 4 things like that. But he is on his way back as of now.
 5 He is not stopping at any more ports, but he has been in
 6 the combat zone. Stuff like that.
 7 Q. I'm trying to remember, that's considered
 8 what, Zone 5 or Fleet 5 of the Navy, that area?
 9 A. I have no idea.
 10 Q. No idea?
 11 A. I don't know. I'm not really sure about all
 12 that.
 13 Q. What type of ship is he on?
 14 A. He is on the USS Battan.
 15 Q. Okay. Is that a supply ship, frigate?
 16 A. It's a --
 17 Q. Cruiser?
 18 A. It's the -- give me a second. For the
 19 helicopters the --
 20 Q. Helicopter carrier?
 21 A. It's a carrier.
 22 Q. Okay. How long was his deployment for?
 23 A. It's been about, I'm guessing. I haven't even
 24 averaged it out, but six to seven months. It's been a
 25 while.

1 Q. Okay. Was this his first deployment or...
 2 A. Yes. I mean, he's had little deployments like
 3 a month here, three weeks there, but this is his
 4 first --
 5 Q. Long term.
 6 A. -- long deployment.
 7 Q. How long has he been in for?
 8 A. Four years this April, and he still has one
 9 more year.
 10 Q. Is he going to re-enlist or is he looking
 11 on --
 12 A. He is --
 13 Q. -- various things?
 14 A. -- not sure because the economy is so
 15 horrible. He would like to become a
 16 firefighter-paramedic, but the economy is so bad at the
 17 moment that everybody is waiting in line to do that, and
 18 he is thinking about re-enlisting.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. So, it's not for sure yet.
 21 Q. And how long have the two of you been
 22 married?
 23 A. Almost four years this December. No, three
 24 years. I'm sorry. Three years this December.
 25 Q. Okay. So, is he -- I guess you met him

1 before he went into the Navy?
 2 A. I've known him since -- I met him actually the
 3 first day I went to middle school when I went back to
 4 Wellington.
 5 Q. Okay.
 6 A. I've known him since I was 12, 13, whenever I
 7 went back to middle school in West Palm, Wellington.
 8 Q. All right. So, jumping back I think I got
 9 more into the current family than kind of the --
 10 A. Yeah.
 11 Q. -- the original family there, but thank
 12 you.
 13 A. You're welcome.
 14 Q. Whatever the opportunity presents. How
 15 old is your mother?
 16 A. I think she's 45. I'm really terrible.
 17 Q. Approximately 45?
 18 A. Forty-five, yeah.
 19 Q. Has she had any health problems?
 20 A. She's had a couple lumps, but nothing
 21 cancerous.
 22 Q. Okay.
 23 A. But no.
 24 Q. How did she deal with the lumps issues?
 25 A. My mom is the type of person, she would rather

1 not know. But I basically convinced her to go because
 2 cancer runs in my family.
 3 Q. Okay. What do you think of the new
 4 guidelines on mammography and all that?
 5 A. As in --
 6 Q. Oh, they --
 7 A. Sorry.
 8 Q. They just have the recommendations on
 9 breast cancer screening come out.
 10 A. Oh, did they?
 11 Q. (Inaudible.)
 12 A. I wasn't even aware of that.
 13 Q. Yeah. Now they are debating on what the
 14 proper age to do testing is --
 15 A. Oh, really.
 16 Q. -- and therapies and all that, so. Okay.
 17 So, you kind of encouraged mom to go get checked
 18 out?
 19 A. Yes.
 20 Q. Okay. And fortunately it's come back
 21 negative?
 22 A. Yes.
 23 Q. Is that something that was worrisome for
 24 you or...
 25 A. Yeah. You know, my mom means a lot to me.

1 We've had our hard times but every mother and daughter
 2 does.
 3 Q. What's she do for a living?
 4 A. She actually used to work at a law firm for
 5 Searcy & Denney --
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. -- Scarola, Barnhart & Shipley.
 8 Q. I'm sorry. I missed that last part.
 9 A. Oh, it's Searcy, Denney, Scarola, Barnhart &
 10 Shipley. That's the law firm. It's all the names.
 11 Q. Gotcha. I'm not familiar with that firm.
 12 Is that down here?
 13 A. It's in West Palm Beach. I'm not sure. It
 14 was a while ago. I'm not sure exactly where it is. I'm
 15 horrible with directions.
 16 Q. That's --
 17 A. Yeah, but it's around the West Palm Beach
 18 area.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. But now she is a stay-at-home mom because she
 21 has, including me, four kids. But she has three young
 22 kids.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. She recently was fostering her step-sister's
 25 daughter.

1 Q. I apologize.
 2 A. That's okay. But she doesn't have her at the
 3 moment anymore.
 4 Q. Okay. So, how many is there biologic
 5 kids, I mean you are related to by mother or father?
 6 A. None. By both my mother and father, none.
 7 Q. No.
 8 A. They are all step.
 9 Q. All step. Any half?
 10 A. Wait.
 11 Q. Half is one parent.
 12 A. I'm sorry. Half, they are all half, not step.
 13 I'm sorry.
 14 Q. Not a problem.
 15 A. I'm a little tired today.
 16 Q. And again at any time if you misspeak and
 17 you need to correct, that's --
 18 A. Yeah, which I will probably will be doing.
 19 Q. Please do. So, what are the names of your
 20 siblings?
 21 A. Okay. There is on my father side, there is
 22 [REDACTED]. He is 20 -- I'm giving a guess because I have
 23 never met him. He is 27. I do speak to him on
 24 Facebook. He's 27. And he is by my father. And I'm
 25 not sure who the woman is. My dad didn't know about him

1 until he was like eight years old.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. Then there is me with my mother. And then
 4 there is my brother [REDACTED]. He is going to be 18. He
 5 is 17 at the moment.
 6 And then there is my sister, [REDACTED]. And
 7 she lives in Colorado. And she, I'm guessing, is
 8 nine. She's around the age of nine. I see her
 9 usually in the summers.
 10 Q. Okay. So, that's all on your father's
 11 side?
 12 A. Yeah.
 13 Q. Okay. And Mom's side?
 14 A. My mom's side is me and then there is
 15 [REDACTED], which she's around the age of eight or nine
 16 also. Then there is [REDACTED] which is adopted by the
 17 same woman as her -- it's her half-sister.
 18 Q. I'm sorry. [REDACTED] or [REDACTED]?
 19 A. [REDACTED].
 20 Q. [REDACTED]?
 21 A. Yes.
 22 Q. Okay.
 23 A. And then there is [REDACTED] which is two.
 24 Q. Okay. And [REDACTED] is your mother's or
 25 adopted or...

1 A. No, that's my mother's. And then there was
 2 [REDACTED], but she's not with her anymore because she was
 3 fostering her.
 4 Q. Okay. [REDACTED] was the foster?
 5 A. Yes.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. She was about one and a half.
 8 Q. Now, I have a large number here, so I'll
 9 just kind of do a blanket statement.
 10 A. Yes.
 11 Q. How are they health wise, any major health
 12 problems in any of them?
 13 A. No.
 14 Q. Any major psychiatric problems or minor
 15 psychiatric problems?
 16 A. My brother, he had ADD.
 17 Q. Which brother?
 18 A. I'm sorry, [REDACTED], on my dad's side.
 19 Q. [REDACTED]. Okay. How old was he when that
 20 was diagnosed? Again ballpark.
 21 A. I think when he started grade school. Maybe
 22 middle school.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. I'm guessing. I really honestly am not sure.
 25 I'm guessing middle school.

1 Q. Is he on any medicines that you're aware
 2 of or...
 3 A. He was on Ritalin. That's all I know. I
 4 don't know what he is on now. I'm sure he is on
 5 something still.
 6 Q. Okay. Did it help?
 7 A. Yes. He's very intelligent. It makes him
 8 concentrate. I also have ADD.
 9 Q. Okay.
 10 A. I'm on Adderall which is why I'm in school at
 11 the moment, because I usually don't take it when I'm not
 12 in school.
 13 Q. We had to do this on a Friday. I assume
 14 that's because of the school schedule and childcare?
 15 A. Yeah, I don't have school on Friday, so...
 16 Q. All right. And your mother, does she have
 17 any mental health problems or...
 18 A. No. I mean, she has been through her -- she's
 19 been depressed, you know, at some point. I mean, I
 20 don't know if you want to consider that mental health.
 21 She just got depressed because she was overwhelmed with
 22 all the kids at her age.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. But that's basically it.
 25 Q. Roughly how old was she when she had the

1 depression?
 2 A. It was when she was still in South Carolina.
 3 I'm going to say late 30's maybe.
 4 Q. Okay. And I know you were relatively
 5 young, but do you remember kind of what symptoms you
 6 noticed in her, or what others have told you was
 7 going on?
 8 A. She basically told me she was just, you know,
 9 stressed out to the max. And, you know, it was really
 10 hard for her at this age and stuff like that.
 11 It wasn't -- I wasn't with her at that
 12 point. That was when I was living with my father
 13 and she was like calling me.
 14 Q. Okay.
 15 A. And letting me know things, and I think they
 16 prescribed her Xanax --
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. -- which is to calm her down but she's not on
 19 anything anymore. She's better.
 20 Q. And how long of a period did that go on
 21 for?
 22 A. I honestly have no idea.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. I mean, it wasn't for a long, long time. It
 25 was --

1 Q. Are we talking a week, three weeks?
 2 A. Oh, it was --
 3 Q. -- a month?
 4 A. It was about a couple months to maybe a year.
 5 I'm guessing. I mean, I wasn't there at that point.
 6 She didn't discuss it at all with me. She didn't want
 7 me to worry, but, you know, she did bring it up a couple
 8 times.
 9 Q. Then it was more than just a bad week or
 10 two?
 11 A. Oh, yeah.
 12 Q. Okay. Was she ever on any antidepressant
 13 medications like Zoloft, Prozac, Lexapro, Effexor,
 14 Cymbalta?
 15 A. I think she was, but I have no idea which one.
 16 Q. Okay. Put down possible antidepressant.
 17 A. Yeah. I'm not, yeah, I'd have no idea if she
 18 really was. I mean, I'm sure she took something because
 19 she mentioned something. I don't remember.
 20 Q. Tell me a little bit about your step-dad.
 21 [REDACTED] you said?
 22 A. Yes.
 23 Q. Is it okay if I refer to him that way?
 24 A. Yeah. That's what we call him, but [REDACTED] is
 25 his name.

1 Q. [REDACTED].
 2 A. But we call him [REDACTED]. A little bit about him.
 3 He is younger than my mom.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. And I don't -- I think it's by four or five
 6 years. I'm not sure. Maybe two or three. I really
 7 don't know. I'm guessing.
 8 In the beginning when my mom first got
 9 with him, I personally didn't like him because I was
 10 very close to my mom. And I felt, you know, like,
 11 jealous I guess you could say because it wasn't just
 12 me and her anymore. It was him, you know, coming
 13 because she didn't bring him around that much in the
 14 beginning. Then we went -- you know, when I was
 15 three.
 16 But, you know, she brought him more
 17 around, you know, a little bit later in life. And I
 18 was jealous, and I really didn't like the fact that
 19 he was there. But, you know, I guess they got
 20 serious at some point. And we just -- he, he was
 21 young at the time. He was in his 20's I'm guessing,
 22 and I think he was --
 23 Q. Not to sound funny but when you say
 24 guessing, that can mean a lot of different things to
 25 a lot of different people. So, if it's kind of like

1 a good estimate --
 2 A. Uh-huh.
 3 Q. -- is that what you mean by guessing --
 4 A. Yes.
 5 Q. -- or do you mean I am totally just
 6 pulling a number out of the air?
 7 A. He was in his 20's.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. So, I'm --
 10 Q. So, I will assume when you say he is
 11 younger, I think, I'm guessing, that that's your
 12 best estimate?
 13 A. Yes.
 14 Q. Okay. I just --
 15 A. He was in his 20's. And we didn't really get
 16 along because, I mean, he's told me that basically I was
 17 luggage to him.
 18 Q. Okay.
 19 A. Baggage, luggage, because he was young and he
 20 just wanted my mother and I was just a tagalong. He has
 21 told me that to this day. I mean, he has apologized for
 22 it, but he was physically abusive.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. Not to the point where he like, you know,
 25 every day beat me. But when he lost his temper, you

1 know, he's fractured my eardrum that he's hit me so hard
 2 because I said I didn't like him. You know, here and
 3 there. It wasn't like a constant thing but it was when
 4 he lost his temper. There was a couple times.
 5 Q. Did you ever need to go to the hospital?
 6 A. No. I went to the doctors for my ear though.
 7 Q. And how is your hearing now?
 8 A. It's fine. It was just a fractured eardrum
 9 they said. But it, I couldn't hear out of -- I think
 10 it -- I'm not sure -- I think it was my right ear for
 11 like a week, but it's fine now.
 12 Q. Any other, and you said it's doing fine
 13 now. I sometimes talk a little lower. I can
 14 occasionally mumble. So, if I say something you
 15 don't understand, let me know.
 16 A. Okay.
 17 Q. I'm happy to repeat it.
 18 A. Okay.
 19 Q. You can raise the volume if need be.
 20 Okay. You said it wasn't like a daily thing, but I
 21 mean, can you give me a sense, I mean, was there
 22 like major episodes or was there a lot of minor
 23 little episodes that --
 24 A. Yeah, it was, it was mixed between both. It
 25 was, there was minor episodes. It's not where he hit me

1 but he would, you know, scream and brake things and
 2 throw my phone and stuff like that. And there was also
 3 times where he would, you know, hit me to where he got
 4 my mom to the point of, you know, asking me, do you want
 5 me to leave him.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. And I just basically told her, I don't, I
 8 don't care anymore. I really don't. I mean, I didn't
 9 know what to do because I knew she wanted to be with
 10 him, and I didn't want to, like, break up them, but also
 11 on the other hand I was absolutely miserable.
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. And that's one of the reasons I moved out of
 14 South Carolina also. It wasn't just the school. It was
 15 a combination of, I just, both. So I just -- because I
 16 was supposed to go back to South Carolina like for the
 17 following school year because they, you know, it was
 18 more about my mom had it more about the school issue.
 19 There was also to me about him and, you
 20 know, she didn't say very much to him, so I just
 21 never went back to South Carolina.
 22 Q. Okay. Again, yeah, I'm just -- so it's
 23 kind of like you went down to visit your father for
 24 the summer and --
 25 A. Not to visit. I went to finish my eighth

1 grade school year.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. Okay. I was supposed to go back for my high
 4 school in South Carolina, but I didn't go back.
 5 Q. Okay. We're talking about the incidence
 6 of domestic violence with your stepfather. The
 7 serious episodes, are we talking like five, ten, 15,
 8 20?
 9 A. It was probably, I mean, it wasn't --
 10 Q. Thirty, 100.
 11 A. No, it wasn't that many. It was like really
 12 horrible, like -- there is one in particular that I
 13 remember that when I said I didn't like him over the
 14 phone, he was listening in on the conversation, he like
 15 broke down the door and like ripped my TV out of the
 16 wall and threw it down the stairs and basically, beat
 17 the crap out of me, and that's when he fractured my
 18 eardrum.
 19 Q. Okay. How old were you when that
 20 happened?
 21 A. I was in -- it was my -- I think it was the
 22 beginning -- oh, ballparking it?
 23 Q. Ballparking it.
 24 A. Seventh or eighth grade year in middle school
 25 in Fort Lauderdale.

1 Q. Okay. And again, just so I got the
 2 timeline straight, you were in Fort Lauderdale since
 3 eighth grade. Moved up to South Carolina. You were
 4 in South Carolina for less than a year --
 5 A. Oh, less --
 6 Q. And came back.
 7 A. It was a couple months.
 8 Q. Couple months.
 9 A. Because I did eighth grade in Fort Lauderdale.
 10 I went to South Carolina, did eighth grade. And then I
 11 went to Wellington and did eighth grade.
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. So, yeah.
 14 Q. And this happened before you left, though?
 15 A. Yes. It was in Fort Lauderdale.
 16 Q. Okay. Was there any abuse between your
 17 mother and, and [REDACTED]?
 18 A. (Witness shakes head.)
 19 Q. Okay. So, he never hit her?
 20 A. No.
 21 Q. Did he ever hit your brother or any of the
 22 other children?
 23 A. Those were all his kids.
 24 Q. Okay. And did he hit any of them?
 25 A. I mean, he spansks them now, you know, because

1 that's now they are all young. But he spansks them but
 2 he treats them completely different now that -- you
 3 know, I mean he's, he's apologized to me and sat me down
 4 and told me that he was wrong with the way he raised me.
 5 But I guess he was raised like that by his
 6 father. Actually, it was worse the way his father
 7 raised him, so that's all he knew I'm guessing. And
 8 now that he has his own kids, he sees now that's
 9 horrible the way he raised me.
 10 Q. Have you forgiven, or is it just you
 11 appreciate the apology but --
 12 A. I mean, it's -- I still feel like he keeps me
 13 like this, you know, from the family. You know, he -- I
 14 don't know. That's the way I feel. He says otherwise,
 15 but there is just little things that make me feel like
 16 he would rather me not be at his house, in his home like
 17 living when I moved here for instance and I was staying
 18 with them first when my husband first left on a
 19 deployment.
 20 Q. So, you actually went back up and stayed
 21 with them for a little while and --
 22 A. Well, they are here now.
 23 Q. Oh, they're back now?
 24 A. So, they are in Boca. I'm sorry I should have
 25 told you that.

1 Q. No, that's fine.
 2 A. They're back. They're in Boca.
 3 Q. How often do you go over and see them?
 4 A. I go, I go over there probably once every two
 5 weeks or something. You know, he is usually at work and
 6 I go to see my mom because she's a stay-at-home mother.
 7 She's actually watching my daughter today.
 8 Q. Okay. Now, what type of work does he do?
 9 A. He is a general manager at a golf course.
 10 It's a -- it's in, off of Commercial.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. Coral Ridge Country Club.
 13 Q. And you said you get along well with your
 14 mom now?
 15 A. Yeah. We get along. I mean, don't get me
 16 wrong, we have our differences like every mother and
 17 daughter does. You know, I have my opinion. She has
 18 hers. And you know, we get into it sometimes but it's
 19 about stupid things. You know.
 20 Q. And can you give me an example?
 21 A. Example. This is, you know, actually recent.
 22 They are very [REDACTED] and they don't believe in lying
 23 to their children and telling them there is a Santa
 24 Claus when it's about Jesus's birthday.
 25 Q. Okay.

