Young *Royal Palm* to the left in front. The palms lining the background are *FishTail Palms*

So named because of the ruffled multiple fan like ends of their fronds, some say that when the wind passes through them it sounds like a school of fish swimming by???

Please note that *Young Fox Tail Palms* look quite similar until their fronds fully extend, and the leaves then grow out more narrow.
