Greetings from your Institute for Music & Brain Science, with an attachment about a forthcoming event in London on music and the brain.

Since we last corresponded The Institute has become bicoastal - - no, tricoastal, counting you, Sir George - - I've added a professorship in music in the newly endowed Herb Alpert School of Music at UCLA to my that of my usual academic home, neurology, at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. To my knowledge, such a chimera (mutant?) has never populated the planet.

At The Institute, Tom Sturges, Head of Creative at Universal Music has joined the Board, as has Tim Rice, Director of the Alpert School.