1 A. So, my uncle is coming down but he tells his
2 son that he is -- you know, Santa Claus is real.

3 My mom feels the need if his son asks my
4 mother if Santa Claus is real, she's going to tell
5 him no. And I told her it's not her place to tell
6 somebody else's son that Santa Claus isn't real.
7 That's the parents' place. And she's like, well,
8 it's my home. So, that's a conflict. Something
9 like that. Very minor but I give my opinion.

10 Q. No, I appreciate the example?

11 A. Yeah.

12 Q. Was there ever any abuse from mom?

13 A. No. Mentally when I was younger, you know,
14 she -- she lost it on me here and there a lot, you know,
15 for stupid things. I guess I should have said yes, but
16 I don't, you know.

17 Q. Well, let me -- any physical abuse?

18 A. There was one time that she got upset with me
19 because her and my stepfather split up. I didn't tell
20 you this either, but her and my stepfather split up at
21 one point before they got married, and she dated this
22 guy. And I didn't like him at all, and he went to
23 Chicago. This is just a scenario of what happened.

24 I was walking in the streets of Chicago
25 and she got pissed because I wasn't listening to

1 her. So she took me in the bathroom and hit me a
2 couple of times to be like, you know, wake the hell
3 up, and what are you doing walking in the streets of
4 Chicago?

5 Q. Okay. Was it like a spanking or slapping
6 in the face or --

7 A. She hit me with her hands a couple of times
8 and slammed my head against the wall. But it was just,
9 she was really mad.

10 Q. And you were roughly four, five --

11 A. No.

12 Q. -- ten, 20?

13 A. No. I'm going to say between, like -- I said
14 they got married when I was around ten. So, maybe like,
15 you know what, they got married when I was around ten.
16 They got married twice. I'm sorry. There's things that
17 pop back up to me.

18 They got married when I was ten. They got
19 a divorce and they got re-married in a courthouse,
20 which I totally forgot about.

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. You're going to see I do that. I forget and
23 then I start remembering. And I think it was when they
24 got their divorce. So I'm guessing around the age of
25 like 11 or so. I'm, I'm ballparking it. I really don't

1 100 percent know.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. I'm very bad with those dates.

4 Q. So, closer to 11 than 16?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Okay. And again it's okay to ballpark.

7 If I need something more specific --

8 A. Yeah.

9 Q. -- we'll work through it.

10 A. It's so hard for me to do dates really.

11 Q. Do you know why they got separated the
12 first time?

13 A. I have no idea. I don't know.

14 Q. Do you know why your mother and your
15 biological father got separated?

16 A. Yes. Because he was doing drugs and cheated
17 on my mother.

18 Q. What drugs was he doing?

19 A. Cocaine.

20 Q. Okay. Was he selling or just using or...

21 A. Both.

22 Q. Did any of that come home with him or...

23 A. My mom said the time that she left him was
24 when I got a hold of a bag of coke, and that's when she
25 was fed up. Now, this is from what she told me. You

1 know, there's her side, his side, and the truth, so...
2 They told me two different stories.

3 Q. And what's his version of events?

4 A. She was jealous and he couldn't deal with it,
5 so that's why they split up. So, I mean, I don't know
6 if he wants me to know or -- I mean, he is fine now, you
7 know, he's --

8 Q. How much clean time has he had?

9 A. He's -- a while. I mean, this is when I was
10 younger. I don't, I don't know honestly. I can't tell
11 you. I have no idea, but I mean, I remember scenarios
12 when I was in Jupiter visiting him, and I, I mean, not
13 that I knew at that time, but I look back and I'm like,
14 he had to be on drugs the way he -- it was just, he
15 didn't give a crap about anything, you know. He would
16 throw my brother in a bed and my brother would cry to
17 sleep. And I would just -- it was horrible. But that's
18 when I was -- I have no idea what age. I was young. It
19 was when he lived in Jupiter, Jupiter Farms.

20 Q. Okay.

21 A. But for a while now he's -- a great job, makes
22 good money.

23 Q. I forgot to ask about him. So, what, what
24 is his job?

25 A. He's the finance director of a, two

1 dealerships, car dealerships.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. He still works a lot. He works six days a
 4 week. He's a hard worker. He's dating somebody but he
 5 hasn't been married since my mother.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. I don't know if he has a commitment problem or
 8 what it is. But, you know, he's basically raised my
 9 brother. My brother's mom turned into a druggie. And I
 10 don't know if she got that, started from my father. But
 11 she was a real nice woman when I knew her, but she's
 12 literally a druggie, disgustingly and --
 13 Q. Do you have any dealings with her or...
 14 A. I'm sorry?
 15 Q. Do you have any dealings with your
 16 brother's mother?
 17 A. As in like --
 18 Q. Was she like living in the house?
 19 A. She was living there and she was --
 20 Q. -- for the first part?
 21 A. She was, she was a sweetheart when I was
 22 living there. She was a sweetheart and I know she got
 23 attached to drugs. I don't know if it was my father
 24 that got her on them, because they started -- they were
 25 in Jupiter when this whole thing, you know, when they

1 got together. So, I don't know if she just started
 2 doing them with my dad because when I knew her she was a
 3 sweetheart, amazing woman.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. And she just started going downhill and doing
 6 crazy stuff when you do when you're on drugs. And my
 7 dad had to take custody of [REDACTED], which is my brother.
 8 And he's raised my brother, and my brother is very
 9 intelligent and he's about to graduate.
 10 Q. Good for him.
 11 A. So, I mean, back in the past, yeah, there was
 12 complications, but now there they are good.
 13 Q. What do you mean complications?
 14 A. As in drugs and, you know, his mom, you know,
 15 doing the drugs and my dad was doing the drugs. My
 16 brother, you know, was just in a bad environment.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. You know.
 19 Q. Your brother used them as well?
 20 A. My brother, he has. I mean, don't get me
 21 wrong, you know, teenagers try drugs. But I feel bad
 22 for him because he's never had a mother figure in his
 23 life. You know, he's had me, but I'm his sister.
 24 Q. Right.
 25 A. You know, I mean, his mother always -- she

1 still comes into his life, I'm going to pick you up next
 2 week; never shows up. She's back in jail. It's I can't
 3 imagine what he goes through and he tries to act now
 4 like, oh, I don't give a, you know, whatever he uses
 5 these words, and I know it hurts.
 6 Q. Yeah. All right. So, and just an
 7 interesting history. And thank you. So, I'm just
 8 trying to make sure I've got it and haven't skipped
 9 anything.
 10 A. Yeah.
 11 Q. So, dad's working at a car dealership,
 12 staying in his house right now?
 13 A. Uh-huh.
 14 Q. Good relationship with him now?
 15 A. Yeah. Now, we have finally are having a good
 16 relationship.
 17 Q. When do you think the relationship
 18 improved?
 19 A. Since I had my daughter. So, about, almost
 20 two years.
 21 Q. Okay. Something I just realized I forgot
 22 to ask: What's your husband's rank in the Navy?
 23 A. He is about to be an E-5. If he makes -- he
 24 took a test but they randomly pick. He's, right now
 25 he's an E-4.

1 Q. Good for him.
 2 A. Yeah, he's, he's an excellent worker.
 3 Q. So, is E-5 getting up to sergeant rank? I
 4 mean, I know in the military, Army I think E-4 is
 5 corporal. May have forgotten. Don't know?
 6 A. I just know he is an E-4, and E-5 is higher.
 7 I mean, it's getting up there. He is doing really well.
 8 Q. Right.
 9 A. He has a lot of awards, you know, best worker
 10 awards. He is actually elected to get to E-5. So,
 11 basically if he passes the test, he is basically going
 12 to be hand picked. Because the way they do the testing
 13 in the Navy is, this group of people test, you know,
 14 this -- you know just say 50 percent pass the test.
 15 They only take a handful of that 50 percent that pass.
 16 Not all the people that pass get the next rank.
 17 Q. Gotcha.
 18 A. So --
 19 Q. He's got enough awards and stuff that it
 20 looks like he --
 21 A. They basically awarded him to get E-5, if he
 22 makes it.
 23 Q. Okay. Good. So, relationship with father
 24 improved since your daughter's been born?
 25 A. Yes.

1 Q. Okay. And he's been clean for a while?
 2 A. Yeah.
 3 Q. Did he just use cocaine or were there
 4 other things there too?
 5 A. I know there was marijuana --
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. -- when I was younger. But I just heard
 8 stories of the cocaine and things like that from, you
 9 know, my cousins. They know from their parents. It's
 10 just, I've heard about it in the family.
 11 Q. Was he using powder or crack or...
 12 A. I think cocaine powder.
 13 Q. Okay.
 14 A. I hope he wasn't doing crack.
 15 Q. Did he go to a treatment program or was he
 16 just --
 17 A. No. He just was able to stop.
 18 Q. Stop. Okay.
 19 A. Yeah.
 20 Q. In the extended family any history of any
 21 mental health problems, depression, anxiety,
 22 schizophrenia?
 23 A. My grandmother's brother --
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. I don't know what it's called. I know he has

1 a mental disorder to where maybe if you named it, I
 2 can --
 3 Q. Was he hospitalized?
 4 A. He's been in a mental institution.
 5 Q. Okay. I mean, they sometimes talk about
 6 manic depressive disease, bipolar, schizophrenia,
 7 schizo-effective?
 8 A. Schizophrenia, what is that, when you're just
 9 like - I mean --
 10 Q. There's several different forms of it, but
 11 people can become paranoid. They can become what
 12 they call catatonic where they don't move and --
 13 A. No, I mean, he's -- I've met him and he's
 14 just -- he talks just like you and I, but I know he is
 15 diagnosed with something, but I don't know --
 16 Q. Okay.
 17 A. -- what it is.
 18 Q. Does he have periods where he's different
 19 from us and periods where he looks like us?
 20 A. You mean acts, like his actions?
 21 Q. Uh-huh.
 22 A. Yeah. My grandmother says like, he will be
 23 fine and he could just lose it and just be like crazy
 24 sometimes. So, I don't know if it's bipolar or I'm not
 25 sure. I'm not really close with him.

1 Q. Okay. But he has been in an institution?
 2 A. Yes.
 3 Q. I'll just leave it at that, unknown.
 4 Okay. Any history of suicides in the family,
 5 immediate, or extended?
 6 A. Not that, I mean -- not that I can think of.
 7 I know my, my dad's cousin got really depressed at one
 8 point and wanted to commit suicide from what I heard
 9 years ago. But I'm not really close with him either.
 10 Q. Okay.
 11 A. I just heard about it. But that I know of,
 12 no, nobody that has committed suicide.
 13 Q. All right. Anything else about your
 14 family you think would be helpful for me to know?
 15 Again that's not a one-time offer, so if something
 16 pops up later --
 17 A. Yeah, there might be things that pop up later
 18 but from what I know, that's a lot of information.
 19 Q. Okay. I know we covered a little of this
 20 when we were talking about the family but I may
 21 repeat a little bit here.
 22 A. Okay.
 23 Q. How was your childhood in general or how
 24 would you describe it?
 25 A. If I compare myself to somebody else, like,

1 there's this girl, I'm not going to get into it, there's
 2 a girl in my school that she told me her life story, and
 3 I was like, wow, and I thought mine was bad.
 4 But I mean, it's, it's not been horrible,
 5 but there has been some, you know, mental and
 6 physical abuse, but it hasn't been, oh, I was
 7 traumatized and, you know, things like that.
 8 But I mean, some things did affect me, you
 9 know, and still to this day I'm hurt from certain
 10 things that have happened in my life, you know.
 11 Q. What would you say are the things that
 12 still affect you?
 13 A. Just the way my stepfather mistreated me and
 14 some of the mental abuse my father, you know, said to
 15 me. It's, basically it's just that part, and just that
 16 I never felt wanted by either side of the family.
 17 Q. Okay. What were some of the things your
 18 father said to you?
 19 A. Just things like you're a fat pig, slob, and
 20 you're not going to graduate or amount to anything in
 21 life. And your brother is going to be a, you know,
 22 architect or a doctor and you're going to be nothing,
 23 and just things like that.
 24 Q. How old were you when that was happening?
 25 A. I was in high school.

1 Q. Okay.
 2 A. That was probably like my junior -- I'm, I'm
 3 ballparking it.
 4 Q. That's fine.
 5 A. Junior, senior year. He got fed up with me.
 6 Q. Okay. All right. Did you have a lot of
 7 friends when you were growing up or...
 8 A. Yeah. I clung to my friends because that's
 9 all I felt I had at that point.
 10 Q. How many friends do you have now?
 11 A. Friends and acquaintances or close
 12 girlfriends?
 13 Q. Friend-friends, and then we can talk about
 14 friendly acquaintances.
 15 A. I have a lot of close friends that I have had
 16 since high school and even when I went to daycare. Do
 17 you want a number?
 18 Q. Sure.
 19 A. Okay. Well, let me think. Probably six to
 20 eight really close girlfriends --
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. -- that I've known for years.
 23 Q. Did any of them go see Mr. Epstein?
 24 A. Yes.
 25 Q. And do you know which ones those were?

1 A. Give the names?
 2 Q. Yeah.
 3 A. Am I allowed to do that?
 4 Q. I think so. Again, my understanding is is
 5 there's orders on name confidentiality, that they
 6 are being put as in codes in the transcripts, but I
 7 don't know that as--
 8 A. I don't -- I prefer not to give the names
 9 because I really don't know if their attorneys would
 10 like me to do that, but I do have friends that have went
 11 there also. I have two or three of them. I don't want
 12 to, I don't know if I'm allowed to. That's not, I don't
 13 know if that's my place to put out their names.
 14 Q. Okay. It would be helpful for me but, you
 15 know, you have to do what you think's right.
 16 A. Yeah, maybe I will talk to my attorney.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. I will talk to my attorney first and I will
 19 ask her about it and --
 20 Q. Okay. When we take a break --
 21 A. Yeah.
 22 Q. Sounds good. The friend you were talking
 23 about who had a worse life than you had --
 24 A. That's just a friend at my school as of right
 25 now. I mean, I'm not close-close to her, but she's one

1 of my friends in school.
 2 Q. And she hasn't gone there?
 3 A. Oh, no.
 4 Q. No.
 5 A. I just met her in school just recently, the
 6 school I'm in now.
 7 Q. Which school are you in now?
 8 A. I'm in cosmetology school.
 9 Q. Okay.
 10 A. I mean, we just were talking one day and she
 11 just -- you know, she's an awesome, amazing person for
 12 what she's been through. You know, it's just, I was
 13 amazed. And I was like, wow, and I, I thought that, you
 14 know, my life wasn't that great but to hear your story I
 15 feel bad.
 16 Q. I know we talked about this a little bit,
 17 but when you were growing up, how were you
 18 disciplined?
 19 A. As in technique wise, as in timeout, hitting,
 20 stuff like that?
 21 Q. Yeah.
 22 A. Hitting, hit, I was hit with a spatula.
 23 Q. As a child growing up, did you act out or
 24 get along or what was --
 25 A. Socially?

1 Q. Uh-huh.
 2 A. When I was in middle school, I actually -- I
 3 kept to myself a lot.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. I actually was very shy. Even my freshman
 6 year in high school, I was shy. I was inward. I was
 7 quiet, you know, people would say things to me. I
 8 wouldn't speak out or lash out. I would just let them
 9 talk back to me.
 10 Q. Okay.
 11 A. And probably around my sophomore and junior
 12 year is when I started, you know, not letting people
 13 cross me anymore.
 14 Q. Okay. What led to the change?
 15 A. It could have been a combination of things.
 16 It could have been, you know, I've been hurt by so many
 17 people and walked all over by so many people, you know,
 18 including the Epstein scenario. The whole thing that
 19 happened with that, you know, it just, basically I
 20 just -- I was sick of, you know, being taken advantage
 21 of.
 22 Q. Okay. What were some your interests when
 23 you were younger? What did you like to do?
 24 A. I like to draw. I'm artistic. I like to go
 25 to movies. What do you mean by younger, as in what age

1 frame, like --
 2 Q. What would you consider childhood to be?
 3 A. Childhood, probably under the age of like 12,
 4 11, I would say. So, you know, I like to draw and do --
 5 I wasn't, I was, like I told you, I was like more, I
 6 didn't really have a whole bunch of friends when I was
 7 younger, you know, childhood.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. So, I was more to myself and went on the
 10 computer and drew and stuff like that, riding bikes,
 11 playing with my pets, stuff like that.
 12 Q. Okay. And as an adolescent then?
 13 A. I liked to hang out with my friends a lot.
 14 Q. Okay. And the movies, does that fall
 15 under childhood or adolescence?
 16 A. Both. I like to go to the movies. I still
 17 do.
 18 Q. What is your favorite genre?
 19 A. As in movie?
 20 Q. Uh-huh, or what style or type or...
 21 A. I like romantic, comedy.
 22 Q. What happened when you were in school in
 23 South Carolina? You said that there were threats
 24 against you and --
 25 A. Basically I went to this new school in South

1 Carolina. And I mean, just the girls hated me.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. They wanted to cut my hair off, slice my
 4 throat. They would just talk bad to me, and I would
 5 just sit there and let them talk bad to me. It was
 6 just, I don't know if it was a jealousy thing or they
 7 just didn't like who I was, but I didn't say anything so
 8 I don't know how they wouldn't like my personality
 9 because I really was just quiet.
 10 Q. Okay. Did anything happen that started
 11 this? I mean, that's not usual --
 12 A. I did, I mean, I became friends with, you
 13 know, basically I became friends with the guys because
 14 none of the girls liked me. And I hung out with them
 15 and I mean, they just did not like me. Like even my
 16 first day, these girls were giving me the nastiest
 17 looks. I mean, the classroom was sort of, they had
 18 windows like this, and the girls were just staring at
 19 me.
 20 Q. Okay. You said there were threats. Were
 21 there actual physical, physical altercations?
 22 A. No, because I left and you know, I left. They
 23 would -- there was, you know, guys would be like you
 24 need to be careful because they're all in a gang and,
 25 you know, they said that they wanted to slice your

1 throat and things like that.
 2 Q. So, the people who were --
 3 A. I was friends with. I was mostly friends with
 4 the guys which seems awkward, but none of the girls
 5 liked me.
 6 Q. And the girls were in a gang?
 7 A. That's what they told me. The guys told me
 8 that they were in a gang.
 9 Q. Do you know which gang?
 10 A. I have no idea. I didn't even -- I just
 11 wanted to get the hell out of there.
 12 Q. I would understand that. Okay. Besides
 13 the abuse that happened to you, did you witness any
 14 other abuse or --
 15 A. As in with my mother and father or stepfather?
 16 Q. Mother, father, stepfather?
 17 A. Mental or physical you're saying?
 18 Q. Let's start physical?
 19 A. No.
 20 Q. Mental?
 21 A. Mental, I, you know, I mean, I don't know if I
 22 would consider it mental abuse, but my mother and
 23 stepfather would get into arguments. I don't remember
 24 what it was about. I mean, I know she was
 25 self-conscious and he couldn't stand that, and -- but I

1 mean, I just, not that I remember. It wasn't something
 2 I would pay attention to. I would just walk away.
 3 Q. Did you see any abuse in friends or people
 4 outside the family?
 5 A. Physical?
 6 Q. Physical.
 7 A. No.
 8 Q. Mental?
 9 A. I mean, mental abuse is everywhere though.
 10 Q. How do you define mental abuse? You
 11 actually bring up a good point.
 12 A. Just putting somebody down I consider mental
 13 abuse.
 14 Q. Okay. So, if a married couple had a
 15 general fight, you would consider that mental abuse
 16 or does it have to go --
 17 A. It's a choice of words. As if you don't know
 18 what you are doing, you know, you don't know how to
 19 clean the house, this, that, and the other, I consider
 20 that mental abuse because you're putting somebody down.
 21 Q. Okay. I don't think I have directly asked
 22 at this point, and again we'll talk about Epstein
 23 later, so taking that part right now out of the
 24 equation, have you ever been sexually abused?
 25 A. No.

1 Q. All right. Okay. Were you raised in a
 2 church, mosque, synagogue, house of worship?
 3 A. No. It wasn't -- they, they didn't become
 4 Christian until later on when they were in South
 5 Carolina is when they became really religious.
 6 Q. And I assuming that is your mother and
 7 stepfather?
 8 A. Yes.
 9 Q. Would they consider themselves born again
 10 or...
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. Okay. Do you attend church now or mosque,
 13 synagogue, house of worship?
 14 A. Yeah, my husband and I, actually we were
 15 attending church before he left on deployment. And we
 16 got really close to this couple that brought us into
 17 this church. And it was a Christian church. And we
 18 were doing really good. And then he left, and I
 19 started, you know, I went to Christ Fellowship a couple
 20 of times, but it's sort of hard because I don't, I don't
 21 like to leave my daughter at daycares or random places.
 22 Q. Why is that?
 23 A. I don't trust people.
 24 Q. Okay. Any particular reason why?
 25 A. It could be, you know, there is, I mean,

1 little things led up to that. The Epstein scenario
 2 could be one of them. I don't trust men at all around
 3 my daughter at all.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. It's, it's more -- I lean towards men. I
 6 don't trust any man around my daughter besides, of
 7 course, my husband and, you know, my family. But I just
 8 don't trust people.
 9 Q. When you say could have been many little
 10 things, what else was --
 11 A. Little things as in I just, you know, I just
 12 think people, you know, some people have bad intentions
 13 and you don't know why, you don't how, you don't -- they
 14 could be normal to you and all of a sudden they do sick
 15 things. I just, you know, the Epstein thing could have
 16 led up to that, you know, because that just made me not
 17 trust guys. And my daughter, God forbid somebody
 18 touched her, it would drive me insane.
 19 Q. All right. You mentioned pets, what type
 20 of pets did you have?
 21 A. Throughout my entire life?
 22 Q. Sure.
 23 A. Or just now? I have one pet now that I have
 24 is mine.
 25 Q. What do you got now?

1 A. I have a dog.
 2 Q. Okay. What type of dog?
 3 A. Puggle, it's a pug and a beagle mixed.
 4 Q. Thank you. I'm trying to imagine what
 5 that would look like.
 6 A. He's, he's pretty ugly. But I love ugly dogs.
 7 Q. And growing up, I don't need to know
 8 everything but --
 9 A. Everything.
 10 Q. Just kind of in --
 11 A. I've had --
 12 Q. -- general what have you had?
 13 A. I've had dogs. I've had cats. I've had
 14 birds. I've had chinchillas. I've had iguanas. I've
 15 had gerbils. I've had fish, turtles. I think that's
 16 it, I think.
 17 Q. Do you get along better with animals than
 18 you do people or...
 19 A. Yeah. I love animals. I just feel like they
 20 are so innocent. I just feel like they don't, you know,
 21 they don't judge you. They don't disrespect you. They
 22 just love you. It's unconditional love with an animal.
 23 Q. That's true.
 24 A. Yeah.
 25 Q. I have run into a few cats that I

1 thought --
 2 A. Yeah.
 3 Q. -- had issues but -- and I know we talked
 4 a little bit about school, but kind of educational
 5 history, start with middle school since that sounds
 6 like there was a lot going on there. How were your
 7 grades?
 8 A. I was average. I was never, you know, A's.
 9 Well, actually, no. I was in high school when I -- I
 10 mean, you said start at middle school, but I'm jumping.
 11 Q. If you prefer to start in high school, we
 12 can start there, wherever.
 13 A. It's not that I prefer. It's just, middle
 14 school I had average grades. I was C's, B's, some A's.
 15 I'm not 100 percent sure, you know. If you look at my
 16 records, I'm not being 100 percent, you know, sure about
 17 what it is but I know it was average.
 18 High school, I, I took Adderall or, no, I
 19 took Ritalin. And I got like almost straight A's
 20 when I was taking Ritalin, but I didn't consistently
 21 take it. So I, I suffered a lot my senior year. I
 22 basically had to go to an alternative school.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. Because I was skipping a lot my senior year
 25 and it started in my junior year and then it led to my

1 senior year and then I had to -- I mean, I did get my
2 high school diploma, but it took me a little bit longer
3 than --
4 Q. Was this a GED or --
5 A. No, it was a high school diploma.
6 Q. -- high school diploma.
7 A. It just basically went over my graduation
8 year.
9 Q. Did you ever repeat a grade?
10 A. No.
11 Q. Were you ever in special education?
12 A. No.
13 Q. Were you ever in any honors programs?
14 A. No. I wish.
15 Q. And how did, you said you went to an
16 alternative school?
17 A. Yeah. It's ERC.
18 Q. Okay.
19 A. I think it's called the Educational Resource
20 Center.
21 Q. Okay.
22 A. It's basically for people in high school that
23 are able to graduate but they need more time because
24 they messed up a little bit. And I graduated and I got
25 my high school diploma. But it wasn't from a specific

1 high school. It was basically just Palm Beach County's
2 high school diploma.
3 Q. Okay.
4 A. You know, so I wanted my diploma.
5 Q. Good for you for getting it.
6 A. Yeah, I was not getting a GED. I wanted my
7 diploma.
8 Q. You said it was for students who had
9 messed up a little bit.
10 A. -- as in --
11 Q. How did you mess up?
12 A. I messed up as in skipping. When you have,
13 let me try to remember, I think it is ten unexcused
14 absences and your grades are, you know, not as good as
15 they are supposed to be. And you need to pass the
16 exams, and I'm horrible with testing.
17 Q. Okay.
18 A. So, if I didn't pass those tests and I didn't
19 great straight A's for the rest of the year, I wouldn't
20 be graduating like I was supposed to. So, I said, you
21 know what, I'm just going to go to this school.
22 Q. You said you were on and off Adderall.
23 What, why was that?
24 A. I was actually taking my brother, my brother's
25 Ritalin because I went through a really depressed stage.

1 It was either my junior or senior year, ballparking it.
2 And I -- it was weird. I didn't want to hang out with
3 my friends. I didn't want to go anywhere and that was
4 awkward for me because I was always with my friends.
5 And I was like doing horrible in school.
6 I didn't know what was wrong with me. And you know,
7 I just, my dad was like, you know, why don't you
8 just try Ritalin. Maybe you have some ADD because I
9 know I have it. Your brother has it.
10 And I tried Ritalin, and I mean I started
11 getting awesome grades in school.
12 Q. Okay.
13 A. But I just didn't continue it because it
14 wasn't mine. And I just, I was already almost done with
15 high school, you know. It was whatever. But I went
16 through a really depressed stage.
17 Q. Okay. And you think that was junior,
18 senior year?
19 A. I'm guessing. It was -- I know it was junior,
20 senior year. I'm not sure which one.
21 Q. Okay. That's one I would like to try and
22 tie in. Do you use other time stamps or kind of
23 markers like when you got your first car or started
24 driving or --
25 A. Let me think.

1 Q. Who you may have dating at the time and
2 does that -- I know I may be jumping the gun there,
3 but we haven't gotten to the relationship issues, so
4 I don't know.
5 A. I'm going to say my senior year.
6 Q. Okay.
7 A. Once again I'm still --
8 Q. You know what, think about it. Have it
9 kind of in the background. When we talk about kind
10 of your past psychiatric history --
11 A. Okay.
12 Q. -- we'll kind of nail it down there.
13 A. Okay.
14 Q. Because I don't want you to --
15 A. Yeah.
16 Q. Okay. Were there any fights in school
17 while you were going?
18 A. As in me fighting somebody?
19 Q. Yeah.
20 A. No.
21 Q. Did you ever get suspended or expelled?
22 A. No.
23 Q. Ever get into trouble for having
24 difficulty with authority figures, teachers,
25 coaches, police officers?

1 A. No.
 2 Q. Ever bring a weapon to school?
 3 A. No.
 4 Q. Have you done any college?
 5 A. No. I want to. I want to take business
 6 classes.
 7 Q. And you said you were in cosmetology
 8 school?
 9 A. Yes. I mean, some people consider it college.
 10 Some people just consider it, you know, beauty school.
 11 Q. Or a trade school or --
 12 A. Yeah. I mean, I enjoy it, so I would rather
 13 do something I enjoy than something I'm miserable every
 14 day.
 15 Q. Okay. How long have you been doing it?
 16 A. Almost a year now. I'm almost done.
 17 Q. What is the name of the school?
 18 A. It's the Academy of Palm Beach.
 19 Q. Are you specializing in any one area of
 20 cosmetology or...
 21 A. I prefer to do hair and makeup. That's, you
 22 know, they offer facials. I have done facial classes
 23 and nails. I was actually going to take permanent
 24 makeup also, but I'm going to wait on that because it's
 25 really expensive.

1 Q. Okay.
 2 A. But hair and makeup is my favorite thing to
 3 do.
 4 Q. And that's a one-year program or --
 5 A. Uh-huh.
 6 Q. You can do initial ones if you deem --
 7 A. Like, they, you know, cosmetology is basically
 8 a year depending on, you know, how much you go. Like if
 9 you're going full time, it's basically a year. Some
 10 people do day-and-night class, which I can't do that. I
 11 have my daughter. But you can finish in half the time.
 12 And they also offer programs where they
 13 have, you know, people come in specially for certain
 14 programs as in permanent makeup, body wrapping, you
 15 know, advanced hair cutting. And you pay extra
 16 money for those classes. I've taken two other
 17 classes.
 18 Q. Okay.
 19 A. So, I've taken keratin hair straightening and
 20 the Japanese Q-wave (phonetic) class which is --
 21 Q. You've got to help me on that one.
 22 A. Keratin is basically, what's in your hair.
 23 That's what your hair is consisted of.
 24 Q. Right, hair and nails and everything.
 25 A. Yes. You add Keratin back into your hair,

1 when it's damaged like mine, because I do it so much, it
 2 basically seals the bonds of your hair cuticle and makes
 3 it healthy.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. That's at the Q-wave class, which is people
 6 have really curly hair and they want it to be straight,
 7 so when they have spiral curls, they get out of the
 8 shower and they are not looking like, you know, they got
 9 electrocuted. They get the Q-wave and basically it's a
 10 permanent straightener until their hair actually grows
 11 back out. So, it's easier for them to do their hair if
 12 they wear it straight all the time.
 13 Q. Okay.
 14 A. So, it's two classes that I took.
 15 Q. You just mentioned Japanese and I was
 16 like --
 17 A. Yeah, it comes from Japan. It's the Q-wave.
 18 Q. Gotcha. Okay. So middle school, you said
 19 you were average.
 20 A. Yeah, I was average and then high school, I
 21 mean, I don't, just bad memory-wise. I mean, there is
 22 some things I remember and certain things I don't. I
 23 mean, I started skipping my junior and my senior year,
 24 which was the worst thing I could have done.
 25 Q. Okay. And any suspensions, expulsions in

1 middle school?
 2 A. No.
 3 Q. No. Did you ever see a counselor while
 4 you were in school, either middle or high school?
 5 A. A counselor for just because, I mean, I went
 6 to my guidance counselor my senior year when I went to
 7 the alternative school to speak to her about that, if
 8 that's what you mean.
 9 Q. Well, there's counselors who do kind of
 10 career planning or future planning, like, you know,
 11 community college, cosmetology.
 12 A. No, I didn't.
 13 Q. And then there's counselors who talk
 14 about, you know, it looks like you're having
 15 trouble, you're missing, trouble in home life. So
 16 did you do more of the --
 17 A. Basically, I basically did the guidance
 18 counselor that covered, you know, this is going on with
 19 your school, what are we going to do about it because,
 20 you know, you want to graduate. These are your options.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. That's what I went -- I mean, I had a teacher
 23 that wanted to send me to an art college for -- because
 24 I was in art class, and he wanted to send me to, I don't
 25 know which school it was. He wanted to send my work

1 into this school, but I didn't do it.

2 Q. Why not?

3 A. I don't know. I don't know why I didn't. I
4 just -- it was a piece -- it was my senior year, I know
5 that, because it was my art class my senior year,
6 because I felt that shouldn't have been in the class my
7 senior year. But he saw my artwork and he thought it
8 was amazing, and he wanted to send it into a college.
9 And I just wasn't interested at that time.

10 Q. Okay. What types of jobs have you had?

11 A. I've had lots of receptionist jobs. I've
12 worked at restaurants. I did sales for hair products.
13 I might be missing a couple of things, but it will come
14 back to me. I mean, those are my main things that I can
15 remember as of right now. If things come back to me
16 throughout --

17 Q. You've mentioned several times you've got
18 memory problems. Has that ever been diagnosed,
19 evaluated?

20 A. No, I've never had it diagnosed. I've never,
21 I've never really looked into it myself. I've never
22 mentioned it. I just usually talk about my problems to
23 my therapist.

24 Q. I mean, a lot of things can affect memory
25 such as head trauma, substance use, vitamin

1 deficiency. Some people just don't concentrate and
2 are a little spacey to begin with. If you had to
3 guess, what --

4 A. I mean, I don't know if it can run in a
5 family. I don't know how that works because my
6 grandmother and mother both have -- they forget
7 horribly.

8 Q. Okay. Mother and grandmother, you said?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And grandmother's forgetting is not like
11 dementia? It's --

12 A. No, no, no. It's like, oh, I forget the last
13 time you called me, things like that. I mean, it's not
14 like I'm like, oh, you know -- I just, time frames and
15 things like that, I can, you know, ballpark it, like,
16 you know, you and I have both said. But for me to put,
17 you know, my finger on the exact date, it's hard. I
18 have to sit there and like, like you said, figure out my
19 car situation, when I got my car, or this, that, and the
20 other. You know. Do you want me to explain this, that,
21 and the other?

22 Q. No. Is it something that's impaired your
23 ability to work?

24 A. There is times when I have had jobs where
25 people will tell me what to do. And I'm just, I act

1 like I listen, and I will be sitting there, and I'm
2 like, what did they just tell me? But I've noticed, you
3 know, Adderall helps that tremendously. When I'm on
4 Adderall, I'm very, like, you know, a sponge and I'm
5 sucking everything in, and I want to just work and do
6 something.

7 But if I'm, you know, other than that,
8 it's just I, I, I go to a job and they explain
9 something and it's like I'm listening, but then I'm
10 like, what did they just say to me?

11 Q. Did you take Adderall today?

12 A. Yeah.

13 Q. Okay. I just -- any other medicines you
14 took today?

15 A. No.

16 Q. So, from the sounds of it, it's more just,
17 you know, the concentration, the ADD part that you
18 miss things, not that you have memory problems in
19 the sense of traumatic brain injury?

20 A. Traumatic brain injury as in a concussion or
21 something like that, I've never had anything like that.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. I'm not sure if it's just, I've never -- like
24 I said, I've never had it diagnosed, so I don't know.
25 But I have memory, I have a memory problem, like, I

1 mean, I've noticed that, I'm like, people say, oh, you
2 don't remember when we went to Disney World? No, you
3 know, I don't remember that. And I don't know if it's
4 the ADD or it could be something else. I don't know
5 100 percent. But when I'm on Adderall I can focus.

6 Q. Do you remember general facts?

7 A. As in --

8 Q. As in who's the first president of the
9 United States?

10 A. Yeah. I'm just not that intelligent to
11 remember every president there is, but, you know --

12 Q. Well, there's very few people out there
13 who remember every, you know --

14 A. Well, I mean, I would -- yeah.

15 Q. But what I'm, what I'm, what I'm asking
16 is, is like general things --

17 A. Oh, yeah, I mean, yes, it's not like --

18 Q. It's not you go off --

19 A. It's kind of --

20 Q. -- kind of sophisticated autobiographical,
21 or...

22 A. Yeah, it's not, it's not like, well, I don't
23 know who that is or I don't know that, you know, it's
24 not like that. It's just, there are certain time frames
25 in my life that I remember. It's not the exact -- I

1 guess I should say it different. It's not the time
2 frame. It's, it's basically what happened. I can
3 remember in around the area, but to put my finger on a
4 date, or exactly when is what I have problems with.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. I guess you could say.

7 Q. And again, you've not forgotten tasks that
8 you've learned like how to drive a car or --

9 A. No, no, not at all, no.

10 Q. And you do okay with speaking or
11 word-finding difficulties or...

12 A. Sometimes, I mean, but I have seen other
13 people do this, so, I mean, but I'd be like, oh, my
14 gosh, it's on the tip of my tongue, I can't remember the
15 word, things like that I do.

16 Q. Do you think you do that more than the
17 people around you?

18 A. No, it's just -- if I, probably when I think
19 about it more, I'm like, oh, I hope I can remember this.
20 And then I go and say it and I'm like, it's really bad,
21 but I can't think of it. But I have had that happen.
22 I've seen other people do it too. I mean, I've never
23 really looked into that, so I'm not really --

24 Q. And again, I think everybody's had that
25 experience --

1 A. Yeah.

2 Q. -- once or twice. The question is: Is it
3 something that's more --

4 A. No, it's not --

5 Q. -- irritating than creating a problem for
6 you?

7 A. No, not that I'm aware of, not that I can
8 think of.

9 Q. Okay. So you said -- can you give me the
10 names of some of the places you've worked?

11 A. I've worked at Steamer's which was a
12 restaurant and I was a hostess.

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. I've worked, I've worked at Trade Secret. I'm
15 not doing these in order. I'm just randomly thinking.

16 Q. That's fine.

17 A. Trade Secret which was the sales hair. I sold
18 shampoos, conditioners, flat irons. I've worked at
19 Mazda as a receptionist, sales -- I don't know. They
20 tried to get me to do something else there, but I don't
21 remember the name of what it was. Basically just sell
22 the cars on the phones to get them interested to come
23 and look at a car.

24 Q. Okay.

25 A. I worked at my stepfather's job, Coral Ridge

1 Country Club, as a receptionist/hostess/you know,
2 seating them.

3 Q. Have you ever been fired from a job?

4 A. Fired? No, not that I can think of.

5 Q. Why do you usually change work -- and I'm
6 sorry. You were about to say something.

7 A. I'm just -- there was another job that I was
8 thinking of. I also worked at a mortgage company as a
9 receptionist, but I don't know the name of it. It was
10 off of Commercial.

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. And you said why did I move jobs so much?

13 Q. Uh-huh.

14 A. Part of it was moving. Most of it was moving.

15 Q. And you were moving so much because --

16 A. It was just, I didn't have transportation.

17 Like I didn't have my car, when it like, for instance,
18 Steamer's, I worked at Steamer's. And basically my dad
19 dropped me off at work and stuff. I was a freshman.
20 I'm guessing a freshman, sophomore, ballparking it. And
21 basically we moved, and then he didn't want to take me
22 all the way over to there. So I didn't have a job for a
23 while, and then I started working at Trade Secret --

24 Q. Okay.

25 A. -- which was at the Wellington mall which is

1 next to where I live.

2 Q. Okay. So it was mostly transportation,
3 moving --

4 A. Basically.

5 Q. -- is why you would change work?

6 A. Yeah.

7 Q. What's the longest you worked at any one
8 place?

9 A. My longest was, I think, Trade Secret.

10 Q. Okay. How long were you there?

11 A. A year to two years. I'm not sure. A year, a
12 year-and-a-half, two years.

13 Q. Okay. Let me think where I want to go
14 with it here. ever receive any awards or
15 recommendations or certificates of accomplishment at
16 work, or school, or the community, or...

17 A. From what I can remember right now, no.

18 Q. Okay. Ever receive any disciplinary
19 actions at work or reprimands, or...

20 A. I wore jeans to work one time and they got mad
21 at me.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. That was at Trade Secret, but...

24 Q. And I'm assuming it was not casual Friday?

25 A. No.

1 Q. Okay. Have you ever been on disability,
 2 welfare, unemployment, SSI?
 3 A. I have been on WIC.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. When I had my daughter.
 6 Q. Anything else about employment that you
 7 think would be helpful for me to know or I should
 8 know or...
 9 A. I'm trying to think. There might have been, I
 10 mean, some things that I'm missing.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. For right now, I can't --
 13 Q. If anything else comes to mind, just let
 14 me know.
 15 A. Yeah.
 16 Q. Military history, have you ever been in
 17 the military?
 18 A. No, my husband. That's it. My grandfather
 19 was a colonel in the Army.
 20 Q. Okay. And how are you doing being a Naval
 21 wife?
 22 A. It's, it's difficult, you know. It's really
 23 been hard to do something like that because it's not
 24 like you're together all the time, you know. It's just,
 25 it's hard to do it. You have to have a lot of strength

1 in order to do that.
 2 Q. All right. Well, let's get into the
 3 dating relationship side of things. What age did
 4 you start dating?
 5 A. Dating?
 6 Q. Uh-huh.
 7 A. Probably when I was -- dating as in
 8 boyfriend/girlfriend type of thing?
 9 Q. Yeah.
 10 A. My first boyfriend was actually my husband.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. But, I mean, we broke up and didn't talk for a
 13 while too, so that's --
 14 Q. Okay.
 15 A. -- where the other people come in between.
 16 Q. How old were you when you first started
 17 dating?
 18 A. I guess 13.
 19 Q. Okay. So that would still be middle
 20 school time or ...
 21 A. Yes, that was like eighth grade I dated. It
 22 sounds weird, but I dated my husband in eighth grade.
 23 Q. Okay. How many significant relationships
 24 have you had?
 25 A. What do you mean by significant, as in --

1 Q. As in important to you?
 2 A. Important? [REDACTED], five. I'm ballparking it
 3 to be honest because this is going to be hard.
 4 Q. Okay. So, the first one was your husband.
 5 A. Was my husband. It know, it sounds weird, but
 6 my husband.
 7 Q. What's your husband's name?
 8 A. A.G.
 9 Q. Okay. And you dated for a while and...
 10 A. I mean, we dated for a little bit, and --
 11 Q. A month, two months?
 12 A. Like a month, and it was in middle school.
 13 Q. Okay. But you have known him since eighth
 14 grade?
 15 A. Yes.
 16 Q. When did you get reacquainted as
 17 girlfriend, boyfriend/girlfriend?
 18 A. It was not boyfriend/girlfriend. We became
 19 really close friends.
 20 Q. Okay.
 21 A. Probably my junior year in high school because
 22 we went to schools together but we didn't talk anymore.
 23 Like, it was weird. We just stopped.
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. And then my junior year he approached me and

1 said, let's drop everything, and let's be friends again.
 2 And that's what happened so...
 3 Q. Was it a bad break-up in the eighth grade?
 4 A. Basically --
 5 Q. You said drop everything. So it sounds
 6 like there was history or...
 7 A. We took each other's virginity.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. That's a lot of information, but I'm sure
 10 you're going to ask at some point. We took each other's
 11 virginity. And it was just like that. It was like, you
 12 know, it hurt me, and it's just like, he like went out
 13 of my life and I was like, wow, what just happened.
 14 Q. Again, I need a little clarification
 15 there. I'm going to try and --
 16 A. Basically, he took my virginity and acted like
 17 a guy and just left.
 18 Q. Okay. When you said "hurt me," did you
 19 mean physically --
 20 A. No, just hurt me --
 21 Q. -- he actually hurt --
 22 A. -- emotionally like I was like okay, great.
 23 That's, you know, great.
 24 Q. How long did that bother you for?
 25 A. Bothered me for a little while, you know, I

1 mean, when a girl does something like that for the first
 2 time and they just leave, it's like, okay. You know, it
 3 affects you a little bit. I mean, I -- it affected me
 4 for like a good year or two.
 5 Q. Okay. And help me out here. When you say
 6 "just leave" --
 7 A. I mean --
 8 Q. -- you mean that exact night, he said
 9 thanks, and walked out, and you didn't see him for
 10 two or three years or the next couple of meetings
 11 were a little awkward and then he just kind of
 12 disappeared or...
 13 A. Basically, like, I mean, he was there after,
 14 but I mean, we still saw each other a couple times
 15 afterward but it was awkward and when we just started
 16 like not liking each other.
 17 Q. Okay. And did this experience take place
 18 in a house or car or --
 19 A. Yeah, in a house.
 20 Q. -- in an rush situation or was it --
 21 A. It was house. It was my dad's house.
 22 Q. So junior year you said you got back
 23 together?
 24 A. Not that we got back together. We just became
 25 friends again.

1 Q. Okay.
 2 A. And my feelings did come back to where I, I
 3 was interested again. He was a good looking guy, so --
 4 Q. Well, you got married so --
 5 A. And had a kid, so -- yeah, I mean--
 6 Q. Did you get married first or have the
 7 child first?
 8 A. No, we got married first.
 9 Q. Married first.
 10 A. Yes.
 11 Q. Okay. I thought you had said you had been
 12 married for about four years so I assumed --
 13 A. No, it's three. Remember I said four, and
 14 then I was like, no, three.
 15 Q. Right.
 16 A. This December my daughter is going to be two
 17 in four days, so I mean, it was quick. Everything was
 18 quick. He proposed to me in October. Got married in
 19 December and moved to Virginia, January. Got pregnant
 20 in February.
 21 Q. Okay. So, October to December, married?
 22 A. October he proposed.
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. December we got married. January I moved to
 25 Virginia with him.

1 Q. Okay. I assume he was stationed up there?
 2 A. Yes, and that's why it sort of had to be
 3 pushed because of the military. Because the military
 4 basically you get BAH, and it helps you out if you have
 5 a family, because if I moved there.
 6 Q. On base?
 7 A. Yes.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. He would have to be living, in, you know, the
 10 barracks which is like the ones that the guys that are
 11 not married live in on base. And I, what would I do
 12 living there. You know. So, basically the military
 13 pushed us to get married faster than we really were
 14 planning to. Like I mean, I planned my wedding in a
 15 couple of weeks. It was a small wedding.
 16 Q. So, how long did you date before he
 17 proposed?
 18 A. Let me think. I'm going to say a good, I'm
 19 going to ballpark it, between five to six months. We
 20 were actually dating because when he was in, you know,
 21 basic training in Pensacola and Jacksonville, I would
 22 drive and see him every weekend.
 23 Q. How is the relationship now?
 24 A. Excuse me. As of --
 25 Q. We can get a little water if you like.

1 A. Oh, no, I'm okay. It's just -- I'm fine. As
 2 of now, we are really trying to work on it. You know,
 3 marriage is a very hard thing to do. You know, I have
 4 trust issues, like I said, with men. It's hard for me
 5 to trust my husband. And if there is no trust, it's
 6 hard to have a relationship. So, I'm trying to get to
 7 the point to trust him and become closer with him. You
 8 know, we, we got on bad terms, you know, since he's been
 9 gone.
 10 And you know, we've had our previous
 11 fights before because it's also, we're so used to
 12 each other and familiar with each other. And, you
 13 know, once you're with somebody for so long, you
 14 sort of lose respect. Not that you're supposed to,
 15 but we're young and we have known each other since
 16 we were 13 years old. You know, it's too
 17 comfortable. And we're young. And we had a kid
 18 really fast, you know, that we weren't ready for.
 19 It just happened.
 20 And it was a lot of stress on us because
 21 when we were in Virginia, there was nobody. It's
 22 just me, him, and our daughter. And you know, I was
 23 a stay-at-home mom, so I didn't have any friends,
 24 and it was really hard on us, and we basically got
 25 into it a lot. And I had a lot of trust issues and

1 I was thinking he was doing things behind my back.
 2 And, but now we're really trying to work it out. I
 3 mean, we are doing pretty good the past couple of
 4 months.
 5 Q. Okay. Is he on a co-ed ship or --
 6 A. I'm sorry?
 7 Q. Is he on a co-ed ship or --
 8 A. Women?
 9 Q. Uh-huh.
 10 A. Yes, yes.
 11 Q. Do you regret getting married?
 12 A. No, I don't regret it. I mean, I feel like
 13 everything went really fast. Like I would have liked to
 14 have been engaged for a while and had a huge wedding and
 15 planned it out for a while, and you know, maybe waited
 16 to have babies, but I mean, I love my daughter and I
 17 would never take her back. She's my world.
 18 But I think you should enjoy, you know,
 19 your life with your spouse for at least five years
 20 before you have kids. But some people, you know,
 21 things happen and you just deal with them the best
 22 way you can.
 23 Q. Has there ever been any issues of domestic
 24 violence between you and him either while you were
 25 dating or since you got married?

1 A. Yeah.
 2 Q. Did you hit him, he hit you?
 3 A. There was one encounter where we hit each
 4 other.
 5 Q. What happened there?
 6 A. He -- I don't remember what the fight was
 7 about. But he lost his temper and I threw the phone at
 8 him. And he came over, and, because it hit him in his
 9 forehead, and then he came over and hit me with the
 10 phone.
 11 Q. Okay. So, you threw the phone at him and
 12 then he hit you with the phone?
 13 A. Yeah.
 14 Q. Okay. How long ago was that?
 15 A. That was probably -- I'm going to say almost,
 16 almost, almost a year and a half ago. I'm guessing a
 17 year. I mean, but we discussed it and never again was
 18 that going to happen.
 19 Q. Were the police called?
 20 A. No.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. It was sort of we just were like, what are we
 23 doing? Like this is ridiculous so --
 24 Q. I want to make sure I've got my time frame
 25 right. You weren't pregnant at the time?

1 A. No, no, no.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. This was after my daughter.
 4 Q. That's what I thought. I just wanted to
 5 make sure I got --
 6 A. Yeah, no, no, no. He was actually pretty good
 7 when I was pregnant.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. Sometimes. He liked to go out a lot and that
 10 I had a problem with when I was pregnant.
 11 Q. Out meaning with the guys or...
 12 A. Out with the guys.
 13 Q. To bars or softball...
 14 A. No, to bars, which I didn't approve of but
 15 that's what he felt that he had to do.
 16 Q. Are you concerned he has a problem with
 17 alcohol?
 18 A. I did. I think that he had a problem with
 19 alcohol because he likes to drink. He hasn't, from what
 20 he's told me, which I sort of believe because when
 21 you're on a ship, you don't really have access to
 22 alcohol, that he hasn't really had that many drinks
 23 since he's been deployed.
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. And plus he is going up in rank, and he can

1 get in trouble because people that he is, you know, he
 2 goes to a port and if he goes off with people under his
 3 grade, you know as in like an E-3 and he get drunks with
 4 them, he can get in big trouble for that, if he, you
 5 know, because the drinking age is 18 in these other
 6 places, but you have to be 21 because it's the ship
 7 rules not -- you see what I'm saying?
 8 So he can get in big trouble if he's out
 9 there getting wasted with these other people that
 10 he's hanging out with and lose his rank. And he is
 11 really good at what he does. With work-wise he is
 12 very dedicated to his job.
 13 Q. What's his MO or...
 14 A. Like what does he do? He is in AO, Aviation
 15 Ordinance. He works on the weapons, on the helicopters.
 16 Q. Okay. So does he repair it or just load
 17 them or both?
 18 A. He does both. He is repairing them and
 19 working on them, putting them in, stuff like that.
 20 Q. Are you worried about him doing that type
 21 of work?
 22 A. Yes. It worries me because he is working with
 23 explosives and, you know, all that kind of stuff. I
 24 mean, anything can happen. You know, they don't even
 25 let him wear his wedding ring because --

1 Q. It can cause a spark and --

2 A. I didn't believe him at first. He took me to

3 his job and they actually have a poster of a guy missing

4 his wedding ring finger, and this is, it says this is

5 what happens when you wear your wedding ring at work.

6 So, I was like, okay. Yeah. So, now I believe what he

7 is telling me.

8 Q. I had a grandfather who was an electrician

9 and didn't wear one for the same reason.

10 A. Oh, yeah.

11 Q. (Inaudible.)

12 A. I understand now. But before I was like, oh,

13 sure, I'm sure that's what it is until he showed me a

14 poster and I was, like, oh, all right. I don't want you

15 coming out like that.

16 Q. Yeah. Okay. So we talked about him a

17 bit. And we have got roughly four others to

18 discuss. So who was the other significant

19 relationships?

20 A. There was [REDACTED].

21 Q. Okay. How do you spell his last name?

22 A. [REDACTED].

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. I mean, it wasn't anything big. It was for

25 like a, you know it was still -- I think it was, it was

1 after Andy. And I dated him -- it was, I mean --

2 Q. A month, six months?

3 A. It was only like a month or two also. It

4 wasn't anything -- I was young. It was -- you know, a

5 month to me at that age was a long time.

6 Q. Roughly how old or what grade?

7 A. It was roughly 14-ish.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. We just dated and that was basically it.

10 There was nothing really major with him. It was just

11 one of my relationships.

12 Q. Was he roughly the same age?

13 A. Oh, yeah. He was the same age.

14 Q. Why did you break up?

15 A. Because I got annoyed with him. He just was

16 too clingy.

17 Q. Okay. All right. next one?

18 A. [REDACTED]. Do you want his last name?

19 Q. Yes, please.

20 A. [REDACTED], [REDACTED].

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. He was like my first like big, you know, like,

23 it was almost like, I don't know how long it was, but it

24 was a while and I got really attached to him.

25 Q. If we can ballpark that one a little bit,

1 three months, six months?

2 A. Probably around six months to a year.

3 Q. Okay. How old were you when that

4 happened?

5 A. I was 14, 15. Ballparking it again, but I

6 know it was, you know, around 14 or 15. But he was

7 older. He was like 17.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. And I --

10 Q. Do you remember what grade you were in?

11 Would that be eighth or ninth?

12 A. No, it wasn't my middle school. It was like

13 freshman or sophomore.

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. Thinking more along sophomore. I'm thinking

16 freshman or sophomore. I don't know, one or the two. I

17 dated him. But he treated like crap. He cheated on me

18 and he got into drugs. And I knew he was cheating on me

19 but I still stayed with him. And finally I just

20 couldn't take it anymore and I left him.

21 Q. Okay. What type of drugs did he do?

22 A. He just, from what I know all he did was smoke

23 pot, but I wasn't really -- I didn't like that.

24 Q. How many times did he cheat on you?

25 A. I have no idea. I really -- it's not that I

1 caught him. I just heard about it all the time. I had

2 random girls call me and I did this with him and --

3 Q. So more than once with one person?

4 A. Him cheating?

5 Q. Yeah.

6 A. Oh, yeah, I meant with more than one person.

7 Q. Right.

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Were there any issues of domestic violence

10 in that relationship, dating violence?

11 A. I mean, it was like mental abuse, just you

12 know, things, putting me down and me putting him down.

13 Nothing physical.

14 Q. I notice you're coughing a little bit. Is

15 that, are you coming down with a cold, getting over

16 a cold?

17 A. No, my daughter had a cough and now I have it,

18 but it's like I've had it for a little bit. It will

19 go -- I smoke cigarettes, so it really doesn't help

20 basically.

21 Q. Understand that. Okay. Did he have any

22 affiliation with any gangs or any legal problems

23 or...

24 A. I heard that he went to jail.

25 Q. Okay.

1 A. Like, but I wasn't talking to him at this
 2 point. It was like a couple years ago or something. I
 3 just heard about it through people.
 4 Q. And your, your husband Andy, does he have
 5 any run-in's with the law or any problems?
 6 A. No.
 7 Q. Okay. So after [REDACTED] --
 8 A. [REDACTED] there was [REDACTED], (Spelled last
 9 name.)
 10 Q. (Misspelled last name.)
 11 A. No, (Spelled last name.)
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. I dated him, I think, I'm pretty sure it was
 14 my junior year, my junior year. And I dated him for a
 15 little bit. But it was probably three to four, five
 16 months maybe.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. And we just broke up because, I don't know. I
 19 just -- I don't know, I just didn't really want to be
 20 with him anymore.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. And then there was [REDACTED], [REDACTED], [REDACTED],
 23 [REDACTED].
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. And I dated him when I was out of high school.

1 respected that.
 2 So, I mean I still talked to Andy here and
 3 there, but wasn't like anything we used to be,
 4 really close friends. And then when I started like,
 5 you know, feeling like [REDACTED] was cheating on me, I
 6 would call Andy to talk to him about it. He was
 7 like don't worry about it, don't stress it. You
 8 know. It will come out into the open.
 9 And basically the day [REDACTED] broke up with
 10 me, and I went to Andy's house, and, you know, I was
 11 crying and he was just talking to me and we became
 12 close friends again. And that's basically, you
 13 know --
 14 Q. -- the circle. Is there any concerns with
 15 David cheating on you?
 16 A. David cheating on me? I don't think so.
 17 Q. Okay. And then [REDACTED], there was --
 18 A. Oh, yeah, [REDACTED], yeah.
 19 Q. And then [REDACTED]?
 20 A. No, not that I know of. No, I don't think so.
 21 Q. Okay. I want to ask a little bit about
 22 sexual history. And again try and be respectful and
 23 use medical terms.
 24 A. Yeah.
 25 Q. Do you prefer men, women, or both.

1 We probably dated for three or four months, and then he
 2 left me.
 3 Q. Okay. Maybe hard to know, but do you know
 4 why he left or...
 5 A. He left because he wanted to party and wanted
 6 to get into drugs and I was against, drugs or me, you
 7 know, I did not -- it's, it's not me. I have tried
 8 drugs, don't get me wrong, but I'm not going to be with
 9 someone that's constantly doing drugs. So, I noticed he
 10 started getting into drugs, and I was just like, no, I'm
 11 not. I can't deal with this. And I notice he started
 12 like side, you know, going off and texting people. And
 13 he was older though. He was 26 and I was 18.
 14 Q. Were you worried he was cheating on you?
 15 A. Oh, yeah. But he left me and I guess he
 16 wanted a girl to go party with him and stuff like that,
 17 so...
 18 Q. Okay.
 19 A. And then basically me and [REDACTED] broke up. It
 20 was hard for me because I really did like [REDACTED] a lot.
 21 And Andy, my husband, was basically there for me for the
 22 break-up. And that's how we started becoming, you
 23 know -- because when I was dating [REDACTED], I sort of
 24 stopped talking to Andy because [REDACTED] didn't like how
 25 close we were. You know. And I understood and

1 A. Men.
 2 Q. Have you ever been with a woman?
 3 A. Yes.
 4 Q. Okay. How many times?
 5 A. Just one time.
 6 Q. Okay. And I know we said we would talk
 7 about Epstein separately, but was that one time
 8 while you were at Mr. Epstein's or was that one
 9 time --
 10 A. No, me, me and my friend that went, I'm sorry,
 11 me and my friend that went, we didn't do anything with
 12 each other. Thank goodness.
 13 Q. Okay. Have you done group sex?
 14 A. No.
 15 Q. Now, I thought I was meant to ask this
 16 under employment history: Have you ever worked as
 17 an adult entertainer?
 18 A. No.
 19 Q. Again Epstein issues aside, have you ever
 20 worked as a prostitute?
 21 A. No.
 22 Q. Have you ever engaged in sexual activity
 23 or favors for food, shelter, or drugs?
 24 A. No.
 25 Q. Have you ever been photographed or videoed

1 while engaging in sexual activities?
 2 A. You mean, like me and my husband did stuff
 3 like that, but it was, like, between us. It wasn't like
 4 you know -- it was like stupid little things. It wasn't
 5 anything like being produced or anything, you know.
 6 Q. Okay. So, you haven't worked
 7 professionally in the porn industry?
 8 A. No, it was just like, you know, couples
 9 together, me and him.
 10 Q. Were you married at that time?
 11 A. Yeah, I was, yeah.
 12 Q. And it hasn't been posted on UTube?
 13 A. No.
 14 Q. Gone viral, or clip of the week somewhere?
 15 A. No, it was just me and my husband.
 16 Q. Okay.
 17 A. It was just for us.
 18 Q. If you need clarification on this
 19 question, feel free. Are you into any unusual
 20 sexual practices or practices that others may
 21 consider unusual such as fetish activities, animals,
 22 bondage, S&M, infantilism, defecation, urination,
 23 cutting, vampires?
 24 A. Oh, my gosh, no, no. Just no, no.
 25 Q. Okay. And again there's a lot of fetishes

1 out there. I can't name all of them.
 2 A. I mean, like --
 3 Q. Special clothing?
 4 A. No. Just regular, I don't know if you want to
 5 get into it, but just, you know --
 6 Q. Okay. Have you given oral sex?
 7 A. To my husband, yeah.
 8 Q. Have you received oral sex?
 9 A. From my husband, yes.
 10 Q. Okay. Just with your husband?
 11 A. Yeah, that's something, that's something, that
 12 you know, I feel is --
 13 Q. An intimate, personal --
 14 A. Yeah.
 15 Q. Have you had anybody insert fingers into
 16 your vagina?
 17 A. Into my -- jeez, these are some questions.
 18 Yeah.
 19 Q. Roughly how old?
 20 A. It was, jeez, probably from, from my boyfriend
 21 [REDACTED]. I mean [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. I mean, wow, these
 22 are some personal questions.
 23 Q. I know. I'm not trying to be graphic.
 24 A. No, I know.
 25 Q. I'm trying to be very matter of fact.

1 A. Yes.
 2 Q. Okay. have you had issues or experienced
 3 men putting fingers in your anus, rectum?
 4 A. No.
 5 Q. Okay. Have you tried anal sex?
 6 A. No.
 7 Q. Have you used marital aides or toys with
 8 any of your partners?
 9 A. Yeah.
 10 Q. Which toys?
 11 A. Toys as in like vibrators?
 12 Q. Vibrators.
 13 A. Yeah, just like --
 14 Q. Penis rings?
 15 A. Jeez.
 16 Q. Lotions, jells?
 17 A. Yes, I've used lubricant, motion lotion. I
 18 mean, just like not -- like clit stimulators, you know.
 19 Q. Uh-huh.
 20 A. Things like that.
 21 Q. Okay. What age did you first use
 22 something like that and do you still use it
 23 currently when you're intimate with your husband?
 24 A. Oh, man. Basically, I mean, you know, I did
 25 things alone with vibrators, you know, when I wasn't

1 with anybody. And with my husband is like, I mean,
 2 besides Epstein, because Epstein did try to use a
 3 vibrator on me. But Epstein aside, the only person that
 4 I really used, you know, toy, the toy vibrator with is
 5 my husband.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. But I have used like the lubricant with,
 8 probably my boyfriends, yeah, them.
 9 Q. Okay. Roughly what age do you think you
 10 first used lubricants?
 11 A. Probably 15, 16.
 12 Q. Put an approximate sign there.
 13 A. Okay. Yeah. That's fine. I mean, that's
 14 something that I can't put my finger on.
 15 Q. I understand there's been periods of
 16 separation with you and your husband, him being in
 17 the Navy.
 18 A. Uh-huh.
 19 Q. When you were together in the same
 20 location, how is your personal life or your physical
 21 intimacy?
 22 A. As in when my husband and I come back
 23 together or --
 24 Q. Uh-huh, like the last time he was
 25 stationed in town or both of you when he came back.

1 A. Oh, when he -- because he came here and
 2 visited, because I actually came here before he went on
 3 his main deployment.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. So, when he came here you are saying how was
 6 our sex life?
 7 Q. Yeah.
 8 A. Well, I was, after I had my daughter, I'm not
 9 going to lie to you, it, I wasn't interested anymore. I
 10 honestly felt he was a chore.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. And then when he came back to see me, it was,
 13 you know, I basically got my sex drive back I guess you
 14 could say.
 15 Q. Okay. Before your daughter, ballpark, how
 16 many times a week or a month would you and your
 17 husband be intimate, or a day?
 18 A. Oh, man. Once or twice a day.
 19 Q. And again trying to be matter of fact --
 20 A. I understand, yeah.
 21 Q. Self-stimulation, what age did you first
 22 masturbate?
 23 A. I didn't even -- I wasn't masturbating. Like
 24 I had sex before I even masturbated. Probably when I
 25 was 14. Like self-masturbation is what you're talking

1 about, like me doing it to me?
 2 Q. Yes.
 3 A. 14, I guess. Yeah, 14, 15-ish.
 4 Q. And there is petting or foreplay with
 5 dating. So, I don't know if that's what you were
 6 wondering about?
 7 A. Yeah, that's what, but, uh-huh.
 8 Q. When did that start?
 9 A. As in touching each other?
 10 Q. Uh-huh.
 11 A. I told you, probably like I told you [redacted] is
 12 when I started it. So, what was he -- did I tell you my
 13 freshman year, I think said. My freshman. I forget,
 14 freshman, sophomore year is when I dated him.
 15 Q. Okay. Prior to Mr. Epstein, had you seen
 16 an adult man naked?
 17 A. No.
 18 Q. Had you seen somebody your own age naked?
 19 A. Yeah.
 20 Q. Your own age male would you say?
 21 A. Yeah, I mean, I mean, when you said older
 22 man --
 23 Q. Adult man, yeah.
 24 A. Adult, like so, I mean --
 25 Q. Twenty and older.

1 A. No.
 2 Q. No. Okay. But when you were
 3 hypothetically 16, you had seen a 16-year-old?
 4 A. Yes.
 5 Q. Okay. 15, a 15-year-old?
 6 A. Huh, uh-huh.
 7 Q. Somebody within about three or four years?
 8 A. Yeah.
 9 Q. Okay. I'm trying to think if there is
 10 anything I've forgotten.
 11 A. No, we have got pretty much everything
 12 covered. Jeez.
 13 Q. I'm sorry. One other question, how often
 14 a month do you self-stimulate now?
 15 A. Oh, my goodness. Probably every other day.
 16 Oh, my gosh. This is embarrassing.
 17 Q. Okay. Would now be a good time to talk
 18 about Epstein, or would you prefer to talk about
 19 something else for a while?
 20 A. It's, it's whatever you need me to do,
 21 whatever you prefer me to do.
 22 Q. Well, you just said this was kind of an
 23 embarrassing conversation. So I don't know if you
 24 wanted to --
 25 A. He's --

1 Q. -- do that now and get it kind of over
 2 with --
 3 A. Maybe I should --
 4 Q. (Inaudible.)
 5 A. Yeah, probably just the --
 6 Q. Or would you like to take a break, because
 7 it's probably getting close to tape time anyway.
 8 A. So, you just want to take a break? I mean, I
 9 could smoke a cigarette if you want to take a break, if
 10 you say --
 11 Q. Why don't we go ahead and take a break?
 12 A. Okay.
 13 Q. Because I think, you know, they need to
 14 change out the tape in a few minutes.
 15 A. Yeah. Okay.
 16 Q. So, we'll just stop here. And feel free
 17 to grab a cigarette.
 18 A. Okay.
 19 Q. And if you would like a bottle of water or
 20 anything, we can get one for you.
 21 A. Thank you.
 22 Q. Another question I have for you before we
 23 turn off the tape is we're going to want to do some
 24 kind of fill-in-the-bubble, multiple choice tests.
 25 A. Okay.

1 Q. And I know you said you took some Adderall
2 this morning.

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. Would you like to do one of those when we
5 came back from the break so we don't have issues of
6 it being later in the day and concentration being
7 problematic?

8 A. We can. It's yeah, whatever.

9 Q. Why don't we plan to do that when we come
10 back. I've got two of them. We'll do one which is
11 a little shorter and then we'll talk some more. And
12 then probably have lunch, and then after lunch we
13 may do the second one.

14 A. Second. Okay.

15 Q. And then finish up?

16 A. Okay. Sounds fine.

25 A. Okay.

1 Q. Use a soft black leaded pencil make a
2 heavy dark mark in filling in the circles. If you
3 make a mistake or change your mind, please erase the
4 mark fully and then fill in the correct circle. Do
5 not make any marks in this booklet. There is no

8 A. Okay.

9 Q. Your marital status, Ms. Jane Doe No. 5,
10 what do you consider your race ethnicity,
11 background?

12 A. Me?

13 Q. Right.

14 A. I'm white.

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. I'm Italian.

17 Q. Italian. Okay.

18 (The test was begun at 11:41.)

19 BY DR. HALL:

20 Q. Did you want to take a break or get back
21 into it?

22 A. We can get back into.

23 Q. All right.

24 A. I broke the pencil.

25 Q. If that's the worst thing that happens

1 today, it will be a good day.
 2 A. Yeah.
 3 Q. So why don't we talk about the, the
 4 Jeffrey Epstein experience. What, what happened?
 5 A. From the beginning?
 6 Q. Yes, please.
 7 A. Okay. Basically I heard from it in high
 8 school. I don't know who. I can't put a face to the
 9 name. I don't, I just don't remember who said
 10 something. Somebody basically told me if you go to this
 11 guy's house and give him a massage, you will receive
 12 \$200. I was like, okay. You know. I was like all
 13 right, you know, it doesn't sound bad.
 14 You know, at that age you just don't
 15 understand, you know, the consequences of what can
 16 happen I guess. So, basically, I went with one of
 17 my friends. I took a taxi there. And Jeffrey
 18 Epstein came to the door and paid for the taxi.
 19 Q. Who did you go with?
 20 A. [REDACTED].
 21 Q. Last name?
 22 A. [REDACTED].
 23 Q. Okay.
 24 A. And Jeffrey Epstein came to the door and gave
 25 us the money to give to the taxi. So, we paid the taxi

1 and we came back. And [REDACTED] was at the door.
 2 Q. Sorry to interrupt. Around what time of
 3 year was this? How old were you?
 4 A. Between 15 and 16, my freshman or my sophomore
 5 year. It would be either my later freshman year or
 6 sophomore year for sure because I was in Wellington High
 7 School, which those are the years that I went there.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. And --
 10 Q. Now, you took a cab. Were you old enough
 11 to drive at that period of time and just didn't have
 12 access to a car, or was this before you got your
 13 driver's license?
 14 A. No, this is before I got my license. I got my
 15 license when I was 18.
 16 Q. Okay.
 17 A. So, we basically paid for the taxi and we went
 18 back to the door. And it was [REDACTED], his assistant.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. So, [REDACTED] walked us, [REDACTED] walked us up to a
 21 stairs through his bedroom, into this bathroom-massage
 22 area. And she told us to wait there, that he would be
 23 right there. So, we sat on the couch just waiting and
 24 Jeffrey Epstein walks in.
 25 Q. Okay.

1 A. And he was in like sweats, I guess, you know,
 2 a sweat outfit.
 3 Q. Okay.
 4 A. And he literally took off his clothes, like,
 5 got naked, completely right there in front of my friend
 6 and I and jumped in the shower.
 7 And while he was in the shower he told us
 8 to remove our clothes down to our underwear and our
 9 bra. I don't recall if we took off our bra or not
 10 because I know he told us to take off our bra, but I
 11 didn't feel comfortable doing that.
 12 Q. If I can just stop you for a second here.
 13 A. Uh-huh.
 14 Q. Did you know you were going to go over at
 15 that time?
 16 A. I'm sorry, did I know I was going to go over
 17 there?
 18 Q. Right.
 19 A. Yeah, I knew I was going to over there.
 20 Q. Where did you leave from, like your house
 21 or from --
 22 A. I left from my, my house.
 23 Q. What time of the day was it, morning,
 24 afternoon?
 25 A. It was probably afternoon time. I'm guessing,

1 It wasn't night.
 2 Q. Was it during the school year or was it in
 3 between or --
 4 A. I think it was during.
 5 Q. Okay. Did you wear any special clothes
 6 when you went?
 7 A. No, I thought I was giving a massage.
 8 Q. Okay. So no one told you ahead of time to
 9 wear a certain style or --
 10 A. No, I just thought I was going to give a
 11 massage.
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. So, basically he was in the shower. He told
 14 us to remove our clothes down to our underwear and take
 15 off our bra also but I didn't feel comfortable. So I
 16 looked at my friend [REDACTED]. --
 17 Q. Had she been there before or was that her
 18 first time?
 19 A. No, that was both of our first times. And we
 20 don't --
 21 Q. I'm sorry. I don't mean to interrupt but
 22 it just --
 23 A. No.
 24 Q. Was it your idea to go or her idea to go?
 25 A. Somebody told us about this guy that you give

1 him a massage for \$200 and we go. And to us at that,
2 you know, we don't have that mentality to, you know,
3 think that something like this was going to happen. We
4 just thought \$200 is a lot of money at that age. We're
5 going to go.

6 Q. Okay.

7 A. And so he told us to remove our clothes. And
8 at that point we looked at each other like, this is a
9 little bit awkward. I mean, from when he got naked, we
10 look at each other like, you know, wow, you know, that's
11 really weird, you know. I don't know exactly what she
12 was feeling but I'm sure she went through the same thing
13 I did. I don't want to speak for her but I got really
14 nervous and tense, like I don't understand why this man
15 is telling us to get naked and why he is getting naked
16 as if, you know, this is a massage, you know.

17 So basically, he got out of the shower in
18 a towel and laid down on his massage bed. He laid
19 face down on his massage bed, and then he, I mean he
20 literally removed the towel, layed down and put the
21 towel back over his butt.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. And you know, he gave us massage lotion and my
24 friend massaged his back while I massaged like his legs
25

1 and his feet.

2 Q. How are you feeling at that point?

3 A. I was very uncomfortable but I was like, okay,
4 maybe it is just a massage. But on another hand I was
5 like why are we down to our, you know, underwear, like,
6 why is it that we're doing this.

7 Q. Did you ever think this isn't a good idea
8 and I should leave?

9 A. Yeah, that went through my mind the entire
10 time. But I was also 15 or 16 years of age and I'm not
11 going to call my parents and say, you know, hey, I'm at
12 my this guy's house, come pick me up. I was cared. I
13 didn't know what they would think.

14 Q. Scared of what?

15 A. I was scared of getting in trouble. You know.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. You know, in a way at that time period, at
18 that age I felt like I was putting myself into that
19 situation. But over the years I've learned that that's
20 basically what he wanted us to feel. That's why he
21 targeted young girls, because they were timid to call
22 their parents and tell them they are at some guy's house
23 and he's telling us to get naked. You know.

24 Q. All right.

25 A. And basically I'm massaging his legs and she's

1 massaging his back. You know, he talked to us. He
2 asked us some questions. He asked how old we were.

3 Q. Okay.

4 A. He asked, you know, how --

5 Q. What did you tell him?

6 A. I told him our age.

7 Q. Okay. So, told him you're 16?

8 A. Fifteen or 16. I don't remember exactly what
9 age, but it was 15 or 16. And then he asked about our
10 school, high school, how we're doing in school and stuff
11 like that.

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. And then I think we asked him what he did. I
14 don't really remember at this point what he said.

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. I'm trying to think what he said. I don't
17 remember. Maybe it will come back to me. But so we did
18 that, I'm guessing, for a half an hour to an hour. And
19 while he was laying down towards, like, the end of the
20 massage, he started feeling on my friend's leg.

21 Q. Okay.

22 A. And I looked at her as in, that's a little bit
23 weird, you know, for him to be doing that, like what's
24 going on.

25 So, she looked at me like I want to get

1 the hell out of here and I looked at her, yeah, you
2 know, we need to get out of here. I don't know how
3 to do this because if the man is capable to get
4 young girls in his house, get them naked, and you
5 know, start doing this, I don't know else he is
6 capable of doing.

7 And when you're that young, you know, you
8 don't know what to do. You're in that situation.
9 You know, when you put yourself -- like now I can
10 sit here and be like, yeah, I should have done this
11 or maybe I should have done that. But when you're
12 in that particular situation, you really can't
13 figure out what to do because you feel stuck. I
14 mean, he was an older man.

15 Q. Not to sound funny but --

16 A. No, go ahead.

17 Q. He's capable of getting a young girl and
18 getting them naked, I mean, he didn't ask you to
19 come, did he?

20 A. No, he didn't ask me to come, but he was
21 soliciting in a high school and saying it's a \$200
22 massage.

23 Q. Okay. How do you know he was soliciting
24 in the school?

25 A. Because I've heard of many girls that went and

1 did it. And he says -- at the end of the story, I'm
2 going to tell you, he said if you bring somebody back
3 and tell them it's a \$200 massage, I will give you \$400.

4 Q. Okay. Did he specifically tell you the
5 person you bring back should be somebody from high
6 school?

7 A. He just said any, you know, anybody that you
8 know, any of your friends.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. So -- basically.

11 Q. And when he asked you to take off your
12 clothes, he asked. Did he threaten?

13 A. He didn't threaten but when you're that
14 young --

15 Q. Did he raise his voice?

16 A. No, he didn't raise his voice, but it's
17 intimidating when you're that young and he is that old.
18 It's intimidating.

19 Q. Again, not to sound funny, but if any old
20 man came up to you and asked you to take off your
21 clothes, would you do it?

22 A. Not on the street or anything like that. But
23 when you're actually in that situation at his house, and
24 you're scared of what could happen if you possibly
25 declined what he was saying, yeah. You know, you have

1 to be in that situation. You know, I mean, any random
2 old man that came up to me and said, hey, take off your
3 clothes, no, I wouldn't do that.

4 But I was in that situation to where I was
5 at his house with no money, took a taxi there. I
6 had a phone but I'm scared to call my parents. Now,
7 what am I supposed to do? I mean, what if I walk
8 out and he starts getting violent with us. You
9 know. We're young. Our mentality isn't that it is
10 today. You know. Today maybe it would have been
11 different. When you're that young --

12 Q. Okay. Tell me, why were you worried he
13 could get violent?

14 A. Why because he is capable of having young
15 girls at his house. It's sick, it's -- if --

16 Q. I'm not sure how one necessarily directly
17 correlates to violence.

18 A. I'm sorry. That what?

19 Q. Just because he had young girls at his
20 house, how does that make him prone to violence?

21 A. Because if you decline somebody, they could
22 get violent as in if you said no, there is a possibility
23 that they can get mad or upset. They want what they
24 want.

25 Q. Okay. Did that happen to you before where

1 somebody asked you for something and you said no and
2 they got violent?

3 A. I'm not -- I mean, not like that situation.
4 But I mean, I've had, like, you know, I told you about
5 my stepfather and stuff like that that he would get
6 upset with me. I don't know if that is why I sort of
7 gave in because of my past experiences of getting in
8 trouble so much with, you know, my father and my
9 stepfather and all that. It was sort of intimidating
10 for me. Maybe that was why.

11 But from me, I'm speaking for myself,
12 nobody else, that's maybe why I sort of went through
13 with it that I was scared that something was going
14 to happen that was worse than what was going to
15 happen. I mean, I had no idea what to think.

16 Q. And you said that you had heard about this
17 at school and that other girls had done this?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. Had you heard of any of them having any
20 violence, any problems?

21 A. Well, I heard of, this was after the fact that
22 I did when I heard about like people doing this. Before
23 some girl mentioned to me about -- the first time I
24 heard about it was the first time I ever even heard of
25 his name or anything.

1 Q. And you don't remember which girls it was?

2 A. I have no idea.

3 Q. What she looked like?

4 A. I really have no idea. Like, I don't
5 remember.

6 Q. Same class, same age, did you know her,
7 not know her?

8 A. I think I was acquaintances, but I don't -- if
9 I was close to her, I would have remembered her. I
10 really don't know. Like I have been asked this before,
11 I really could not remember.

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. I really don't.

14 Q. Do you think [redacted] would remember?

15 A. I've asked her, but she doesn't remember
16 either. I mean, I've asked her if she has, and she
17 said -- I've asked her to give the answer, but I don't
18 remember.

19 Q. Okay. So, he's grabbing her.

20 A. Yes. He starts grabbing her on her leg, on
21 her butt.

22 Q. Okay.

23 A. And at this point, at this point we're very
24 uncomfortable, you know, from us taking our clothes off,
25 from him taking his clothes off, to now he's touching

1 her. It seems like it's escalating, you know, and we
2 were scared. We didn't know what to do. So then, you
3 know, he was touching her for a while and fondling her
4 and you could see it in her face that she was very
5 uncomfortable. So then he flips over.

6 Q. Did either of you ask him to stop?

7 A. There was a point -- when I go through the
8 story, there's points where I told him to stop, yes.

9 Q. Okay. But just at this point --

10 A. At this point we didn't --

11 Q. He said take off your clothes, you didn't
12 say stop?

13 A. When you're in the moment of what's going on,
14 it's not like you're sitting there and like, okay, you
15 know, what should I do right now, what's the good thing
16 to do. You're that young. You're not thinking at that
17 level. You know, it's not like you could just --

18 Q. You're, you're 15, 16, so I'm mean --

19 A. Yeah, but you're not --

20 Q. -- it's not like you're eight?

21 A. No, it's not like you're eight.

22 Q. You know, I mean --

23 A. It's also like you don't have the mentality
24 that I would now.

25 Q. Fair enough. But at the same time, did

1 you ask him to say, no, I don't feel comfortable
2 taking my clothes off?

3 A. Yeah, I did tell him at one point.

4 Q. Was that the first time you went and he
5 first asked --

6 A. When he went to touch me, I told him I didn't
7 feel comfortable.

8 Q. Okay. And again, when you, when he asked
9 to take off your clothes, did you say I'm not
10 comfortable being down to my underwear?

11 A. No.

12 Q. No. When he first started touching your
13 friend's leg, did either you or your friend say,
14 please, don't touch me there?

15 A. No, but we did start getting uncomfortable. I
16 mean, we're in that situation. We have to figure out
17 what to do. When you're in that exact situation, as I
18 said --

19 Q. Okay.

20 A. -- it's hard to sit there and --

21 Q. No, I'm just trying to figure out what you
22 actually did at each point.

23 A. Yeah.

24 Q. I'm not trying to pass judgment. I'm just
25 trying to understand.

1 A. Yeah.

2 Q. Okay. So, touching your friend's leg, I
3 think you said he turned over?

4 A. Uh-huh.

5 Q. Okay. What --

6 A. Started turning over and then he started
7 masturbating.

8 Q. Okay.

9 A. So at this point I just, I wanted to get out
10 of there. I really did. I stood behind my friend [REDACTED].

11 Q. Okay.

12 A. And he basically liked his nipples to be
13 played with. So, he basically took my friend's hands
14 and put them on his nipples. And I was behind her and I
15 was like whispering to her like, we need to get out of
16 here. This is crazy. Like I don't know what to do.

17 So, you know, he is masturbating and she's
18 touching his nipples. And you know, he's, doing his
19 thing with breathing all heavy. And I basically
20 just wanted to get out of there. And we didn't know
21 what to do. And then he starts, you know, fondling
22 her with his hand while he's masturbating, and he's
23 trying to go in her panties and --

24 Q. Okay. Sorry. I don't mean to get
25 graphic, fondling her, touching her chest?

1 A. Everything, touching her breasts. He was
2 touching her vagina.

3 Q. Did she still have her bra on at this
4 time?

5 A. I don't think she had her bra on at this time.

6 Q. Okay.

7 A. I don't -- everything went so fast during
8 this.

9 Q. Did she take it off or did he take it off?

10 A. I think she took it off. I don't, honestly I
11 don't know. I'm not going to say specifics. I don't
12 remember that.

13 Q. Well, specifics are helpful here so --

14 A. I understand specifics are helpful. I just
15 don't really remember that. Like, I will tell you as
16 much as I remember. I just don't remember that exact
17 thing.

18 Q. Your best recollection, though, is she had
19 her bra off at this time?

20 A. Yes, I'm pretty sure.

21 Q. Do you think she took it off herself?

22 A. I, I, think so.

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. I mean --

25 Q. Did you still have your bra on?

1 A. Yes.
 2 Q. Okay. You're standing behind her?
 3 A. I'm standing behind her and that's when I
 4 whispered, I said we've got to get out of here.
 5 Q. Okay.
 6 A. And she's just, like, I know.
 7 Q. And he was touching her down below as
 8 well?
 9 A. Yes.
 10 Q. Did she have her underwear on?
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. Okay. Could you see him touching her?
 13 A. Not that I saw him exactly. I mean, I knew he
 14 was touching her because I could see his hand down in
 15 that area. But it was like I saw from the front.
 16 Q. But you couldn't see his fingers, exactly
 17 where they were?
 18 A. No.
 19 Q. Or if they were on the outside of the
 20 underwear?
 21 A. Yeah, I couldn't really tell.
 22 Q. Okay.
 23 A. And basically, you know, she was saying she
 24 felt uncomfortable. And that's when we started to say
 25 this is not right; I'm uncomfortable.

1 Q. She said that to him?
 2 A. Yes.
 3 Q. Do you remember what she said?
 4 A. Well, when I -- basically he started doing it
 5 to me.
 6 Q. Okay. Now, are you still standing behind
 7 her?
 8 A. Yeah, basically but he was reaching over and
 9 pulling me to the side of her.
 10 Q. Okay.
 11 A. So, I was uncomfortable. And he basically was
 12 touching me in, you know in my private area, vagina.
 13 And --
 14 Q. On the outside of the underwear?
 15 A. The outside.
 16 Q. Okay.
 17 A. And I told him to stop numerous times. I
 18 said, stop, I feel uncomfortable.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. The thing he kept repeating to me is just let
 21 it go, just let it happen, just let it go.
 22 Q. Okay.
 23 A. And I just kept saying, you know, I don't, I
 24 don't really feel comfortable. This is not comfortable
 25 for me. The same scenario happened. And then he pulled

1 out a vibrator.
 2 Q. Okay. So, the first time you went, it was
 3 two of you. He touched you on the outside of your
 4 underwear?
 5 A. He tried to go in my underwear also.
 6 Q. Okay.
 7 A. But I told him, like, no, like I don't feel
 8 comfortable.
 9 Q. Okay.
 10 A. So then he pulled out a vibrator.
 11 Q. So when you told him don't go inside, he
 12 stopped doing that?
 13 A. He didn't completely stop. He kept
 14 persisting. I kept saying, no, I don't feel
 15 comfortable. No, I don't feel comfortable. And he
 16 just, just let it go, just let it happen. Just let it
 17 go. That's what he kept saying to me.
 18 Q. Okay.
 19 A. And I was like, I don't feel comfortable,
 20 stop, please. And he would, kept persisting and then he
 21 reached over and got a vibrator.
 22 Q. Okay.
 23 A. So basically he tried to use the vibrator on
 24 me and her. At one point I was just like, okay, maybe
 25 if I just like, let it happen it could just be over

1 with. I want to get out of here. So I stopped talking
 2 for a second, and I let him put it there. And then I
 3 decided, I couldn't do it. I was like, I don't feel
 4 comfortable doing this. I really don't. And he kept
 5 persisting again. He just kept saying the same thing to
 6 me which is the one that replays through my mind all the
 7 time, just let it go, just let it happen.
 8 Q. Okay.
 9 A. And the same situation happened with [REDACTED]. He
 10 tried it with her. He kept persisting and persisting.
 11 Q. Okay. Now, were you still standing right
 12 next to the table?
 13 A. It was like before in the beginning it was me
 14 and her. I was behind her like this. And then he sort
 15 of pulled me like, sort of like this with her.
 16 Q. Okay. How forcefully did he pull you?
 17 A. He like grabbed me and pulled me to the side.
 18 It wasn't like he was jerking me over to the side, but
 19 he pulled me over to the side.
 20 Q. But I'm just trying to get an image of
 21 this in my head. So, he's laying face up on the
 22 table?
 23 A. Well, he's on the table like this, but he is
 24 like this.
 25 Q. Okay. So he reached over --

1 A. He reached over.
 2 Q. One handed?
 3 A. Yes.
 4 Q. And moved you over?
 5 A. Yes.
 6 Q. Okay. Did you resist?
 7 A. I was pulling, I was nervous and I was pulling
 8 away but he just kept, come over here, da, da, da. So,
 9 I did.
 10 Q. Okay. So, and again, and I'm not trying
 11 to blame or I'm just trying to get a sense of, he
 12 had his hand on, applied force to move you?
 13 A. He did apply force because I sort of resisted
 14 like, uh-huh, I don't want to do this. And he, come on,
 15 pulled me over.
 16 Q. But you did step, walk, it wasn't just his
 17 force alone that moved you?
 18 A. Yeah.
 19 Q. Okay. Did you have any bruising?
 20 A. No.
 21 Q. Okay. And when he was touching you with
 22 the vibrator at any time did you step back?
 23 A. Yeah.
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. And he pulled me back forward.

1 Q. He would grab you with the same level of
 2 force?
 3 A. He was just like come here, and he pulled me
 4 forward.
 5 Q. Okay. One handed while he's still on his
 6 back?
 7 A. Yes, yes.
 8 Q. And he didn't use force to the point of
 9 causing bruising?
 10 A. No.
 11 Q. All right.
 12 A. And basically he, same repeated thing of what
 13 I've been telling you, the touching, the vibrating. And
 14 then he ejaculated. And me and my friend felt disgusted
 15 and just wanted to leave.
 16 Q. At any time did you feel that your life
 17 was threatened?
 18 A. I felt my life was threatened when I wanted to
 19 leave and he kept, you know, pulling me closer and
 20 pulling me. Like I wanted to leave. I wanted to go and
 21 leave. And I thought my life would probably be in
 22 danger if I said I wanted to go and I didn't want to do
 23 this, yes.
 24 Q. Okay. So you wanted to leave but you
 25 didn't tell him you wanted to leave?

1 A. No, I told -- you know, I told him like I
 2 don't feel comfortable. I don't want to do this but I
 3 didn't, you know, physically say, hey, I want to leave.
 4 Like I just said, I don't want to do this; I don't feel
 5 comfortable.
 6 Q. Okay. Was this -- what happened after he
 7 ejaculated?
 8 A. Basically he ejaculated. He cleaned himself
 9 up and then, you know, he spoke to us and said, you
 10 know, you bring a girl back that you know that's one of
 11 your friends, and I will give you 400 and you tell her
 12 it's a massage and, you know, I will give her 200.
 13 Q. And that would mean he would give you 400
 14 meaning whoever --
 15 A. If I brought --
 16 Q. You bring her --
 17 A. -- a friend, I get 400.
 18 Q. You get 400.
 19 A. And the friend I bought would get 200 and he
 20 would do the same thing with her.
 21 Q. Okay. Did you bring anyone?
 22 A. No.
 23 Q. Okay. What happened after you left or how
 24 did you leave actually since you said you came --
 25 A. By the taxi. The taxi gave me his card. So,

1 we got the taxi and he gave us the money and we left. I
 2 paid the taxi with my money.
 3 Q. Did you have any money on you when you
 4 first left or first went to the house?
 5 A. No.
 6 Q. What did you do in the taxi?
 7 A. I just talked about how disgusting I felt.
 8 Q. Okay. And what did [REDACTED] say?
 9 A. She said the same thing, that she couldn't,
 10 she didn't understand why that happened, and why they
 11 didn't tell us that it was that, and that it wasn't just
 12 a massage.
 13 Q. Okay. You said that they didn't tell us.
 14 Was it one girl that approached you or --
 15 A. Well, I'm guessing it was one person. It was
 16 one person but I don't --
 17 Q. Okay. Did you go back?
 18 A. I went back, but I didn't go upstairs. I
 19 didn't go -- it wasn't like I wanted to go. I was in a
 20 car and these girls wanted to go and I didn't want to go
 21 with them, so I sat in the kitchen.
 22 Q. Okay. And who were the girls that went
 23 that time?
 24 A. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] (phonetic).
 25 Q. Okay. And the same [REDACTED]?

1 A. Yes.
 2 Q. And what is her last name again?
 3 A. [REDACTED].
 4 Q. And which is [REDACTED]?
 5 A. [REDACTED].
 6 Q. All right. [REDACTED] around your age,
 7 younger or older?
 8 A. She was, yeah, she was in our grade. I don't
 9 talk to her anymore.
 10 Q. Was that [REDACTED] first time?
 11 A. Yes.
 12 Q. How did she know about it?
 13 A. I don't know. I didn't even talk about it. I
 14 just went there and I sat in the kitchen. I really
 15 didn't even want to go.
 16 Q. Did [REDACTED] bring her or --
 17 A. Yeah, [REDACTED] brought her but I didn't go up. I
 18 didn't --
 19 Q. So [REDACTED] got 400 for bringing her?
 20 A. I guess. I didn't -- I have no idea. I
 21 didn't even want to be there, but I was with them.
 22 Q. Did [REDACTED] tell her what to expect?
 23 A. I have no -- honestly, I don't even know. I
 24 just was with them. I don't know if she talked to her
 25 previously. I didn't even know we were going there.

1 Q. Okay. And did you tell [REDACTED] what to
 2 expect once you found out you were going there?
 3 A. I told her not to go. I said you don't want
 4 to do this. I'm telling you right now.
 5 Q. What did she say?
 6 A. Oh, she's, she's out there. But she didn't
 7 care. So, I wish somebody would have told me before I
 8 did that.
 9 Q. So, I mean you had a frank conversation
 10 with her, don't go --
 11 A. Well, because when they told me where we're
 12 going, I was like --
 13 Q. This man is going to masturbate --
 14 A. -- I don't want to go there. And [REDACTED] is,
 15 like, oh, whatever, dude. That's how she talks. Oh,
 16 whatever, dude, I don't care. I want the money. I'm
 17 like, I'm telling you, it's traumatizing. You don't
 18 want to go there. I don't want to go there. Drop me
 19 off.
 20 Oh, no, we're going to go there
 21 regardless, da, da, da. I was like I don't want to
 22 go. I don't want to go. And then I sat in the
 23 kitchen. And I, that was all. I was like you do
 24 what you want. I'm telling you right now it is not
 25 good.

1 Q. Okay. And why didn't you take them up on
 2 the offer of dropping you off?
 3 A. They, they were driving. I wasn't. They
 4 wouldn't drop me off because they were already headed
 5 that way, because they wouldn't tell me where we were
 6 going to go.
 7 Q. All right. So, they wouldn't like, stop
 8 at the gas station, let you get out and come back
 9 and get you in an hour or --
 10 A. They just -- we didn't even think of that. I
 11 just didn't want to go. I told them to take me home.
 12 Q. Okay. So, when you said, you know, drop
 13 me off, you meant drop me off at home?
 14 A. Yeah, take me home.
 15 Q. Okay. Were you angry at them?
 16 A. I was upset, yeah.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. And I was really disgusted at [REDACTED] for
 19 going through with what she was doing because I just
 20 told her exactly what happened, because I wish I would
 21 have known that because I would have never did that.
 22 Q. So, you did tell [REDACTED] exactly what
 23 happened?
 24 A. Yeah, I said it's not just a massage,
 25 [REDACTED]. It's worse than a massage. He is going to

1 try to do things to you.
 2 Q. Okay.
 3 A. So I, I tried to tell her but whatever.
 4 Q. And again I want to make sure I'm clear.
 5 You didn't get any money when [REDACTED] came?
 6 A. No. I wasn't, I didn't want to be involved.
 7 Q. Did you go back any more times?
 8 A. No.
 9 Q. No.
 10 A. No.
 11 Q. So, you only went twice --
 12 A. I went the one time and did that for the first
 13 time that I had no idea what was going on. And the
 14 second time it wasn't like I went there on, you know,
 15 myself intentionally. It was like I sort of just was
 16 there.
 17 Q. Okay.
 18 A. And I didn't want anything to do with it and I
 19 sat in the kitchen.
 20 Q. What happened while you were in the
 21 kitchen?
 22 A. Nothing. I seriously just sat there and
 23 talked to the chef, which I found out the chef was an
 24 undercover agent or undercover FBI or whatever they
 25 were.

1 Q. So --
 2 A. That's from what I heard.
 3 Q. And help me there with "what I heard,"
 4 meaning from other people in the school or --
 5 A. That's what I've heard --
 6 Q. -- basically the news --
 7 A. That's basically -- they had some somebody
 8 investigating him and it was a chef that was undercover
 9 and stuff like that. So, I don't -- it's not like for a
 10 fact. I don't know.
 11 Q. Do you remember what you talked to the
 12 chef about?
 13 A. I think, I believe his cooking to be honest
 14 with you. It wasn't like I was, like, having a huge
 15 conversation. I just was sitting there and I talked to
 16 him about other, food.
 17 Q. And, yeah, I was just curious, I mean, was
 18 it food or this is an odd situation, or I'm
 19 surprised I'm back here or just --
 20 A. I was -- it was just everything. I didn't
 21 want to be there.
 22 Q. Okay. Did you use any drugs or substances
 23 when you went the first time?
 24 A. No.
 25 Q. When you went the second time did you use

1 any drugs or substances?
 2 A. Unh-unh.
 3 Q. Did you use any, excuse me, after the
 4 first time or the second time?
 5 A. Maybe right after you're talking about?
 6 Q. Yes.
 7 A. No.
 8 Q. What was the worst thing that happened
 9 while you were there in your mind? I mean, I heard
 10 the story, and as you said I can only say what --
 11 A. What as the worst thing, experience?
 12 Q. What was the most distressing, worst --
 13 A. The worst feeling? I felt stuck, that I
 14 couldn't get out of the situation.
 15 Q. And in terms of physically what happened,
 16 what was most distressful for you?
 17 A. Being taken advantage of.
 18 Q. Okay. Were you dating anyone at this
 19 time?
 20 A. I don't think I was.
 21 Q. Did you tell anyone about this?
 22 A. No. I felt, I felt ashamed.
 23 Q. Okay. Did you consider going to the
 24 police?
 25 A. I thought about it.

1 Q. Okay.
 2 A. But I, I was scared. I didn't want people to
 3 find out.
 4 Q. Okay. What do you mean by scared?
 5 A. I'm sorry?
 6 Q. What do you mean by scared? Scared
 7 like --
 8 A. I just didn't want people to find out. I
 9 just -- it was -- I didn't like -- I felt like it was a
 10 traumatic experience for me. I felt disgusting. I
 11 felt, you know, taken advantage of. I felt like, I
 12 don't like to think about it, and I didn't want to
 13 re-live it. I didn't want my family to find out. I
 14 didn't want anybody to know.
 15 Q. Okay. So, you didn't talk to your mom
 16 about it or...
 17 A. I mean I did after years passed when I became
 18 more, like, you know, an adult. But in the beginning,
 19 no, I didn't tell anyone.
 20 Q. Was this before the police started
 21 investigating or after the police were investigating
 22 that you talked with them about it?
 23 A. I think it was a little bit like, probably
 24 like a year before I spoke to her about, until the
 25 police, FBI contacted me.

1 Q. I'm -- I just want to make sure I got that
 2 straight. You spoke with her a year before the FBI
 3 contacted you?
 4 A. Uh-huh, about, I'm just saying, like, I'm
 5 approximating like --
 6 Q. Yeah.
 7 A. -- spoke to her about it and talked to her
 8 about what happened.
 9 Q. But definitely before they contacted you?
 10 A. Yes.
 11 Q. Okay. What was her reaction?
 12 A. She asked, she asked me what happened. Sat me
 13 down, and, you know, how did you get there, same thing.
 14 How did you get there. Why did you feel like you
 15 couldn't leave? Why wouldn't you call me? I just told
 16 her, I said, you know, I was scared. I was scared you
 17 guys were going to be mad at me for even going there. I
 18 mean, you're at an old man's house and you -- I just
 19 thought it was a massage, but it was, it was scary. I
 20 mean, yeah, you say like, yeah, I was 15 or 16, it
 21 wasn't like I was eight. But still at that age, you
 22 didn't have the mentality that you do today.
 23 Q. What was the different mentality?
 24 A. I probably would have just tried to get up and
 25 leave or got in my car and left because I, you know, now

1 I'm aware of, okay, it's wrong. Okay. I'm not going to
2 get into trouble because I didn't know that it consisted
3 of this.

4 But at this point I was like, wow, I'm
5 here. I thought it was a massage but it's more. My
6 parents are going to think that I knew it was more.
7 It's, it's, you're scared. You're frightened.
8 You're young.

9 Q. Just so, scared of parents finding out and
10 what your parents would think?

11 A. Exactly. I mean, I felt disgusting.

12 Q. How long did you still feel disgusting
13 for?

14 A. I still feel taken advantage of to this day on
15 that whole situation. Like I don't like this whole
16 situation because I have to re-live it. I try to block
17 it out.

18 Q. Okay. Did you consider not filing a
19 lawsuit or not joining the lawsuit?

20 A. Did I consider it as in I didn't want to do
21 it?

22 Q. Yeah.

23 A. I think in the beginning, yes, I didn't know
24 what I wanted to do because I knew if I went through
25 with this, that I would have to re-live everything I

1 imagine.

2 Q. And how is that past trauma carrying over
3 to you today?

4 A. Like I told you, my daughter, I don't trust
5 men around her whatsoever. I don't trust men. You
6 know, I have flashbacks. You know, sometimes during my
7 husband and I have sex, there is like, since I have been
8 re-living this image of him doing his, you know, thing,
9 comes into my mind. It's disgusting.

10 Q. Okay. So, when you say flashbacks, you
11 mean you have a mental image?

12 A. I mean I have a mental image of what he did as
13 when he was masturbating and stuff like that.

14 Q. Okay. Do you ever physically feel as if
15 it's recurring, that you're back in that time?

16 A. I don't physically feel like that, but
17 mentally it goes through my mind and it disgusts me.
18 And I just, it grosses me. It disgusts me. I don't
19 like to re-live that.

20 Q. The issue with men, can it be related to
21 anything else?

22 A. Could it be related to anything else? I mean,
23 you know, my stepfather did what he did, but it's not
24 like I didn't, not trust him. When I stopped trusting
25 men was, like, you know, my sophomore-junior year is

1 went through.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. Like these, I don't enjoy. I don't enjoy it
4 in any way.

5 Q. I don't think anybody does.

6 A. No. I don't think anybody does either. I
7 just didn't know if I wanted to put myself through all
8 this again.

9 Q. What made you change your mind or decide
10 to go one way or the other?

11 A. I just feel like in the beginning I wasn't
12 going to do it. I was like I don't know if I want to
13 deal with all this, you know, because I know it's a lot
14 of, you know, stress going back into the details, and
15 re-living the entire thing, and, you know, bringing it
16 back out, which I didn't want to do.

17 But I was, like, you know what, what he
18 did was wrong. And he needs to be punished for it.
19 I don't think what he did was right. Like I was
20 traumatized from this experience in my life and he
21 just got nothing. He just did this to all these
22 girls and he's fine. It's not right. And I'm sure
23 I'm not -- I'm only one of the many girls that he's
24 probably traumatized. And I'm sure there's, you
25 know, so many girls that are just -- I can't even

1 when I just was like all men are disgusting. They all
2 just want sex. They'll lure any woman in or girl in to
3 get it any way they can.

4 Q. I think I forgot to ask this specifically.
5 You said you had five significant relationships.
6 How many sexual partners have you had?

7 A. All the relationships that I have told you is
8 my sexual partners.

9 Q. Okay. So there is no other additional
10 sexual partners out there? It's just those?

11 A. Those, yes.

12 Q. Okay.

13 A. Uh-huh. If I think of anyone else, I will let
14 you know, but I'm pretty sure that's it.

15 Q. Okay. No one-night stands and casual sex,
16 no key parties and things like that?

17 A. No.

18 Q. I think they were a lot bigger in the
19 '60s.

20 A. Yeah, that's -- I was, I was after that time.

21 Q. Okay. All right. What else?

22 A. I mean, just basically I mean, it affected me
23 and I just, I get upset with the fact -- this is what
24 upsets the most is that, you know, he got away with
25 doing this. You know, everybody has their own opinion

1 of what they think, but you have to actually re -- you
2 know, live that and go through that to judge how we
3 actually felt and mentally went through our mind.

4 You know, you say we could have just got
5 up and left. But it wasn't that easy when you're in
6 that situation. It's harder. You know, there's a
7 ton of things running through your mind, and you
8 don't know what to do. You're scared. You don't
9 want to call your parents. You're scared they are
10 going to get mad at you for being there.

11 It's -- you just feel disgusting. You
12 know, it's not like I intentionally put myself in
13 that situation. Like I know I was going to his
14 house to do what I did. I did not know anything
15 about that. And if I did, I would have not have
16 gone and that's that.

17 Q. Did you think it was odd that somebody was
18 willing to pay \$200 for a high school student who
19 wasn't certified, trained, taught on how to do a
20 massage?

21 A. Did I think it was odd? I mean, it crossed my
22 mind like, hum, this is weird. But from what this
23 person told me, I thought I could trust what she said,
24 so --

25 Q. Okay. And I know you said you have no

1 A. It was [REDACTED].

2 Q. And when you mean "her," you mean your
3 lawyer?

4 A. Yes, my attorney.

5 Q. I don't want to know anything you --

6 A. Yeah.

7 Q. -- said in between but just --

8 A. No, yeah, my, my attorney. She said I could
9 tell you.

10 Q. Only if you're comfortable. I don't want
11 to know attorney-client information.

12 A. Oh, yeah, that's fine.

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. [REDACTED].

15 Q. How do you spell the last name or best
16 guess?

17 A. I think it's [REDACTED]. (Last name spelled.), I think.

18 Q. Okay.

19 A. [REDACTED], which you have her name. [REDACTED] which you
20 have her name. And then [REDACTED].

21 Q. I'm sorry, B or [REDACTED].?

22 A. [REDACTED] - (First name spelled.)

23 Q. Okay.

24 A. [REDACTED] - (Last name spelled.)

25 Q. Thank you?

1 memory -- it's just hard for me to believe that you
2 wouldn't remember who told you that even after the
3 fact because it was such a bad experience for you --

4 A. Yeah, I'm not -- I really don't.

5 Q. -- that you would have been like, wow, I
6 can't believe that person did this to me.

7 A. I am.

8 Q. I'm angry at them. I want to kick their
9 butt.

10 A. I know what you're saying.

11 Q. I'm not sure --

12 A. But I, honestly I have been trying to figure
13 it out because everybody has been asking me and I really
14 don't -- I cannot (inaudible) about it.

15 Q. I mean, this person could have been
16 sitting next to you in school the next week, and --

17 A. I, I don't --

18 Q. -- you wouldn't have --

19 A. I mean, it would have but I just, today I
20 cannot picture. I don't know who it was.

21 Q. Okay. Earlier I asked you if any of your
22 friends had gone. And you said there were a few but
23 you --

24 A. Yeah, I, I spoke to her. She said yeah.

25 Q. Okay.

1 A. (Completion of spelling.) I think.

2 Q. Close enough. All right. Did you find
3 out about this after the fact? Or, I mean I know
4 [REDACTED] said she kind of --

5 A. Yeah, I knew about [REDACTED] because I brought [REDACTED]
6 with me, and I knew about [REDACTED] because she did, but
7 then after the fact, yes, I found out later that
8 everybody, you know, they did it.

9 Q. Okay. We're still going to be talking for
10 a while, but is there anything else about this
11 incident, episode with Mr. Epstein that you think I
12 should know or I haven't asked or...

13 A. I mean, I pretty much covered what happened,
14 the experience. Told you it was traumatic. It makes me
15 feel disgusting. To this day I don't like to think
16 about it. I don't like to do this.

17 Q. Okay. Have you had any other traumatic
18 experiences?

19 A. What do you mean by traumatic experiences?

20 Q. Well, it's your words. But what do you
21 mean by traumatic?

22 A. I could, okay, like I would say that's
23 traumatic, but there's different, you know --

24 Q. Theories?

25 A. Exactly. Like, you know, when my grandmother

1 got her leg amputated, I consider that a traumatic
 2 experience.
 3 Q. Okay. So, this is traumatic. Where would
 4 you put it on the traumatic scale?
 5 A. What's the scale, as in --
 6 Q. As you said some are more than others.
 7 A. I mean that was -- I mean, traumatic to me
 8 this is my definition --
 9 Q. Yeah, and I'm not trying to be coy or...
 10 A. Yeah. I'm saying traumatic to me is something
 11 that happened to me major in life so --
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. In that, my grandmother getting her leg
 14 amputated that affected me emotionally because I was sad
 15 for her and I didn't want to her to go through that.
 16 That's a traumatic experience to me as of that.
 17 Now, the Jeffrey Epstein thing is a
 18 completely different traumatic experience than, you
 19 know, family wise and you're caring about her and
 20 her going into surgery and losing her leg.
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. Maybe I sound like a retard talking like this,
 23 but that's just how I'm explaining it.
 24 Q. No, and I'm asking for your experience --
 25 A. Yeah.

1 Q. -- perspective, so I -- anything else that
 2 happened in your life that you found to be
 3 traumatic?
 4 A. The Jeffrey Epstein which I already told you.
 5 Q. Uh-huh.
 6 A. The one time my step-father fractured my
 7 eardrum.
 8 Q. Yeah.
 9 A. And that's basically it.
 10 Q. Anybody you know passed away?
 11 A. Close to me, not really.
 12 Q. Okay.
 13 A. I mean, my Pap-pap (phonetic), my dad's dad
 14 died. I mean, that was hard for me, but I was never
 15 really close, close to him. It hurt but it wasn't --
 16 that sounds bad but honestly, I wasn't that close to
 17 him. I didn't know him that well.
 18 Q. How long did that bother you or affect
 19 you?
 20 A. My Pap-pap?
 21 Q. Yeah.
 22 A. I mean, it still affects me. I think about
 23 him. It's like, wow, he's gone. It's not like
 24 realistic, because I never -- he didn't live in the same
 25 state.

1 Q. Okay. I, I appreciate that response. I
 2 understand that, you know, people say, you know, my
 3 mother died and 20 years later I still think of her
 4 and, you know.
 5 A. Yeah.
 6 Q. When I ask how long did that affect you, I
 7 mean in terms of emotional upset before you felt
 8 like, yeah, lost something but life is back to
 9 normal, if that makes sense?
 10 A. Probably like, you know, a month or so. I
 11 mean, I -- it wasn't like I was sitting there crying
 12 every day which might sound bad, but, I mean, I would
 13 sit there and just think about him, like, wow, I can't
 14 believe he's gone. Like it didn't feel real.
 15 Q. Okay.
 16 A. You know?
 17 Q. So, for about a month, and I'm not trying
 18 to put words in your mouth --
 19 A. Yeah, I'm just -- yeah, I will approximate it.
 20 Q. And again trauma, as you said, is a
 21 major -- usually people say it's a negative event in
 22 someone's life.
 23 A. Yeah.
 24 Q. Because weddings and things can be a
 25 traumatic event.

1 A. Yeah.
 2 Q. Most people don't consider those
 3 traumatic.
 4 A. Yes.
 5 Q. Is storms, I mean, we're in Florida, ever
 6 have problems with any the hurricanes?
 7 A. Yeah, hurricanes, I went through that, would
 8 consider it a traumatic experience.
 9 Q. Any car accidents?
 10 A. No.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. I mean, I have had a car accident but it
 13 wasn't --
 14 Q. Right, and I'm asking if it was --
 15 A. Traumatic, no.
 16 Q. -- what you would consider a traumatic
 17 experience?
 18 A. No.
 19 Q. Okay. Were you hospitalized?
 20 A. No.
 21 Q. Did you have serious injury?
 22 A. No.
 23 Q. Did you have whiplash, back pain?
 24 A. No, nothing.
 25 Q. Was anybody hurt on the other side?

1 A. No.
 2 Q. Okay. Fender-bender type thing?
 3 A. The side of her car.
 4 Q. Okay. How fast was she going? How fast
 5 was the car --
 6 A. I mean, she was going maybe 20, 30 miles
 7 pulling into somewhere. And I tried to brake, and I was
 8 on a dirt road and I skidded into her.
 9 Q. Okay. And how fast were you going?
 10 A. Probably like 40, 50.
 11 Q. Okay. How old were you?
 12 A. I'm going to say around 18.
 13 Q. I remember you said you got your license
 14 at around that time.
 15 A. Yeah, so, like, 18, 19. I'm guessing.
 16 Q. Within a year of two of getting your
 17 license?
 18 A. Yes.
 19 Q. Fair enough. Okay. Was the car damaged?
 20 A. My car wasn't that bad, but her car was pretty
 21 damaged. It had to get her parts, her door.
 22 Q. So she needed a new door?
 23 A. Yeah.
 24 Q. Do you remember what you were driving at
 25 the time?

1 A. No. I've had a lot of cars.
 2 Q. Okay. Is that because they broke down
 3 or --
 4 A. Well, my first car.
 5 Q. -- or because your dad worked at a
 6 dealership and had --
 7 A. It's also that, and it's also because my first
 8 car that I got broke down and had so many miles on it.
 9 I don't know if it was a Nissan. I don't know. I'm not
 10 sure.
 11 Q. Not a lot of cars because you're
 12 particularly rough on them or had (inaudible)
 13 accidents --
 14 A. No, actually I've never even had that many
 15 accidents. That was my only accident that I've ever
 16 had.
 17 Q. Where are you currently living?
 18 A. I'm living with my dad.
 19 Q. Okay. How long have you been there?
 20 A. I actually just moved in there probably about,
 21 maybe a little over a month ago.
 22 Q. Okay. Is that working okay or is there
 23 tension or...
 24 A. No. We're getting along fine. My mother, I'm
 25 sorry, my mother and I didn't get along. My

1 mother-in-law, my mother-in-law and I did not get along
 2 at all.
 3 Q. Is that where you were living before?
 4 A. Yeah.
 5 Q. What was the problem with the
 6 mother-in-law?
 7 A. She's crazy. No. She, she just thinks she's
 8 never wrong and would lie to my husband about me. And I
 9 have her recorded telling me one story. And then I had
 10 an e-mail telling him a whole other story. This is how
 11 crazy this woman is.
 12 Q. Okay. Just to make sure I'm clear when
 13 you say crazy, we're not talking about
 14 hallucinating --
 15 A. Well, not like that --
 16 Q. -- or just after her --
 17 A. -- but I'm saying just like her son is a God
 18 and nobody is going to be good enough for him.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. So, she's going to find any way to show him
 21 that I'm not good enough.
 22 Q. How long did you live with her?
 23 A. A good four, five months. Not -- well, maybe
 24 a little bit longer than that because I came -- I've
 25 been here since February.

1 Q. So, February to --
 2 A. No, I'm sorry. I've been here since January.
 3 I started school in February.
 4 Q. Okay. January to about Octoberish?
 5 A. Well, first I lived with my mom for about a
 6 month or two. And then I moved out of her house because
 7 of my dog. And I went to my mother-in-law's house. And
 8 my mother-in-law sort of wanted me to stay there but,
 9 you know, just to have her grand-daughter there with
 10 her.
 11 Q. Okay.
 12 A. And, I mean, don't get me wrong, she helped
 13 out with my daughter a lot. You know. She watched her
 14 all the time I was school, Monday through Thursday and
 15 Saturday. But we got a long really well. And then I
 16 started seeing how she would make up lies about me. And
 17 one minute she would be so nice to me and the next
 18 minute she would just be vicious.
 19 Q. Okay.
 20 A. And one day I just couldn't take it any more,
 21 and I was like, I've got to move out of here and my dad
 22 was like, move in.
 23 Q. And for the month you've spent with dad,
 24 it's about a month?
 25 A. Yeah. I mean, I, I'm looking -- you know, a

1 babysitter, it's hard because I had her steady watching
2 my daughter with no problem. You know, even for like,
3 you know, I had to do things like this, she would watch
4 my daughter for me with no problem. That's the only
5 thing that I loved about her. But other than that, just
6 I can't deal with it.

7 Q. Okay. Any issues have homelessness? Have
8 you ever been homeless or...

9 A. Like I wasn't living on the streets, but I was
10 living with a friend of a friend when I was, when I got
11 kicked out when I was 18.

12 Q. Got kicked out from where?

13 A. My dad's.

14 Q. Okay. Why did he kick you out?

15 A. Because I was skipping school, and I didn't
16 really go and listen to what he said.

17 Q. Now, earlier we were talking about issues
18 of mental abuse. And you said it would be hard
19 saying things. What would usually cause that? Was
20 that kind of a like a two-way street, or was that
21 just him being erratic or --

22 A. No, it was because he was upset because I
23 wasn't doing what I should be doing as in going to
24 school every day. I was more with my friends. You
25 know, I wasn't doing what I was supposed to be doing at

1 that point in my life. And he would just get frustrated
2 and, you know, sometimes people say things they don't
3 mean when they're mad.

4 Q. And why were you doing those things?

5 A. I just felt like I needed my friends. I felt
6 like I had nobody else.

7 Q. Okay. When you do those things with your
8 friends, would it be fun?

9 A. I mean, it wouldn't even be anything horrible.
10 I would just be hanging out with them at their house, or
11 don't get me wrong, I did drink and I did do drugs here
12 and there. But I never got like, any drugs, I need to
13 drink that much. But I would occasionally do them at --
14 it was mainly that I was skipping school, and I wasn't
15 focusing on what my goals should have been.

16 Q. But skipping school was more recreational.
17 It wasn't like skipping school like in eighth grade
18 where people were threatening to kill you?

19 A. No. It was more like I just wanted to do it.

20 Q. Okay. Ever have any trouble with the law?

21 A. Actually, recently.

22 Q. Okay. What happened?

23 A. I got in trouble for petty theft.

24 Q. Okay. What happened?

25 A. I went to Macy's and I saw a pair of jeans

1 that I wanted. And I wasn't -- I actually never stolen
2 before or did anything against the law. But I was in
3 the dressing room. I saw these jeans. They were \$100
4 and they didn't have a sensor. And I was like, why not.
5 I put them in my purse and I got caught.

6 Q. And the court date is pending?

7 A. No. I did my court date and the charges were
8 dropped, and I have to do a theft class.

9 Q. Okay.

10 A. But I've never had anything else except
11 tickets for speeding.

12 Q. Okay. How many tickets have you gotten?

13 A. Probably like three, four.

14 Q. How fast were you going?

15 A. Probably like ten to 15 miles over the speed
16 limit.

17 Q. Did you ever get a reckless driving or
18 careless driving charge?

19 A. No.

20 Q. And how many tickets did you get? You
21 said three to four?

22 A. Yeah.

23 Q. Okay. Ever any trouble as a juvenile?

24 A. No. Well, what do you mean "in trouble," as
25 in law?

1 Q. Yes.

2 A. No.

3 Q. And what would be the other type of
4 trouble?

5 A. By my parents.

6 Q. Okay. And trouble with your parents was
7 due to --

8 A. Going out and not listening. I would get
9 grounded when I was older.

10 Q. Where would you go?

11 A. Out with my friends, wherever, to the party
12 or --

13 Q. Okay.

14 A. Hang out.

15 Q. And what type of parties were you at?

16 A. Maybe at a friend's house, and we would just
17 have a group of friends over and we would be hanging
18 out.

19 Q. And again I just want to make sure my
20 definition and your definition is matching. Would
21 it be like a, quote, unquote, house party where
22 people would bring in kegs and somebody's parents
23 were out of town?

24 A. Yeah, yeah.

25 Q. There would be about 50 people or so?

1 A. Some of them, yeah.
 2 Q. Okay. Not that this was an arrest, I saw
 3 something about when you were, I think, younger
 4 being at a gas station and not being served or
 5 something. And the police were called, and I don't
 6 even know if you remember it at all.
 7 A. I was at a gas station and the police were
 8 called?
 9 Q. Yeah, like the person at the gas station
 10 wouldn't sell you gas and you got annoyed with her.
 11 And the police came and they said, well, she's got
 12 the right not to sell you gas, and you left. I
 13 mean, it didn't lead to an arrest or anything. I'm
 14 just -- it was kind of an odd thing. I was
 15 wondering if you could tell me --
 16 A. This --
 17 Q. -- what happened there.
 18 A. I totally forgot about that. Okay. This is
 19 so stupid. But my friend [REDACTED] (phonetic) was dating
 20 [REDACTED]. Okay?
 21 Q. Okay.
 22 A. [REDACTED] baby's mom was the one working at a gas
 23 station.
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. She didn't like me because I was friends with

1 Q. No. It's not a trick question.
 2 A. No, I really --
 3 Q. Did you ever get into a fistfight with
 4 anyone?
 5 A. Fight, I've been into a fight, yeah.
 6 Q. Okay. Have you ever used a weapon against
 7 anyone?
 8 A. Not that I can remember.
 9 Q. Okay. You haven't shot, knifed, tried to
 10 run anybody over with a car?
 11 A. No.
 12 Q. Okay. So what -- tell me about the fight.
 13 A. It was actually with [REDACTED], and actually my
 14 husband now. But it was back in junior year and she
 15 slept with him.
 16 Q. Okay.
 17 A. And I got pissed off and I fought her.
 18 Q. Were the two of you dating at that
 19 time or...
 20 A. We were like -- it wasn't officially dating
 21 but we were together and she knew that I, you know,
 22 started to like him again. So, I thought it was wrong
 23 for a best friend --
 24 Q. Okay.
 25 A. -- when I asked her numerous times, do you

1 [REDACTED]. I went to the gas station to get gas and she
 2 wouldn't serve me gas. So, I got upset and I was like,
 3 are you kidding me. I have done nothing to you. And
 4 she said I was making threats to her, and all this
 5 stuff. Called the cops. And I went back to the cops
 6 and I wrote a police report about her also, because she,
 7 I mean this was a -- wow.
 8 Q. Yeah, like I said, there was no criminal
 9 action that came out of it. I was just wondering
 10 what the story was to that.
 11 A. Yeah, that was, wow. That's weird. Oh, I
 12 can't even believe that. I totally forgot. But I mean,
 13 yeah, there was -- she was the crazy one. I went to go
 14 get gas, and she called the cops on me because she
 15 wouldn't sell me gas because I was friends with her
 16 baby's dad's new girlfriend. And the police even told
 17 me she was fricking crazy. That's hilarious.
 18 Q. When you were a kid growing up, what's the
 19 most violent thing you've ever done?
 20 A. Violent thing I've ever done?
 21 Q. Uh-huh.
 22 A. As in anything?
 23 Q. Yeah, a kid, adult, violent.
 24 A. I don't know. Do you know something I don't
 25 know?

1 like him, [REDACTED], no. All right. Tell me the truth
 2 because I really do care for him. No, Jane Doe No. 5, I
 3 would tell you. All right.
 4 Q. Did either of you need medical attention
 5 afterwards?
 6 A. No. I mean it was a couple of hits and that
 7 was it.
 8 Q. Did the friendship survive or...
 9 A. We're still friends.
 10 Q. Okay.
 11 A. I mean, we were in high school, so...
 12 Q. Okay. Any issues with cruelty to animals?
 13 A. No, never.
 14 Q. Bed wetting?
 15 A. I'm sorry?
 16 Q. Bed wetting?
 17 A. No.
 18 Q. Fire setting?
 19 A. What is it?
 20 Q. Fire setting.
 21 A. No.
 22 Q. No.
 23 A. Not that -- I mean, putting things on fire --
 24 Q. Yeah.
 25 A. No.

1 Q. Okay. Do you own any weapons?
 2 A. No.
 3 Q. Are you member of any gangs?
 4 A. No.
 5 Q. Current, past. Okay. Have you been the
 6 victim of violent crime outside of, you know,
 7 domestic relationship, I mean, any just random --
 8 A. Like somebody fought me or something?
 9 Q. Yeah, somebody robbed you, somebody hit
 10 you with a pipe and stole your purse?
 11 A. Somebody stole my car in Virginia. My car was
 12 stolen for a couple of months.
 13 Q. Okay. Was this like a carjacking where
 14 you were in the car or were you parked and came
 15 back?
 16 A. My husband actually took the car to the gas
 17 station. Went inside and came back out and the car was
 18 gone. And they had it and the car seat, they threw that
 19 away. They threw my stroller away. The car was, had to
 20 get fixed. It was crashed and we didn't have it for
 21 like, I'm guessing, a month, two months, three months.
 22 I don't remember but it was a long time.
 23 Q. Okay. And you've never been in jail or
 24 prison or --
 25 A. I went to jail for the theft.

1 A. No, no, no. I just wanted to get out of
 2 there.
 3 Q. Well, it's about 1:00. So we could take a
 4 break now, go get lunch, come back, do the second
 5 test and then kind of finish up, or I can keep going
 6 until the tape stops?
 7 A. It's whatever you want to do. I mean, I
 8 don't -- I smoke, so I don't mind taking a cigarette
 9 break.
 10 Q. Why don't we go ahead and stop now then.
 11 It's a good time to get lunch, and we can do the
 12 test and finish up.
 13 A. Okay.
 14 Q. Usually we've been doing 45-minute lunch
 15 breaks, but we'll check with the attorneys.
 16 A. Okay. I'm not going to go anywhere. I will
 17 just be outside.
 18 Q. There is deli downstairs. They actually
 19 have pretty good soups.
 20 A. Oh, is there.
 21 (Luncheon recess from 1:08 p.m. until 1:57
 22 p.m.)

1 Q. How long were you in for?
 2 A. I was booked at 9 at night, and I got out at
 3 like 3:30 in the morning.
 4 Q. Okay.
 5 A. But it was a misdemeanor.
 6 Q. Anything bad happen while you were in?
 7 A. I wanted to get out. It was, the whole
 8 experience was horrible.
 9 Q. Okay. But while you were in holding or in
 10 general population or whatever --
 11 A. I was in a holding cell.
 12 Q. Nobody attacked you, was inappropriate
 13 with you?
 14 A. I mean, there was a whole bunch of crack heads
 15 in there and I just wanted to get out of there, but
 16 nobody did anything to me.
 17 Q. Okay. Weren't maced, didn't need
 18 restraints?
 19 A. No.
 20 Q. Weren't put in a calm-down chair or
 21 whatever they call it?
 22 A. No. No, that was an experience that I never
 23 want to re-live again.
 24 Q. You didn't attack any of the guards,
 25 anything --
